perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Peckleton, in the county of Leicester and in the diocese of

Peterborough.
"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Peckleton is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in Rowland Story, of 15, Wadham Gardens, South Hampstead, in the county of London,

And whereas the said Rowland Story is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Peckleton now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested the Honourable and Right Reverend Edward Carr, now Bishop of the said diocese of Peterborough, and his successors in the same Bishoprick.

"And whereas the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which, by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited, or by some or one of them, is made necessary, he, the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Peckleton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the

parish of Peckleton.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Rowland Story (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme), and with the consent of the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Peckleton now vested in him, the said Rowland Story as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors in the same Bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, and his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them

or of any other Act of Parliament.'

And whereas the said scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:
Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Peterborough.

## PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter eighty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for apportioning the income of the united benefice (being a rectory and vicarage) of Holtby with Warthill, in the county of York and in the diocese of York, between that united benefice and a certain other united benefice, namely, the united benefice (being a rectory and vicarage) of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley, which said last named benefice is situate in the said county of York and in the said diocese of York

"Whereas Your Majesty in right of the Crown and the Archbishop of York in right of his See are the alternate patrons of the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill and also of the said benefice of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley, Your Majesty's alternate right of patronage being exercised by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain on Your Majesty's

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Upper Helmsley with Gate Helmsley is at present insufficiently endowed; and that the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill has endowments of such an amount as that after the charge hereinafter recommended and proposed to be made shall have been placed upon the same endowments, the said benefice of Holtby with Warthill will still be sufficiently endowed...

"And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of the said diocese of York, has represented to us, and we are of opinion, that it is desirable that
