WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-

fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called ‘the said Benefice’) of Skilgate, in the County of Somerset and in the Diocese of Bath and Wells.

“ Whereas the Reverend Albert Elias

Abrahamson, of 131, Westcombe Hill, Blackheath, in the county of Kent, Clerk in Holy Orders, died on the seventh day of April, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, seised of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Skilgate for an estate in fee simple free from incumbrances.

"And whereas during his lifetime the said Albert Elias Abrahamson agreed for good and valuable consideration to sell and convey the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Skilgate to Kezia Williams, of Skilgate Rectory, Wiveliscombe, in the said County of Somerset, Widow, but no conveyance thereof in pursuance of such agreement was executed by the said Albert Elias Abrahamson although the consideration for such conveyance was duly paid by the said Kezia Williams to the said Albert Elias Abrahamson.

"And whereas the said Albert Elias Abrahamson died intestate leaving his Widow, Kate Abrahamson, him surviving, to whom Letters of Administration of his estate were duly granted at the Principal Registry of the Probate Division of the Supreme Court, on the ninth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven, by virtue of which the said advowson and perpetual right of patronage and presentation is now vested in the said Kate Abrahamson as personal representative of the said Albert Elias Abrahamson subject to the agreement for sale hereinbefore mentioned.

"And whereas the said Kezia Williams is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Skilgate should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend George Wyndham, now Bishop of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells, and his successors Bishops of Bath and Wells, and the said Kate Abrahamson at the request of the said Kezia Williams is consenting to such transfer of the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage and presentation.

"And whereas the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, is willing to accept such transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said Benefice of Skilgate which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Skilgate.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Kezia Williams and Kate Abrahamson (in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this Scheme, and with the consent of the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from

the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Skilgate shall be transferred to the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors in the same Bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and by his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Peckleton is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in Rowland Story, of 15, Wadham Gardens, South Hampstead, in the county of London, Esquire.

"And whereas the said Rowland Story is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Peckleton now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Honourable and Right Reverend Edward Carr, now Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough, and his successors in the same Bishoprick.

"And whereas the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which, by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited, or by some or one of them, is made necessary, he, the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Peckleton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish of Peckleton.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Rowland Story (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Peckleton now vested in him, the said Rowland Story as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors in the same Bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for apportioning the income of the united benefice (being a rectory and vicarage) of Holtby with Warthill, in the county of York and in the diocese of York, between that united benefice and a certain other united benefice, namely, the united benefice (being a rectory and vicarage) of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley, which said last named benefice is situate in the said county of York and in the said diocese of York.

"Whereas Your Majesty in right of the Crown and the Archbishop of York in right of his See are the alternate patrons of the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill and also of the said benefice of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley, Your Majesty's alternate right of patronage being exercised by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain on Your Majesty's behalf.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley is at present insufficiently endowed; and that the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill will still be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of the said diocese of York, has represented to us, and we are of opinion, that it is desirable that

additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley aforesaid, by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“ And whereas the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill is now full of a Clerk, the Incumbent thereof being the Reverend John Robinson, Clerk in Holy Orders.

“ Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable Richard Burdon, Viscount Haldane, acting as Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, acting as Ordinary and also as the alternate patron in right of his See of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal Seal) and also with the consent of the said John Robinson as the Incumbent of the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall have been published in the London Gazette and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, all the pieces or parcels of land, tenements, and hereditaments, being part of the glebe lands belonging to the benefice of Warthill, which are described in the First Schedule to this Scheme annexed and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured pink and also the dwelling house known as Warthill Vicarage with its

appurtenances described in the Second Schedule to this Scheme annexed and indicated by green colour on the said map or plan, shall be transferred from the said united benefice of Holtby with Warthill and shall be annexed to and shall in future belong to the said united benefice of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley, provided always and we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, with the consents aforesaid do humbly recommend and propose further that in the event of the said house and its appurtenances described in the said Second Schedule to this Scheme being hereafter sold under the authority of Acts of Parliament authorising the sale of houses of residence or glebe lands belonging to ecclesiastical benefices then one moiety of the net proceeds of such sale shall without any assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same thereupon be transferred to the said united benefice of Holtby with Warthill and shall be held by the person or persons or corporate body to whom such proceeds of sale shall have been paid in trust for the said united benefice of Holtby with Warthill and the Incumbent thereof as an augmentation of the endowments of such benefice.

“ And provided also that the whole of the first fruits and tenths now payable to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty in respect of the said united benefice of Holtby with Warthill shall continue to be payable by the Rector or Incumbent of the said benefice.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four, of the Act of the second and third years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of Saint Mary, situate at Bootle, in the Parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Mary, situate at Bootle as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said Parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Mary, situate at Bootle, as aforesaid, and that the same should

be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Bootle.'

"And with the like consent of the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Mary, situate at Bootle as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Venerable George Hardwicke Spooner, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Rector or Incumbent of the Rectory of the said Parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, shall continue to be such Rector or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said Church of Saint Mary, situate at Bootle as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said George Hardwicke Spooner, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Bootle, being:

"All that isolated part of the Parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool, which at present is included in the Conventional District of Saint Mary, Bootle, and is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon the west by the estuary of the River Mersey, upon the north by the New Parish of Saint Leonard,

Bootle, upon the east partly by the New Parish of Saint Matthew, Bootle, and partly by the New Parish of Christ Church, Bootle, and upon the south by the New Parish of Saint John, Bootle, all in the said county and diocese."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the tenth year of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh, and of the first year of His Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four (local), which local Act is named the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the tenth year of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh and of the first year of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four (local), which local Act is named the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for constituting a separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Ann, Stanley, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said New Parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, is a Cure wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said New Parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, which is hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed separate District any consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purposes of Divine Worship, but there is therein a site which has been duly conveyed to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under the provisions of the Church Building Acts, 1818 to 1884, and upon which it is proposed that a permanent Church to be called the Church of Saint Paul should be erected with or out of the proceeds of the sale of the late Church of Saint Paul, in the City of Liverpool (which proceeds are in our hands) in accordance with the provisions of the twenty-fifth section of the said Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, and of certain Agreements set forth in the Schedule to that Act and thereby confirmed.

"And whereas at the date of the last mentioned Act and Agreements the perpetual advowson of the said late Church of Saint Paul was vested in fee simple in certain persons (hereinafter called the Saint Paul's Trustees), viz., the Right Honourable Charles Lindley Viscount Halifax, the Honourable Sir Walter George Frank Phillimore, Baronet, one of the Justices of the High Court of Justice, Howard Douglas Horsfall, of the City of Liverpool, Share Broker, Robert Ernest Horsfall, of Stody Lodge, in the County of Norfolk, Gentleman, and Frank Tobin, of the City of Liverpool, Share Broker.

"And whereas the Saint Paul's Trustees have applied to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, to take steps for the constitution of the said proposed separate District in conformity with the provisions of the said twenty-fifth section of the said Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910.

"And whereas the said proposed separate District will under the provisions of the said twenty-fifth section of the said Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, be endowed with all the endowments of or connected with the late Church and Consolidated Benefice of Saint Paul, Liverpool, subject to the rights of the Reverend John Lloyd, the former first Incumbent of the said late Church, under an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council dated the third day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight and the portion of those endowments at present available produces an income of not less than one hundred and fifty pounds per annum.

"And whereas the said twenty-fifth section of the said Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, provides that the right of patronage of the said proposed separate District shall be assigned to and be vested in the Saint Paul's Trustees (the owners of the advowson of the said late Church of Saint Paul), their heirs and assigns, for the same purposes as such advowson was formerly held by them.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said New Parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the Map or Plan hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London

Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme as aforesaid become and be constituted a separate District for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool.'

"And we further recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the whole right of patronage of the said District so recommended to be constituted and when such District shall have become a New Parish under the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act then of the said New Parish and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereto, shall be assigned to and be absolutely vested in the Saint Paul's Trustees, their heirs and assigns, for the same purposes as the advowson of the said late Church of Saint Paul was held by them, as contemplated by the said twenty-fifth section of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by them.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool, being:—

"All that part of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Ann, Stanley, in the County of Lancaster and in the Diocese of Liverpool, which is bounded upon the south by the New Parish of All Saints, Stoneycroft, upon the east, upon the north-east, and upon the north-west by the Parish of West Derby, both in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of West Derby from the said New Parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, at the junction of the road called Tynwald Hill with Green Lane, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Green Lane for a distance of twelve chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the passage running along the backs of the houses on the southern side of Portelet Road, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of the said passage (thereby crossing Menstone Road) for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its present eastern end near the south-western corner of the close numbered 279 upon the Ordnance Map of Liverpool published in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight upon the scale of twenty-five inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan annexed to this Scheme, and extending thence north-eastward first to the south-western corner of the said close and then along the fence forming the southern boundary of such close for a distance of nine chains and a half or thereabouts to its eastern end on the western side of the passage running along the backs of the houses on the western side of Stoneville Road, and extend-

ing thence first eastward to the middle of such passage and then southward along the middle of the said passage and in a line in continuation thereof for a distance in all of six chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Derwent Road, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Derwent Road for a distance of eight yards or thereabouts to its junction with Derby Lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of Derby Lane for a distance of thirty-one chains or thereabouts to its junction with Prescott Road upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, from the said New Parish of All Saints, Stoneycroft."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patron and to the Incumbent of the New Parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patron and Incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said first-mentioned Act. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Liverpool.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred

and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the Church intended to be erected on the site hereinafter mentioned, in the new parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool, and to be called the Church of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool.

“Whereas by virtue of an indenture of conveyance made the ninth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and nine, a piece of land (hereinafter called the Derby Lane Site) containing two thousand nine hundred square yards, situate in or near Derby Lane, in the said new parish of Saint Ann, Stanley, was conveyed to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, for the purposes of the Church Building Acts, 1818 to 1884, as a site for a new Church then intended to be called the Church of Saint Hilda.

“And whereas by virtue of an indenture of agreement made under the provisions of the Acts of the eighth and ninth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter seventy, and of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and bearing date the ninth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and nine, between the Right Reverend Francis James, Lord Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool, of the first part, the Reverend Percy Stewart, Clerk in Holy Orders, Rector of the rectory and parish of West Derby, in the said diocese of Liverpool, and as such Rector Patron of the benefice of Saint Ann, Stanley, of the second part, the Reverend William James Elsley, Clerk in Holy Orders, Vicar or Incumbent of the said new parish of Saint Ann, Stanley aforesaid, of the third part, and the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, of the fourth part, it was agreed that the patronage or right of nominating or presenting the first and all succeeding Ministers to the Church intended to be erected upon the Derby Lane site which was conveyed to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, as a site for a proposed new Church as aforesaid, should, on the consecration of the said Church (which in the said indenture of agreement was described as being intended to be consecrated by the name of the Church of Saint Hilda, Stanley), and for ever thereafter belong to and be vested in and exercised by the said Francis James, Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool, and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

“And whereas at the respective dates of the agreements hereinafter recited the perpetual advowson of the late Church of Saint Paul, Liverpool, in the said diocese of Liverpool, was vested in fee simple in the following persons (hereinafter sometimes called the Saint Paul's Trustees), namely, the Right Honourable Charles Lindley Viscount Halifax, the Honourable Sir Walter George Frank Phillimore, Baronet, one of the Justices of the High Court of Justice, Howard Douglas Horsfall, of the city of Liverpool, Share Broker, Robert Ernest Horsfall, of Stody Lodge, in the county of Norfolk, Gentleman, and Frank Tobin, of the city of Liverpool, Share Broker.

“And whereas by certain agreements set out in the second schedule to the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, and confirmed by section twenty-five of that Act (to which agreements the Saint Paul's trustees and the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, were parties), provision was made for the sale to the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company of the site of the said late Church of Saint Paul, Liverpool, and for the purchase money to be paid by the said railway company for the said site being paid to us, the said Commissioners, and for a portion of the said purchase money and the interest thereon being applied and disposed of in or towards the purchase or acquisition of a site within a separate district then intended to be constituted under the New Parishes Acts, 1843 to 1884, and the erection, furnishing, and equipment thereon, with all proper approaches, fittings, ornaments, and conveniences of a Church.

“And whereas by the said twenty-fifth section of the said Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, it was enacted that we, the said Commissioners, should hold the said purchase money upon trust to pay and apply the same in accordance with and subject to the provisions of the said agreements, and that on the passing of the said Act the Saint Paul's trustees should forthwith take all steps and use all endeavours in their power for securing a suitable site for a Church within or near the city of Liverpool, and for the constitution of a separate district for ecclesiastical purposes under the New Parishes Acts, 1843 to 1884, the Reverend David George Fee Smith (if living) to be the first Minister or Incumbent of such district, and that the right of patronage of such new district should be by virtue of the Act now in recital assigned to and vested in the Saint Paul's trustees, their heirs and assigns for the same purposes as the said advowson of the said late Church of St. Paul was then held by them, and that all endowments of or connected with the Church and consolidated benefice of Saint Paul, Liverpool, should be by virtue of the Act now in recital transferred to such new district subject to the rights of the Reverend John Lloyd therein mentioned.

“And whereas we, the said Commissioners, have received the purchase money paid under and in accordance with the said agreements for the site of the said late Church of Saint Paul, and at the request of the Saint Paul's trustees and with the approval of the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, we propose and intend (if this scheme and the scheme under the said New Parishes Acts to be submitted by us as hereinafter mentioned are ratified by Your Majesty in Council) to appropriate the necessary part of the purchase money or the funds representing the same as and for the payment or discharge of the purchase money paid by us for the Derby Lane site conveyed to us by the hereinbefore mentioned indenture of conveyance of the ninth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and nine, so that such site is or will be secured as a site for the new Church to be erected in pursuance of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, or the agreements thereby confirmed, and in the aforesaid event we propose, at the like request and with the like approval as aforesaid, that such Church shall be erected on the Derby Lane site accordingly, and that the expense thereof shall be defrayed out of further parts of the said

purchase money of the site of the said late Church of Saint Paul or the funds representing the same.

“ And whereas we propose to submit to Your Majesty in Council a scheme already prepared by us for the constitution under the New Parishes Acts, 1843 to 1884, of a new or separate district for ecclesiastical purposes by the name of the District of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool, consisting of the area within the metes and bounds therein mentioned, and including the Derby Lane site, and (if Your Majesty in Council should be pleased to ratify such scheme) then on the said Church to be erected on the Derby Lane site being approved by us by an Instrument in writing under our common seal, and consecrated the said district will become a new parish under the name of the New Parish of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool, and the said Church will become the Church thereof, and it is intended that if this scheme and the said intended scheme are ratified by Your Majesty in Council, the Church so to be erected on the Derby Lane site shall be consecrated by the name of the Church of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool, instead of Saint Hilda, Stanley, as heretofore proposed as aforesaid.

“ And whereas, in order to enable the necessary parts of the purchase money of the site of the said old Church of Saint Paul or of the funds representing the same to be appropriated or applied in the payment or discharge of the purchase money of the Derby Lane site and the expense of the erection of the said new Church thereon, and to comply with the provisions of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, relating to the right of patronage of the said intended new Church and new district in that Act referred to it is necessary that the said right of patronage shall be vested in the Saint Paul's trustees, and accordingly the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, is desirous that all the ownership or estate and interest so by virtue of the said indenture of agreement of the ninth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and nine, belonging to and vested in him, the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, in right of his See, of and in the patronage or right of nominating or presenting the first and all succeeding Ministers to the Church to be erected upon the Derby Lane site, that is to say (as now proposed), the new Church of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool aforesaid, shall be transferred to the Saint Paul's trustees in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed, and in token thereof and also in token that the said transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts hereinbefore referred to or by some or one of them is made necessary, he has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

“ And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, now Archbishop of York, in token that the proposed transfer has that consent of the Archbishop of the Province which by the Acts hereinbefore referred to, or by some or one of them is made necessary, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

“ And whereas the said Percy Stewart and William James Elsley have agreed to the said proposed transfer so far as consent on their part is necessary or proper, and in token thereof

have executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

“ And whereas the transfer of patronage, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the new parish of Saint Ann, Stanley.

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), and with the consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his Archiepiscopal seal), and with the consent of the said Percy Stewart and William James Elsley (in testimony whereof they have severally signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the Saint Paul's Trustees, that is to say, of the said Charles Lindley Viscount Halifax, Sir Walter George Frank Phillimore, Howard Douglas Horsfall, Robert Ernest Horsfall, and Frank Tobin (in testimony whereof they have severally signed and sealed this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the ownership and all the estate and interest so belonging to and vested in the said Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool, in right of his See as aforesaid of and in the patronage or right of nominating or presenting the first and all succeeding Ministers to the said new Church to be erected on the Derby Lane site, and (as now proposed) to be called the Church of Saint Paul, Stanley, Liverpool as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Charles Lindley Viscount Halifax, Sir Walter George Frank Phillimore, Howard Douglas Horsfall, Robert Ernest Horsfall, and Frank Tobin, their heirs and assigns, for the same purposes as the advowson of the said late Church of Saint Paul, Liverpool, was at the date of the passing of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Act, 1910, held by them, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Charles Lindley Viscount Halifax, Sir Walter George Frank Phillimore, Howard Douglas Horsfall, Robert Ernest Horsfall, and Frank Tobin, their heirs and assigns for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof

shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool.

"That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if, on such inquiry, it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory, or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place, in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council; and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an order or orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be

more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate, in writing, bearing date the 18th day of May, 1912, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby, in pursuance of the Pluralities Act, 1838, certify to Your Majesty in Council that it having appeared to us that the benefice of Milstead and the benefice of Kingsdown St. Catherine, both in the county of Kent and our diocese of Canterbury, might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice for ecclesiastical purposes only. We inquired into the circumstances of the case, and on such inquiry it appeared:—

"That the benefices are contiguous, and when united will not be of inconvenient extent.

"That the aggregate population of the parishes of Milstead and Kingsdown St. Catherine does not exceed 1,500 persons, the population of Milstead being 215 and that of Kingsdown St. Catherine being 56.

"That there is a church belonging to each of the said benefices, and that the churches are distant from each other less than two miles.

"That there is a house of residence belonging to each of the said benefices, and that the rectory house of Kingsdown St. Catherine is to be the residence house of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"That the net yearly value of the benefice of Milstead is one hundred and sixty-eight pounds or thereabouts, and the net annual value of Kingsdown St. Catherine is one hundred and twenty pounds or thereabouts.

"That the patronage of the benefice of Milstead belongs to Mrs. Mary Beatrice Julian and the patronage of the benefice of Kingsdown St. Catherine to Robert Leigh Pemberton, Esquire, and they both consent as such patrons to the union of the said two benefices.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consents to Your Majesty in Council we caused a statement in writing of the facts to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her or their hand or hands to us, the said Archbishop, against such union, and no such cause has been shown.

"The copies of the statement of facts and notice referred to and the consents in writing of the said Mary Beatrice Julian and of the said Robert Leigh Pemberton as such patrons as aforesaid are hereunto annexed.

"And We do hereby certify the inquiry, consents and matters aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and

issue an order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes; and We further recommend that the patronage of the said united benefice shall be vested in the said Mary Beatrice Julian and Robert Leigh Pemberton alternately, and that the first right of presentation after the said benefices shall come to be holden by the same incumbent shall belong to the patron or patrons for the time being of the said benefice of Milstead.

convenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto; such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts; and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council; and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.”

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Certificate in writing, bearing date the second day of October, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words following, that is to say:

We, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to your Majesty in Council:—

“The representation of the said Lord Bishop

of Lincoln, Our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the said patron and the copies of the representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

“ And We do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.”

WHEREAS by an Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of November, 1909, and made under and by virtue of the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, and the Church Building Act, 1839, it was ordered that the chapelries of Hanley William and Hanley Child, situate in the county of Worcester and diocese of Hereford, should be separated from the Rectory of Eastham in the said county of Worcester and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

And whereas doubts not foreseen at the time when the said Order of the 22nd November, 1909, was made have been raised by the changes effected by the said Order;

And whereas the Right Reverend John, Lord Bishop of Hereford, hath made a Representation to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

“ We, the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Hereford do hereby represent to Your Grace

“ That by an Order of His late Majesty in Council of the twenty-second day of November one thousand nine hundred and nine carrying into effect a scheme prepared by us pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the Act of Parliament 1 and 2 Victoria chapter 106 the chapelries of Hanley William and Hanley Child were separated from the Rectory of Eastham in the county of Worcester within our Diocese of Hereford and constituted into a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

“ That within the civil parish of Hanley Child is a detached portion of the ecclesiastical parish of Eastham known as Fulham's estate containing only one house and comprising according to the tithe apportionment 242a. 3r. 19p. and the tithe rentcharge arising out of the whole of the civil parishes of Hanley William and Hanley Child (including the Fulham's estate) formed part of the endowment of the said new parish.

“ That under the said scheme it was desired and intended that the new parish of Hanley William with Hanley Child should consist of the whole of the civil parishes of Hanley William and Hanley Child—including the Fulham's estate—but the said scheme by inadvertence provided only for the separation from Eastham of the chapelries of Hanley William and Hanley Child.

“ That the said Fulham's estate is distant from the Parish Church of Eastham aforesaid five miles and from the Parish Church of Hanley Child one and a half miles and it is therefore desired that a Supplemental Order of His Majesty in Council may be made in pursuance of section 27 of the hereinbefore mentioned Act by which it may be made clear that the whole of the civil parishes of Hanley William and Hanley Child including the said Fulham's estate is intended to be and shall be included in the said new parish of Hanley William with Hanley Child.

“ That by the said Order in Council the inhabitants of the parishes of Hanley William and Hanley Child were exonerated from all liability to repair the Parish Church of Eastham and made exclusively liable to the repairs respectively of the Churches of Hanley William and Hanley Child but no express provision was made for the repair of the chancel of the Parish Church of Hanley William the liability to repair such chancel having hitherto been borne by the rector of Eastham—the ecclesiastical chapelry of Hanley William having been formerly an independent parish with the rank of a rectory before being united to the rectory of Eastham.

“ It is now desired that the liability to repair

such chancel shall be transferred to the Incumbent of Hanley William with Hanley Child and that his title shall be that of 'Rector' instead of 'Perpetual Curate' to the intent that the rector of Eastham, having given up for the endowment of the new parish all tithe rentcharge arising in the said parishes of Hanley William and Hanley Child may be exonerated from all liability to repair the said chancel."

Regulations under Section 9 (1).

COUNTY OF BUCKINGHAM.

PARISH OF IVER.

To the County Council of Buckingham;—
And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

And whereas the county council of Buckingham having made application to Us to make a regulation in pursuance of the said sub-section putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising parts of certain roads situate within the parish of Iver, in the county of Buckingham, We directed a local inquiry to be held into the matter by one of Our inspectors, and the inquiry was held accordingly, and report has been made to Us thereon:

NOW THEREFORE, in pursuance of the powers given to Us in that behalf, We do, by this Our order, make the following regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—The provisions of sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Act with respect to the

driving of a motor car at a speed not exceeding ten miles per hour shall apply and have effect within the limits comprising the parts of roads within the parish of Iver which are specified in the Schedule hereto.

ARTICLE II.—These regulations shall come into operation on the seventeenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

SCHEDULE.

So much of the road from Slough to Uxbridge, passing through Iver, as extends from a point in the road opposite the entrance to Lea Farm to a point in the road 50 yards east of "The Swan" at Church Corner.

So much of the road leading to Iver Heath as extends for a distance 233 yards from its junction with the aforesaid road at Morton's Corner.

**BOROUGH OF ROCHDALE.
TRAMWAYS.**

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough of Rochdale did at their meeting on the sixth day of February, 1913, make the following bye-laws:—

**ROCHDALE CORPORATION
TRAMWAYS.**

BYE-LAWS made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Rochdale, under and in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Rochdale Corporation Act,

1908, and section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, or otherwise by law, at a meeting of the Council of the said borough, held on the sixth day of February, 1913.

INTERPRETATION.

1. Throughout these bye-laws—

The word "Corporation" means Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Rochdale;

The word "tramways" means the tramway system belonging to and worked by the Corporation, whether within the borough of Rochdale or any other borough or district;

The word "car" means any tramcar or carriage belonging to the Corporation and used on the tramways for the conveyance of passengers;

The word "motorman" means any officer or servant of the Corporation driving or helping to drive a car;

The word "conductor" means any officer or servant of the Corporation having charge of or helping in the charge of a car;

APPLICATION OF BYE-LAWS.

2. The bye-laws hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to every car run upon the tramways for the conveyance of passengers, and to all places with respect to which the Corporation have power to make bye-laws or regulations.

PERSONS PROHIBITED FROM TRAVELLING, ETC.

3. (a) No person suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder shall enter, mount, or travel, or attempt to enter, mount, or travel on any car, and no person being in charge of a person suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder shall permit such sufferer to enter, mount, or travel on any car.

(b) A conductor shall not allow any person suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder to enter, mount, or travel on any car.

4. (a) Any person who is in a state of intoxication shall not be allowed in or on any car or in or on any tramway waiting room or premises belonging to the Corporation, and used in connection with the tramways.

(b) No person in a state of intoxication shall remain in or on any car or in or on any tramway waiting room or premises belonging to the Corporation, and used in connection with the tramways, after having been requested by a duly authorised officer or servant of the Corporation to leave such car, waiting room or premises, and if any such person shall remain in or on any such car, waiting room or premises, after having been requested to leave as aforesaid, he may be removed therefrom by or under the direction of such officer or servant.

(c) Any person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of the car, soil, injure or damage the seats, linings, curtains or cushions of any car or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or any person who, in the opinion of a duly

authorised officer or servant of the Corporation, might for any reason be offensive to any passenger or to any person lawfully using any tramway waiting room, or premises belonging to the Corporation and used in connection with the tramways, shall not be entitled to enter, mount or remain in or upon any car or to enter or remain in or on any such waiting room or premises, and may be prevented from entering, mounting or remaining in or upon any car or from entering or remaining in or on such waiting room or premises, and shall not enter, mount, or remain in or upon any car, or enter or remain in or on any such waiting room or premises after having been requested not to do so by any such officer or servant, and if found in or upon any car or in or on any such waiting room or premises shall, on the request of any such officer or servant, leave the car or such waiting room or premises upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned: provided that on cars specially run for artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers, no person shall be prevented from entering or remaining in or on a car under the provisions of this bye-law, on the ground of the condition of his dress or clothing, if such condition is solely due to the nature of his employment.

(d) A conductor or a person in charge of a tramway waiting room or premises belonging to the Corporation and used in connection with the tramways shall for the purposes of this bye-law be deemed to be a duly authorised servant of the Corporation.

OBJECTIONABLE CONDUCT.

5. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language, or conduct himself offensively whilst in or upon any car, or in or on any tramway waiting room or premises used in connection with the tramways, or spit or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any car or such waiting room or premises, or in any way wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger or of any person lawfully using any such waiting room or premises.

6. No person shall sing, play or perform upon any musical instrument, or play any game, or gamble, or deposit remnants of food or fruit in or upon any car, or in or on any tramway waiting room or premises used in connection with the tramways.

7. No person (other than a duly authorised servant of the Corporation) shall distribute advertisements, pamphlets, notices, handbills, or tracts of any kind, or beg or collect money, alms or subscriptions, or sell or attempt to sell any article in or upon any car, or in or on any tramway waiting room or premises used in connection with the tramways.

8. No person shall smoke or carry any lighted pipe, cigar or cigarette inside a car or any compartment of a car not especially provided for that purpose, or in any tramway waiting room.

Dogs.

9. (a) No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any car, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the

conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers.

(b) No person shall take a dog or other animal into or upon any car except by permission of the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or found in or on any car, shall be removed from the car by the person in charge of such dog or other animal immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

(c) No dog shall be allowed in or taken into any tramway waiting room.

DANGEROUS OR OFFENSIVE ARTICLES, &c.

10. No person shall enter, mount, or travel in or on any car with loaded firearms, or with any article, instrument, implement, material or substance which may be dangerous or offensive to any passenger.

DAMAGING CARS.

11. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil or damage the seats, cushions, curtains or linings, or remove or deface any number plate, or printed or other notice, in or on any car, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any car. And any person acting in contravention of this bye-law shall be liable, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws, for the amount of any damage so done.

TRAVELLING ON STEPS, &c.

12. No passenger or other person, not being an officer or servant of the Corporation acting in the performance of his duty, shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any car, or stand on the roof, or sit on the outside rails, buffers or guards of any car, or, except by the express permission of the conductor first obtained, stand on the lower deck of any car.

13. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any car, and no person shall hold or hang on by any part of any car, or (except as aforesaid) travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

ENTERING OR LEAVING CARS.

14. (a) Every person shall enter, mount, or depart from a car by the step of the hindmost or conductor's platform, and not otherwise, unless so directed by the conductor.

(b) When a car stops no person shall board the car until all passengers desiring to alight therefrom shall have done so.

(c) Provided that the foregoing provisions of this bye-law shall not apply to any car when stationary at The Butts or South Parade, or at any terminus.

(d) Every person entering, mounting, or departing from a car when stationary at The Butts or South Parade, or at any terminus

shall enter, mount, or depart from such car by such platform as shall be specified in any regulations made by the Corporation in that behalf.

(e) The expression "terminus" as used in the foregoing provisions of this bye-law shall mean either a rail terminus or (as respects any length of tramway consisting of single line and not being a rail terminus) any point on such length of tramway which may be fixed by the Corporation as a terminus for the purposes of any service of cars run thereover.

15. No person shall enter, mount or leave, or attempt to enter, mount or leave any car whilst in motion.

16. Any person leaving a car shall be deemed to have completed his journey.

CARS CONTAINING FULL NUMBER.

17. When any car contains on the lower deck thereof the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation, according to the notice thereof attached to the car, is provided on such lower deck, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain thereon, except by the express permission of the conductor first obtained.

When a car contains, on the upper deck thereof, the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation, according to the notice thereof attached to the car, is provided, on such upper deck, no person beyond such number shall enter, mount, or remain thereon.

PAYMENT OF FARES.

18. (a) Every passenger shall upon demand pay to the conductor or other servant of the Corporation acting in the performance of his duty the fare legally payable for the journey.

(b) No child under three years of age, who is sitting on the lap of a passenger, shall be liable to pay a fare.

TICKETS.

19. (a) A passenger shall on payment of his fare be entitled to, and may require the conductor to furnish him with a ticket, indicating the amount of fare paid by him in respect of the journey.

(b) Every passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do by the conductor or other servant of the Corporation acting in the performance of his duty, and shall also when required so to do either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally payable for the distance or stage travelled over by such passenger.

(c) Any ticket for the time being issued by the Corporation in respect of a fare shall only be available for the car on or for which it is issued (except in the case of return, transfer or season tickets), and no passenger shall (except as expressly provided for by these bye-laws) be entitled to leave any car for any

purpose whatever at any stage and resume his journey by a different car from that on or for which such ticket was issued without payment of a fresh fare from the point at which the passenger entered the second or other car.

(d) Tickets are not transferable.

(e) Return, transfer, or season tickets shall only be available if used in accordance with the conditions upon which the same are issued.

(f) No passenger shall wilfully alter or deface his ticket so as to render the number or any material portion thereof illegible.

(g) No passenger shall use or attempt to use a ticket on any car or on any day for which such ticket is not available, or use a ticket which has already been used on a previous journey, or otherwise than in accordance with the conditions upon which it is issued.

WORKMEN'S TICKETS.

20. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Corporation or to tramways, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics or daily labourers.

DISABLED CARS.

21. (a) If at any time a car becomes disabled, or in any way injured, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall upon the request of the conductor leave the same, and if such passengers have paid their fares they shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid, but shall have the right to complete their journey by the next available car.

(b) No person shall, except with the leave of the conductor, enter a disabled or injured car.

INTERFERENCE WITH OFFICERS, SIGNALS; &C.

22. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Corporation in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any tramway or any car, tramway waiting room or premises belonging to the Corporation and used in connection with the tramways.

23. No person other than the conductor or motorman shall signal a car to start, or shall change or remove the route indicators or destination boards or interfere with the controllers, brakes, lights, ventilators, trolley cord or any part of a car or its equipment, or without reasonable cause signal a car to stop.

ENFORCEMENT OF BYE-LAWS.

24. Every conductor and motorman shall to the best of his ability enforce these bye-laws and prevent the breach thereof, and if any such conductor or motorman fails to enforce the same as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach thereof.

PENALTY.

25. Any person infringing any of the foregoing bye-laws shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding forty shillings, and in case of a continuing offence to a penalty of not exceeding ten shillings, in addition to the first-mentioned penalty, for every day during which such offence continues.

REMOVAL OF PASSENGERS COMMITTING OFFENCES.

26. Any person who shall commit, whilst in or on any car, any breach of these bye-laws, shall, if the offence is continued, be liable in addition to incurring the penalty hereinbefore provided, to be immediately removed from the car by or under the direction of the conductor, and if such person shall have paid his fare, he shall not be entitled to claim its return.

EXHIBITION OF BYE-LAWS.

27. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each car in use a printed copy of these bye-laws.

REPEAL OF BYE-LAWS.

28. The bye-laws made by the Corporation on the 2nd July, 1903, under section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, are hereby repealed.

COMMENCEMENT OF BYE-LAWS.

29. These bye-laws shall come into force on the first day of May, 1913.
