A PROCLAMATION

FOR A BANK HOLIDAY.

GEORGE R.I.

WE, considering that it is desirable that Monday, the fourteenth day of July next, should be observed as a Bank Holiday in the City of Manchester and the County Borough of Salford, and in pursuance of the provisions of "The Bank Holidays Act, 1871," do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Act aforesaid, appoint Monday, the fourteenth day of July next, as a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday throughout the City of Manchester and the County Borough of Salford, under and in accordance with the said Act, and We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, command the said day to be so observed, and all Our loving Subjects to order themselves accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this twenty-fourth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and in the Fourth year of Our Reign.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by section 16 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case, and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the

hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop against such union, and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only, and it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the tenth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, in the words following:

"We, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council-

"That the Right Reverend George Wynd-ham, Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the rectory of Seavington St. Michael and the perpetual curacy of Seavington St. Mary, both in the county of Somerset, having represented unto us that the said benefices are contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate popudoes not exceed fifteen hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value five hundred pounds, might, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made, and would not be of inconvenient extent, and that the Right Honourable William John Lydston, Earl Poulett, being the patron or person entitled to present to the rectory of Seavington St. Michael (the same being now vacant), and the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Bristol, being the patrons or persons entitled to present to the perpetual curacy of Seavington St. Mary (if the same were now vacant), have consented to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consents to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands to us, the said Archbishop, and no such cause has been shown.

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consents in writing of the said patrons and the copies of the Representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed. And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice, with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"And we further recommend that the patronage of the said united benefice shall be vested in the said Right Honourable William John Lydston, Earl Poulett, and the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Bristol alternately, and that the first right of presentation after the said benefices shall come to be holden by the same Incumbent shall belong to the said Right Honourable William John Lydston, Earl Poulett, and his successors in title.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the rectory of Seavington Saint Michael, situate in the county of Somerset and diocese of Bath and Wells, and the perpetual curacy of Seavington Saint Mary, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice, with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the said benefices, after the same shall be united into one benefice, and come to be holden by the same Incumbent, from time to time as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows, that is to say:—The right of presentation shall be exercised by the said Right Honourable William John Lydston, Earl Poulett, and his successors in title, and the said Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Bristol and their successors alternately, and the first turn or right of presentation shall belong to and be exercised by the said Right Honourable William John Lydston, Earl Poulett, and his successors in title.

HEREAS by section 21 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas from the increase of popula-Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting

tion, or from other circumstances, it may be expedient that two or more benefices which have been heretofore united, or which may be hereafter united, under the provisions of this Act should be disunited," it is, amongst other things, enacted "that when two or more benefices shall have been united, or may be hereafter united into one benefice, and with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop of the Province, that one or more of the benefices within his diocese, of which such united benefice shall consist, may be separated therefrom with advantage to the interests of religion, the said Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances of the case, and, if on such inquiry, it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully dissolved, so far as respects such benefice or benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before certifying such inquiry to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese a statement in writing of the facts, and in all other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church or in some public and conspicuous place in each of the benefices forming part of the united benefice, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hands to the said Archbishop against any such disunion, and, if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent, when the patron's consent is necessary, to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty to issue an Order for separating such last-mentioned benefice, or benefices, from such united benefice, and for declaring the rights of patronage of the several patrons, if there be more than one patron, and such Order shall be registered in the Registry of the diocese to which such united benefice shall belong, which Order the registrar of such diocese, immediately on the receipt thereof, is hereby required to register accordingly, and thereupon immediately, if such united benefice shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or benefices so proposed to be separated from such united benefice, but in all other respects shall remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward such last-mentioned benefice or benefices shall be and be deemed and taken to be a separate and distinct benefice or benefices to all intents and purposes whatever as if no such union had taken place, and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may according to the terms of such Order present or nominate thereto respectively, and so, from time to time, upon each and every avoidance of the same: Provided always, that no benefices which have been united for more than sixty years before the passing of this Act shall be disunited without the consent in writing of the patron or patrons thereof."

And whereas by section 23 of the said Act it is further enacted that "whenever two or more benefices which have at any time been united into one benefice shall be disunited and become separate benefices under the provisions of this Act, whether the Order for disunion shall extend to the whole number of benefices

or more of such benefices only, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, on the recommendation of the Archbishop of the Province with the consent of the petron or patrons of such benefices respectively (such consent to be signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons) to assign and attach such portion of the glebe lands, tithes, moduses, rent-charges, or other endowments or emoluments belonging to or arising or accruing within the limits of such united benefice to each of such benefices respectively as to His Majesty in Council shall seem fit notwithstanding such proportion of glebe lands, tithes, rentcharges, moduses, or other endowments or emoluments, or any part thereof, may not arise or accrue within the limits of the benefice to which the same shall be so assigned and attached as aforesaid, or may not have be-longed thereto, and also to divide and apportion between such benefices all such charges and outgoings as before the disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole united benefice.'

And whereas the Right Reverend Charles John, Lord Bishop of Chichester, hath made a Representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:

"I, Charles John, by divine permission Lord Bishop of Chichester, do hereby represent to your Grace, that it appears to me that the disunion of the United Vicarages of Ferring, Kingston, and East Preston, in the county of Sussex and my diocese of Chichester, by the separation of the said Vicarage of Ferring from the said Vicarage of East Preston with Kingston may be made with advantage to the interests of religion.'

And whereas on the 28th day of October, 1911, the said Archbishop inquired into the circumstances of the case:

And whereas on the 12th day of February, 1913, the said Archbiship certified to His Majesty in Council as follows, that is to say:-

"We, the undersigned Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council,

"That the Right Reverend Charles John, Lord Bishop of Chichester, as Bishop of the diocese in which is situate the united benefice, consisting of the Vicarage of Ferring and the Vicarage of East Preston with Kingston, in the county of Sussex, having represented unto us that the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the Vicarage of Ferring from the Vicarage of East Preston with Kingston may be made with advantage to the interests of religion, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might usefully be dissolved, and that the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of the Holy Trinity of Chichester being the patrons or persons entitled to present to the Vicarage of Ferring and the Vicarage of East Preston with Kingston if the same were now vacant consent to the proposed disunion.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation of the said of which such united benefice consisted or to one | Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer doors of each of the Parish churches of Ferring and East Preston, and to the door of a certain barn in the Parish of Kingston in the occupation of J. A. S. Candy, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they might within such six weeks shew cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands to us, the said Archbishop, against such disunion, and no sufficient cause has been shewn.

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Chichester, our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consent in writing of the patrons of the said united benefice, and the copies of the Representation and notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the Vicarage of Ferring from the Vicarage of East Preston with Kingston so as to constitute each of such benefices a separate benefice with cure of souls for Ecclesiastical purposes only, and we re-commend that after the said disunion shall have been carried into effect the benefice of Ferring and the benefice of East Preston with Kingston shall respectively bear, pay, and discharge all the outgoings which are charged upon the income which they shall respectively hold and enjoy, and that the endowment to be appropriated to the benefice of Ferring shall consist of the income of £1,474 5s. 2d. India Stock, and of £46 4s. 2d. like Stock in the hands of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Queen Anne's Bounty respectively, which shall henceforth be allocated and paid to the Incumbent of Ferring for the time being, and that the endowment to be appropriated to the benefice of East Preston with Kingston shall consist of a grant of one hundred and twenty pounds hitherto paid by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to the united bene-fice of Ferring and East Preston with Kingston, which the said Commissioners intend after the said disunion shall have been carried into effect, to permanently grant to the benefice of East Preston with Kingston.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council by and with the advice of his said Council is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said united benefice, consisting of the Vicarage of Ferring and the Vicarage of East Preston with Kingston, situate in the county of Sussex and diocese of Chichester, shall be disunited by separating the said Vicarage of Ferring from the said Vicarage of East Preston with Kingston.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of his said Council, is further pleased, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop, with the consent of the patrons of the said benefices, to order as it is hereby ordered that, after the said disunion shall have been carried into effect, the benefice of Ferring and the benefice of East Preston with Kingston shall respectively bear, pay, and discharge all the outgoings which are charged upon the income which they shall respectively hold and enjoy, and that the endowment to be appropriated to

the said benefice of Ferring shall consist of the income of £1,474 5s. 2d. India Stock and of £46 4s. 2d. like Stock in the hands of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Queen Anne's Bounty respectively, which shall henceforth be allocated and paid to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Ferring for the time being, and that the endowment to be appropriated to the said benefice of East Preston with Kingston shall consist of a grant of £120, hitherto paid by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to the aforesaid united benefice of Ferring and East Preston with Kingston.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Archibald, Lord Bishop of Exeter, hath represented in a writing, dated the 10th day of January, 1913, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

- "We Archibald by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Exeter do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—
- "1. That there is in the county of Devon and our diocese of Exeter the ancient parish of Lydford out of which by an Order of His Majesty in Council dated the eleventh of October one thousand nine hundred and twelve the new parish of Princetown has been formed. Before the formation of the said new parish the parish of Lydford contained 56,333 acres but as a very large part of this was moorland the parish was sparsely populated. The population of the present parish of Lydford is estimated to be about 234 by the Census of 1911. The net annual value of the benefice is £210 and there is a house of residence.
- "2. That there are contiguous to parts of the present parish of Lydford the parishes of Brentor Peter Tavy and Bridestowe all in the said county of Devon and diocese of Exeter. The populations of the last named three parishes according to the Census of 1911 are as follows: Brentor 613 Peter Tavy 285 and Bridestowe 525.
- "3. That the Incumbents and Patrons of the above named benefices are as follows: The Rector of the said parish of Lydford is the Reverend George Smith Thorpe and the Patron thereof is His Royal Highness The Duke of Cornwall, the said parish of Brentor is at present vacant, the Patron thereof is the Lord Bishop of Exeter, the Rector of the said parish of Peter Tavy is the Reverend Augustine Standish Lester and the patronage thereof is vested in the Trustees of the Guild of All Souls and the Rector of the said parish of Bridestowe is the Reverend John Loveband Francis and the Patron thereof is the Lord Bishop of Exeter.
- "4. That the lands delineated on the plan hereto annexed surrounded with a brown line constitute a portion of the present parish of Lydford, the lands surrounded with a blue line on the said plan form part of the parish of Brentor, the lands surrounded with a green line on the said plan form part of the parish of Peter Tavy and the lands surrounded with a red line on the said plan form part of the parish of Bridestowe. The said portions of the parishes of Brentor Peter Tavy and Bridestowe are hereafter respectively called 'The Brentor lands' 'The Peter Tavy lands' and 'The Bridestowe lands.'
- "5. That the Brentor lands contain 27 houses inhabited by about 100 persons, the house on the Brentor lands nearest to the parish church of Brentor is distant therefrom about four miles by the nearest road and distant from the parish church of Lydford about one and a quarter miles by the nearest road, the house on the Peter Tavy lands nearest to the parish church of Peter Tavy is distant therefrom about eight miles by the nearest road and distant from the parish church of

- Lydford about one and a half miles by the nearest road, the house on the Bridestowe lands nearest to the parish church of Bridestowe is distant therefrom about three miles by the nearest road and distant from the parish church of Lydford about two miles by the nearest road. The Peter Tavy lands contain four houses inhabited by about eighteen persons. The Bridestowe lands contain eleven houses inhabited by about forty persons.
- "6. That the parishioners inhabiting the Brentor lands the Peter Tavy lands and the Bridestowe lands have for the most part for many years attended Lydford Parish Church for all the purposes of the church's ministrations.
- "7. That the tithe rent charge payable in respect of the Brentor lands is £32 ls. 5d. the tithe rent charge payable in respect of the Peter Tavy lands is £11 9s. 0d. per annum and the tithe rent charge payable in respect of the Bridestowe lands is £39 ls. 6½d. per annum.
- "8. That it appears to us and we hereby represent to your Grace that under the circumstances hereinbefore stated it would be advantageous that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria chapter 106 the Brentor lands the Peter Tavy lands and the Bridestowe lands should be separated from the parishes of which they now respectively form parts and should be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Lydford.
- "9. That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act we have prepared the following Scheme in writing annexed to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to us that the alteration above proposed may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Patrons of the said benefices and of the said respective Incumbents of the said benefices of Lydford Peter Tavy and Bridestowe (the benefice of Brentor being now void) to the intent that if your Grace shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied with such Scheme you may certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council.''

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop is as follows:—

"SCHEME. -

"That the Brentor lands, the Peter Tavy lands and the Bridestowe lands shall be separated from the parishes of which they respectively form parts and be annexed for all ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Lydford.

"That the tithe rent charge payable in respect of the Brentor lands, the Peter Tavy lands and the Bridestowe lands shall continue to be paid to the Incumbents of the parishes of Brentor Peter Tavy and Bridestowe respectively and that the fees for marriages churchings burials and all other ecclesiastical offices performed with respect to persons inhabiting the Brentor lands, the Peter Tavy lands and

the Bridestowe lands respectively and all (if any) ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising within the said lands respectively shall belong to the Rector of the said parish of Lydford and that the Rector of the said rectory of Lydford shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the Brentor lands, the Peter Tavy lands and the Bridestowe lands respectively.

"That the inhabitants of the said Brentor lands Peter Tavy lands and Bridestowe lands shall be discharged from all liability for the maintenance of the churches of the said parishes of Brentor, Peter Tavy and Bridestowe respectively and shall be liable to contribute with the inhabitants of the said present parish of Lydford to the maintenance of the said parish church of Lydford."

And whereas His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, Duke of Cornwall, as patron, and the Reverend George Smith Thorpe as Incumbent, of the said rectory of Lydford; the said Archibald, Lord Bishop of Exeter, as patron of the said vicarage of Brentor; Walter Plimpton, Henry William Hill, Guilbert Edward Wyndham Malet, as patrons, and the Reverend Augustine Standish Lester, as Incumbent, of the said rectory of Peter Tavy; and the said Lord Bishop of Exeter as patron, and the Reverend John Loveband Francis, as Incumbent, of the said rectory of Bridestowe, have signed the Consent following:—

"CONSENTS.

"We Edward Prince of Wales Duke of Cornwall Patron of the rectory of Lydford and I the Reverend George Smith Thorpe Clerk Rector of the said rectory and We Archibald Lord Bishop of Exeter Patron of the vicarage of Brentor and We Walter Plimpton of 6 Crescent Road, South Norwood Park, Surrey Gentleman Henry William Hill of 9 Bloomfield Terrace, Pimlico Gentleman and Guilbert Edward Wyndham Malet, of 52 Penywern Road, Earl's Court, Major R.H.A. (retired) Patrons of the said rectory of Peter Tavy and I Augustine Standish Lester Clerk Rector of the said rectory of Peter Tavy and We Archibald Lord Bishop of Exeter Patron of the rectory of Bridestowe and I John Loveband Francis Rector of the said parish of Bridestowe do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our consent to the Scheme above proposed for separating the Brentor lands the Peter Tavy lands and the Bridestowe lands from the parishes of which they respectively form parts and annexing them for all ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Lydford and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"I the Reverend Alfred Rand Overy Apps having been licensed to the perpetual curacy of the parish church of Brent Tor in the diocese of Exeter since a Scheme for the annexation of a portion of the said parish of Brent Tor to the parish of Lydford was signed by the Lord Bishop of Exeter hereby declare that I consent to the said Scheme and to every matter and thing therein contained.

And whereas the said Scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said Scheme, hath certified the same and the Consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his Report dated the 24th day of April, 1913, which said Report is in the words and figures following:—

"We the undersigned Randall Thomas Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby represent to Your Majesty in Council—

"That the Right Reverend Archibald Lord Bishop of Exeter has represented unto Us (amongst other things)—

"That there is in the county of Devon and his diocese of Exeter the parish of Lydford containing a population of 234 or thereabouts.

"That there are also in the same county and diocese and contiguous to parts of the said parish of Lydford the parishes of Brentor, Peter Tavy and Bridestowe. The population of the last named three parishes is respectively 613, 285 and 525 or thereabouts.

"That the lands delineated in the plan (annexed to the Bishop's Scheme appended hereto) surrounded with a brown line constitute a portion of the said parish of Lydford, the lands surrounded with a blue line form part of the said parish of Brentor, the lands surrounded with a green line form part of the said parish of Peter Tavy and the lands surrounded with a red line form part of the said parish of Bridestowe and that the said portions of the parishes of Brentor, Peter Tavy and Bridestowe are respectively described as 'The Brentor Lands' 'The Peter Tavy Lands' and 'The Bridestowe Lands.'

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the Pluralities Act 1838 the Brentor Lands the Peter Tavy Lands and the Bridestowe Lands may be advantageously separated from the parishes of which they now respectively form part and annexed to the said parish of Lydford to which they are contiguous.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the said Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which Scheme together with the Consents thereto in writing of His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales Duke of Cornwall the Patron or person entitled to present to the rectory of Lydford, George Smith Thorpe Rector of the said rectory the said Archibald Lord Bishop of Exeter by virtue of his

Bishopric the Patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Brentor, Alfred Rand Overy Apps Vicar of the said vicarage, Walter Plimpton, Henry William Hill, Guilbert Edward Wyndham Malet the Patrons or persons entitled to present to the rectory of Peter Tavy, Augustine Standish Lester Rector of the said rectory the said Lord Bishop of Exeter by virtue of his Bishopric the Patron or person entitled to present to the rectory of Bridestowe and John Loveband Francis Rector of the said rectory has been transmitted to Us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And We the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said Scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

WHEREAS by an Order of Her Majesty
Queen Victoria in Council, bearing
date the 24th day of November, 1891, Her
Majesty's Supreme Court of the Colony of
Sierra Leone was constituted a Court of Record
to receive, hear, and determine Appeals from
the Supreme Court of the Colony of the
Gambia:

And whereas it is expedient to make further and other provisions for facilitating such Appeals as aforesaid:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers vested in His Majesty in Council by the British Settlements Act, 1887, it is hereby ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, as follows:—

1. The Full Court of the Supreme Court of the Colony of Sierra Leone (hereinafter referred to as the Appeal Court) shall be, and it is hereby constituted a Court of Record to receive, hear, and determine Appeals from the Supreme Court of the Colony of the Gambia (hereinafter referred to as the Court of the Gambia).

2. Any person or persons against whom any sentence, judgment, decree, or order shall be given in the Court of Gambia may, subject to the conditions contained in the Rules regulating Appeals contained in the Appendix to this Order, and any amending or further Rules to be hereafter made as provided by this Order, appeal therefrom to the Appeal Court, which shall thereupon enquire into, hear, and decide all questions, whether of law or fact, arising upon any such Appeal.

The Court of the Gambia shall in all cases of appeal to the Appeal Court, execute and carry into immediate effect such judgments and orders as the Appeal Court shall make thereupon, in such manner as any original judgments or orders of the Court of the Gambia can or may be executed.

- 3. The Rules contained in the Appendix to this Order shall govern the conduct of Appeals both in the Court of the Gambia and the Appeal Court until they have been revoked, amended, or added to in the manner hereinafter provided.
- 4. The Appeal Court is hereby authorized and required from time to time to make and establish, either in addition to or in substitution for the Rules contained in the Appendix to this Order, such Rules, Orders, and Regulations as to it shall seem meet, touching and concerning all matters and things necessary for the proper conduct and despatch of business in Appeals to the said Appeal Court, whether in the Court of Gambia or in the Appeal Court, and whether before or after the final judgment of the Appeal Court, and all such Rules, Orders and Regulations, and also all Rules, Orders and Regulations contained in the Appendix to this Order, from time to time to revoke, alter, amend, or renew as occasion may require. Provided always, that all such Rules, Orders, and Regulations shall forthwith be transmitted by the President of the Appeal Court to the Governor of the Colony of Sierra Leone, to be by him transmitted to His Majesty, His heirs, and successors, and shall be subject to disallowance by His Majesty, His heirs and successors, but until so disallowed, shall have as full effect as if they had been contained in the Appendix to this Order in
- 5. Any person who feels himself aggrieved by any final judgment, sentence, decree, or order of the Appeal Court, on appeal, may, subject to the Rules, Regulations, limitations and conditions which, for the time being, shall be in force respecting Appeals to His Majesty, His heirs, and successors in Council from any judgment, sentence, decree, or order of the said Full Court of the Supreme Court of Sierra Leone, and subject to such other regulations and conditions as His Majesty, His heirs, and successors shall be pleased to direct, appeal to His Majesty, His heirs, and successors, in His or their Privy Council, against any such final judgment, sentence, decree, or order of the Appeal Court. The Court of the Gambia shall in all cases of appeal to His Majesty, His heirs, and successors in Council, execute and carry into immediate effect such judgments and orders as His Majesty, His

heirs, and successors shall make thereupon in such manner as any original judgments and orders of the said Court can or may be executed.

- 6. The said Order in Council of the 24th day of November, 1891 is hereby revoked, but such revocation shall not affect the validity of anything lawfully done thereunder, or revive any Order in Council revoked thereby.
- 7. All Rules and Regulations relating to the Supreme Court of the Gambia (save and except only Rules relating to Appeals therefrom to the said Appeal Court) which are in force when this Order in Council takes effect, may be repealed or altered by any Rules, Orders, or Regulations to be made under any Ordinance of the Colony of the Gambia, but shall continue in force until so altered or repealed.

APPENDIX.

RULES REGULATING APPEALS TO THE FULL COURT OF THE SUPREME COURT OF THE COLONY OF SIERBA LEONE FROM THE SUPREME COURT OF THE COLONY OF THE GAMBIA.

Where Appeal Lies.

1. Any party aggrieved by any decision of the Supreme Court of the Colony of the Gambia (hereinafter called the Court below) may apply to the Court below for leave to appeal to the Full Court of the Supreme Court of the Colony of Sierra Leone (hereinafter called the Appeal Court), and thereupon leave to appeal shall, subject to the limitations and conditions hereinafter contained be granted to the applicant, but not otherwise. Provided always that, in every final judgment, the Appeal Court may give leave to appeal on such terms as that Court thinks fit.

Interlocutory Orders.

2. The Court below shall not give leave to appeal from an interlocutory order, unless it shall consider such Appeal to be reasonable and proper, and in such case it shall transmit to the Appeal Court, along with the Record of Appeal, a brief statement of the grounds upon which the Appeal has been allowed. Any doubt which may arise as to what decrees or orders are final, and what are interlocutory, shall be determined by the Appeal Court.

Exparte Orders.

3. An Appeal does not lie from an order made "exparte." Any person aggrieved by such an order may apply to the Court by which it is made to vary or discharge it, and an Appeal lies from the decision on that application in like manner as from other orders or decisions.

Order as to Costs or by Consent.

4. No order as to costs only, or order made by consent of parties, shall be subject to any appeal, except by special leave of the Court below or the Appeal Court.

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Conditions of Appeal.

5. In no case shall leave to appeal be granted, unless within one month after his application for leave to appeal the Appellant shall have given security to the satisfaction of the Court below, in terms of the form of bond contained in the Schedule A hereto, for payment of all such costs as may be awarded to any Respondent by the Appeal Court and shall have paid into the Court below the amount of the expense of making up and transmission to the Appeal Court of the Record of Appeal, and shall have given notice of the Appeal to all parties directly affected by the Appeal and to such others as Respondents, as the Court below thinks fit to direct, and unless within 7 days after the expiration of such month he shall have filed a further application for leave to appeal.

Provided that where the conditions of appeal have not been perfected within such period as aforesaid, or where the Appeal shall for any reason have lapsed, or been abandoned, and the Appellant shall again make application for leave to appeal the Court may either refuse to grant leave or may impose any terms that it thinks proper, in addition to the terms above mentioned.

Limitation of Time for Appeals.

- 6.—(1.) After fourteen days from the date of an interlocutory order, application for leave to appeal shall not be entertained.
- (2.) After three months from the date of a final judgment, application for leave to appeal shall not be entertained by the Court below.
- (3.) After six months from the date of a final judgment, application for leave to appeal shall not be entertained by the Appeal Court: Provided that if there shall be no sitting of the Appeal Court within six months from the date of a final judgment, and notice to move the Appeal Court shall have been given within such period, the motion may be dealt with, and leave to appeal granted at the next sitting of the Appeal Court whenever the same may be held.

Execution.

7. An Appeal shall not operate as a stay of execution or of proceedings under the decision appealed from, except so far as the Court below or the Appeal Court may order; and no intermediate act or proceeding shall be invalidated, except so far as the Court below may direct.

Grounds of Appeal to be Filed.

- 8. The Appellant shall, within seven days after obtaining leave to appeal, file in the Court below the grounds of his appeal, and shall cause a copy of such grounds of appeal to be served on the Respondent.
- 9. On the Appellant failing to file such grounds of appeal within the prescribed time, unless the time for so doing shall have been extended by the Appeal Court or the Court below, he shall be deemed to have abandoned the appeal.

Appeal Court may Amend.

10. The Appellant may at any time, by leave of the Appeal Court, amend or add to the grounds of his Appeal.

Record of Appeal. .

11. On the expiration of fourteen days after leave to appeal has been given, the Court below shall, without the application of any party, make up the Record of Appeal, which shall consist of the Writ of Summons, the Pleadings (if any), a certified copy of all documents admitted as evidence or tendered as evidence and rejected, and of the Court's Notes of Evidence, and the Grounds of Appeal. The several pieces shall be consecutively numbered and fastened together, and, along with a list thereof, authenticated by the signature of the Judge of the Court below, shall be forthwith forwarded by that Court to the Registrar of the Appeal Court.

Appeal Case.

12. Along with the Record of Appeal the Court below shall transmit to the Appeal Court a case, which may be agreed on between the parties, but shall be settled by the Court. The case shall state the cause of action, the facts found by the Court, and the Court's determination thereon in point of law.

Original Documents.

13. The Court below shall not, except for some special cause, take upon itself the charge of transmission of original letters or documents produced in evidence. They shall be returned to the parties producing them, and they must be prepared to produce the originals, if required by the Appeal Court, before or at the hearing of the Appeal.

Control over Suit while Appeal pending.

14. Notwithstanding that the Record of Appeal has been transmitted to the Appeal Court, until the Appeal is disposed of, every application in the suit or matter shall be made to the Court below: Provided that after the sitting during which the Appeal is set down for hearing has commenced to be held, then the Appeal Court shall be in possession of the whole suit or matter as between the parties to the Appeal, and every application in the suit or matter shall be made to the Appeal Court and not to the Court below.

Additional Security.

15. The Appeal Court may, where requisite, require security for costs or for performance of the Orders to be made on Appeal, in addition to what the Court below has thought fit to direct, and may make any interim order or injunction which the Court below is authorized to make, and which may be necessary.

Notice to Parties in Interlocutory Appeals.

16. If the Appeal is from an interlocutory order, the Court shall not cause notice to be given to the parties of the day when the Appeal will be disposed of, unless under special circumstances it thinks fit to do so; but where a party to the Appeal notifies to the Court below his desire to attend, he shall be at liberty to do so, and to be heard, and shall be entitled to have not less than 21 days' notice through the Court below of the date of the Session of the Appeal Court at which the Appeal will be set down for hearing.

Notice in Appeals on Merits.

17. If the Appeal is from a final decision or Order after trial or hearing of any suit or

matter, the Registrar of the Appeal Court shall, after receiving the Record of Appeal, give not less than 21 days' notice through the Court below to the parties to the Appeal of the date of the commencement of the Session of the Appeal Court at which the Appeal will be set down for hearing.

Appearance of Parties.

18. The Appeal Court may, if it thinks fit, require the parties to an Appeal to appear personally before it on the hearing of the Appeal, or on any occasion pending the Appeal; otherwise personal appearance shall not be obligatory.

Evidence.

19. It is not open as of right to any party to an Appeal to adduce new evidence in support of his original case; but for the furtherance of justice the Appeal Court may, where it thinks fit, allow or require new evidence to be adduced. A party may, by leave of the Court, allege any facts essential to the issue that have come to his knowledge after the decision of the Court below, and adduce evidence in support of such allegations.

No Interlocutory Order to prejudice the Decision on Appeal.

20. No interlocutory order from which there has been no Appeal shall operate so as to bar or prejudice the Appeal Court from giving such decision upon the Appeal as may seem just.

General Powers of Appeal Court. ...

21. The Appeal Court may, when it is in possession of the whole suit or matter, from time to time make any order necessary for determining the real question in controversy in the Appeal, and may amend any defect or error in the Record of the Appeal; and may direct the Court below to inquire into and certify its finding on any question which the Appeal Court thinks fit to determine before final judgment in the Appeal, and generally shall have as full jurisdiction over the whole suit or matter as if the same had been instituted and prosecuted in the Appeal Court as a Court of First Instance and may re-hear the whole case, or may remit it to the Court below to be re-heard, or to be otherwise dealt with as the Appeal Court directs.

Judgment in Appeal.

22. The Appeal Court shall have power to draw inferences of fact and to give any judgment, and make any order which ought to have been made, and to make such further or other order as the case may require. These powers may be exercised by the Court, notwithstanding that the Appellant may have asked that part only of the decision may be reversed or varied, and may also be exercised in favour of all or any of the Respondents or parties, although such Respondents or parties may not have appealed from or complained of the decision.

Transmission of Decrees.

23. All decrees and orders made by the Appeal Court shall be embodied in a certificate under Seal of the Appeal Court and the hand of the presiding Judge, and such certificate

shall be transmitted by the Registrar of the Appeal Court to the Registrar of the Court below, who shall forthwith acknowledge its receipt, and thereupon every such decree or order shall be carried out and enforced by the Court below in like manner as original decrees and orders of that Court are carried out and enforced.

Point Reserved or Special Case.

24. The Court below may, without the consent of parties, direct judgment to be entered provisionally for the Plaintiff or Defendant, subject to any point of law which it may reserve for further argument or consideration, or subject to a special case for the opinion of the Appeal Court.

Special Case.

25. Every such special case shall be jointly the parties agreed upon by whenever practicable, and settled by the Court below. Every such special case shall state concisely such facts and documents as shall be necessary to enable the Appeal Court to decide the questions raised thereby. The Appeal Court shall be at liberty to draw any inference, whether of fact or law, which might have been drawn on the trial. The Appeal Court may send back such case for amendment, if necessary, with any instruction it may deem requisite, and may require the Court below to certify its finding upon any question of fact arising in the suit or matter, and to receive further evidence, if necessary, and may make such order as it shall deem fit, and judgment in such suit or matter shall be entered in terms of such order. such judgment shall not, unless the parties shall so agree, preclude any of the parties to a suit or matter from bringing any Appeal which he might otherwise under these rules have brought from such judgment.

26. It shall not be necessary for the Appeal Court to hear any argument upon the special case; but if any of the parties so desire he may be heard thereon. If at or before the special case being settled in the Court below any party to the suit or matter shall intimate to the Court his desire to be heard thereon in the Appeal Court, the Court below shall inform the Registrar of the Appeal Court, and the Registrar of the Appeal Court shall in such case cause notice to be given to the parties through the Court below, or otherwise, as may seem most convenient, of the time and place at which they may be heard, and shall hear any of the parties who may then and there appear, and thereafter shall give judgment upon such special case, whether all or any of the parties shall have appeared or been heard or otherwise.

Fees.

27. The fees specified in the Schedule B shall be paid by the party prosecuting the cause or proceeding, and may be afterwards recovered as costs of cause if the Court shall so order.

Costs of Improper Appeals.

28. If in any Appeal it shall appear to the Appeal Court that such Appeal has been made improperly or without any reasonable cause, the Appeal Court may call on the Solicitor of the Appellant to show cause why all costs occasioned by the Appeal should not be disallowed

as between the Solicitor and the Appellant, and also (if the circumstances of the case require) why the Solicitor should not repay to the Appellant any costs which the Appellant may have been ordered to pay to any other person, and thereupon may make such order as the justice of the case may require. Such notice (if any) of the proceedings shall be given to the Appellant in such manner as the Appeal Court may direct.

Practitioners.

29. Every person admitted to practise as a barrister or solicitor in the Court below shall, upon proof of his admission as aforesaid, be entitled to practise before the Appeal Court so far as relates to Appeals in that Court from the Court below, but not further or otherwise.

Publication of Rules, Decrees, &c., of Appeal Court by the Court Below.

30. The Court below shall publish in like manner as its own notifications are published all Notices, Rules, Decrees, Orders, and such other matters as shall be transmitted to it by the Appeal Court for that purpose.

All that area of land comprising portions of the counties of Buckingham, Northampton,

Leicester, Warwick, Oxford, Berks, Hertford, and Bedford, lying within a line drawn—

On the North, from the point where the roads from Stoke Doyle and Barnwell St. Andrew meet outside Oundle, and thence along the road through Benefield, Weldon, Corby, Cottingham, Ashley, Welham, Thorpe Langton, by Langton Hall to Kibworth Harcourt. Thence by the road through Kilby, Foston, Countesthorpe, Cosby and Broughton Astley. Thence by Primethorpe to the mill on the river Soar. Thence by the road through Sharnford, Smockington, Wolvey, Bulkington and Foleshill to the boundary of the county borough of Coventry.

On the West, along the eastern side of the said county borough boundary and the boundary of the parish of St. Michael without Coventry to the point where the London and North Western railway to Kenilworth cuts the said boundary, and thence along the said railway by Kenilworth Station to the road to Leamington, and along the said road to the northern boundary of the municipal borough of Leamington. Thence along the eastern and southern sides of the said boundary to the road leading to Bishop's Tachbrook. Thence through Bishop's Tachbrook and Moreton Morrell to Kineton. Thence by Edge Hill to Wroxton and Ban-From Banbury along the road towards Aynho to the county boundary of Oxford and Northampton; thence following the county boundary by Clifton to Souldern, and thence by the road through Caversfield, Bicester, Wendlebury, Islip, Stanton St. John, Wheatley, and Tetsworth, to the county boundary between Oxford and Bucks, north-west of Stokenchurch; thence following the county boundary between Oxford and Berks to Sonning.

On the South, from Sonning by the road to Twyford. From Twyford by Shurlock Row, Redstone Farm, Newland's Farm, Fifield, Oakley Green, and The Hatch, to the river Thames at Surly Hall. Thence along the river Thames to the railway bridge of the Slough and Windsor railway, and along the said railway to its junction with the Great Western main line, and thence along the latter railway to the river Colne.

On the East, from the railway bridge over the river Colne, south-east of Iver, along the river Colne to Rickmansworth, thence along the river Gade to the mill near the Grove Park. Thence to the main road from King's Langley to Watford, and along the said road to the boundary of the Watford Urban District. Thence skirting the said boundary northward and eastward to the point where it cuts the road from Watford to St. Alban's, near Lea Thence by the road (past Bushey Lodge Farm) through Aldenham to Radlett; thence by the road through Shenley to where the county boundary between Hertford and Middlesex cuts the road west of South Mimms; thence following the county boundary to where it meets the Great Northern Railway, north of Potters Bar Station, thence northward along the said railway to Hatfield, thence by the road through Stanborough, Cromer Hyde, Wheathamstead, Bowling Alley, and by Harpenden Common to Harpenden. THEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is enacted that, in case it appear to His Majesty in Council, upon the Representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualifica-tion, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such Representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such Representation, one month before such Representation is so considered: Provided also that no such Representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such Representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and

the Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 11th day of January, 1859, it was (amongst other things) ordered that burials should be discontinued in the parish church and the churchyard of Kirby Misperton, in the North Riding of Yorkshire, with certain exceptions in the said Order mentioned:

And whereas by Orders in Council, dated respectively the 6th day of June, 1859, the 22nd day of October, 1859, and the 10th day of May, 1860, the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyard was postponed to the dates in the said Orders in Council severally specified:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 29th day of November, 1859, the said Order in Council of the 11th day of January, 1859, was varied in certain particulars:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the said parish of Kirby Misperton ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a Representation that, for the protection of the public health, so much of the said Order in Council of the 11th day of January, 1859, as varied by the said Order in Council of the 29th day of November, 1859, as relates to burials in the parish church and the churchyard of Kirby Misperton aforesaid, should be varied by substituting for the directions therein contained with regard to the said church and churchyard the following directions, viz.:—

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Saint Lawrence, Kirby Misperton, in the North Riding of Yorkshire, and in the churchyard:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 31st day of July next.

NOW THEREFORE, in the exercise of Our powers in that behalf, We hereby Approve the Scheduled Order.

SCHEDULE.

ORDER OF THE REGISTRAR GENERAL IN ENGLAND.

WHEREAS by the Births and Deaths Registration Act 1837 (7 Will. IV and 1 Vict. cap. 22 section 11) it is enacted that the Registrar General, with the approval of one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State may divide any Union into two or more Superintendent Registrars' Districts;

And whereas all the powers and duties which by the Births and Deaths Registration Act, 1837 were vested in or imposed on one of Her late Majesty's principal Secretaries of State have by the Local Government Board Act, 1871 (34 and 35 Vict., cap. 70) been transferred to and imposed on the Local Government Board;

And whereas the Guardians of the City of Westminster Union, as constituted by an Order made by the Local Government Board dated the nineteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen have, in pursuance of section 7 of the Act 6 and 7 Will. IV cap. 86, divided, with the approval of the Registrar General, such Union into five Registrars' Sub-districts, severally consisting of the Municipal Wards of the City of Westminster;

And whereas it is expedient that the City of Westminster Union, as so constituted should be divided into two Registration Districts to be called and known as, "St. George, Hanover Square" and "St. Martin" respectively and each to comprise a group of Registrars' Subdistricts as follows:

- (a) St. George, Hanover Square Registration District to comprise-
 - (1) The Sub-district of Mayfair and Knightsbridge, consisting of Conduit, Grosvenor, and the Hamlet of Knightsbridge Wards;

(2) The Sub-district of Belgrave, consisting of Knightsbridge St. George's, and Vic-

toria Wards;

- (3) The Sub-district of St. Margaret and St. John, consisting of St. John, and St. Margaret Wards;
- (b) St. Martin Registration District to com-
 - (1) The Sub-district of Strand, consisting of Charing Cross Corest C. Charing Cross, Covent Garden, and Strand Wards;
 - (2) The Sub-district of St. James and St. Anne, consisting of Great Marlborough, Pall Mall, Regent, and St. Anne Wards.

Now, therefore, I, Bernard Mallet, Registrar General of Births, Deaths, and Marriages in England, in exercise of the powers given to me by the above-mentioned Acts do hereby order and declare that on and after the first day of July next the division of the City of Westminster Union into two Registration Districts in the manner herein set forth shall take effect accordingly.
