VERDICT.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn on the fourth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, before the King's Remembrancer, at Goldsmiths' Hall, in the City of London, have made the Assays and Trials of His Majesty's Gold coins in the Pyx of the and Silver Royal Mint in London, which, according to accounts produced by the Officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint from the first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins, both of Gold and Silver, in each packet produced to us, corresponded with the number which the Officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took one coin from each of such packets of Gold coins, amounting altogether to one hundred and fifty-three Sovereigns or Twenty-shilling pieces, and to thirty-two Half-Sovereigns or Ten-shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, and ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight prescribed in the First Schedule to the Coinage Act, 1870, as amended by the Coinage Act, 1891.
