ordered, as follows:

1. Paragraphs (iv.) and (viii.) of Article 3 (Provisions as to Vessels carrying Animals) of the Animals (Transit and General) Order of 1912 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") shall be read and have effect as if the first day of July, nineteen hundred and thirteen, were therein substituted for the first day of January, nineteen hundred and thirteen, as the date of application of the provisions of those paragraphs to vessels which on the eighteenth day of March, eighteen hundred and ninety-five, were regularly employed in conveying animals.

2. Paragraph (xii.) (Food and Water) of Article 3 of the principal Order shall in respect of animals carried before the first day of July, nineteen hundred and thirteen, be read and have effect as if the word "eighteen" were therein substituted for the word "twelve."

HEYSHAM IRISH ANIMALS LANDING PLACE ORDER OF 1913.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do hereby define the following part of the Port of Heysham as a Landing Place for Irish animals; that is to say:

All that space situate at Heysham, in the administrative county of Lancaster, in the occupation of the Midland Railway Company, which is coloured pink on the plan sealed by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries for the

purposes of this Order, and deposited at the office of the Board.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of a benefaction of a capital sum of three hundred pounds sterling, which has been paid to us in favour of the consolidated chapelry and benefice (hereinafter called the benefice of Saint Donat, Abercynon, in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff), do hereby, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eleven, sections five and eleven, grant and appropriate out of our common fund to the said benefice of Saint Donat, Abercynon, to meet such benefaction one other capital sum of three hundred pounds, to be applicable towards defraying the cost of providing a parsonage or house of residence for the said benefice according to plans and a specification approved or to be approved by us, such capital sum, or the balance thereof unapplied to such purpose, to remain in the meantime in our hands at interest after the rate of two pounds and ten shillings per centum per annum, and such interest to be paid to the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Saint Donat, Abercynon.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set cur common seal, this twenty-seventh day of February, in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

WE, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in consideration of a benefaction of a capital sum of two hundred pounds sterling, which has been paid to us in favour of the vicarage of All Saints. Bishopswood, situate partly in the county of Hereford and partly in the county of Gloucester and wholly in the diocese of Hereford, and in respect of which we have agreed to pay to the Incumbent of the same vicarage and to his successors a yearly sum of six pounds, do hereby, in pursuance of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eleven, section five, grant out of our common fund to the said vicarage of All Saints. Bishopswood, to meet such benefaction one other capital sum of two hundred pounds, in respect of which, so long as the same capital sum or any part thereof shall remain in our
