alternate patron, in right of his See, of the vicarage of the said new parish of Great Marsden, with the consent of the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, the First Lord of Your Majesty's Treasury, acting on behalf of Your Majesty as the other alternate patron of the said vicarage of the new parish of Great Marsden (in testimony whereof they have re-spectively signed and sealed this representation), and with the consent of "The Trustees of the Estates devised by William Hulme, Esquire," as the patrons of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne, (in testimony whereof they, the said trustees, have hereunto affixed their common seal), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Great Marsden and of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of the Holy Trinity, Colne, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Colne.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Colne, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the new parish (sometime district) of Great Marsden and of the parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne, both in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester which, taken together, are bounded upon the southwest by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Philip, Nelson, upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Thomas, Barrowford, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north, upon the north-east, upon the south-east, and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Barrowford, from the said parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne, at the point at or near the south-western corner of the Bridge which carries Barrowford-road across the stream known as Wanless Water, where the said boundary turns westward along the southern side of Barrow-ford-road, and extending thence first northward to the middle of Barrowford-road and then south-eastward along the middle of such road (thereby crossing the said bridge) for a distance in all of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the roadway leading to Greenfield, and extending thence first southwestward and thence south-eastward along the middle of such roadway for a distance of nineteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the roadway leading to Greenfield House, and extending thence south-eastward along the

middle of such roadway for a distance of fifteen yards or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such roadway across the stream flowing past Bunker's Hill Mill, and extending thence first north-eastward and then eastward along the middle of such stream for a distance of twenty-four chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where it reaches the north-western corner of Bunker's Hill Mill, and extending thence in a straight line due east for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to the middle of the Clifton, Accrington and Colne Line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, and extending thence first south-eastward and then southward along the middle of such line of railway for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway across the river known as Colne Water, and extending thence first north-eastward, then eastward, then south-eastward, and then again eastward along the middle of Colne Water for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Shaw-street into Daisy-street across Colne Water, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of such road (thereby following in part the middle of such bridge) for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with Green-road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Green-road for a distance of eight yards or thereabouts to its junction with Daisy-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of Daisy-street for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Atkinson-street, and extending thence westward along the middle of Atkinson-street for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Hagg-street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Hagg-street for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its present southern end, and extending thence south-eastward in a straight line for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the north-western corner of the wall forming the boundary of the Spring Gardens Mill Water Reservoirs, and extending thence southward along the wall forming the western boundary of the said reservoirs and in a straight line in continuation thereof (thereby crossing Knotts-lane) for a distance, in all, of four chains or thereabouts to the boundary of the municipal borough of Colne upon the south-western side of Knotts-lane, and extending thence first north-westward and then generally south - westward along boundary for a distance of one mile and ten chains or thereabouts to the middle of the said Clifton, Accrington and Colne Line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Great Marsden from the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Philip, Nelson."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith
