Naples, May 12.

The Spanish Fleet is now ready to Sail; 'Tis said that the Admiral Don Pedro de Corbette has Orders to take his Course towards Palermo, and thence to Sardinia.

Venice, May 22. The Doge's Departure towards the Levant remains fixt for the 24th of this month. This Week arrived here a Ship from Constantinople, whence she parted on the 16th of April, and brings the Confirmation of the Deposing of the Grand Vllier, and the Advancement of the Caimacan of Adrianople to that Station, with this farther News, That the New Captain Bassa Mezzemorto was sailed with 16 Men of War to Candia, to reinforce the Turkish Garisons in that Island; And that there had happened some Differences between the Turks and the Persians, which were gone so far, That the latter threatened to enter into the Ottoman Dominions with a great Army.

Turin, May 23. The Difference between the Germans and the Duke of Modena is at last at an end, the Contributions being settled and agreed to, upon the same Foot they were paid the last year, so that the German Forces which were on their march that way are Countermanded, and will begin to morrow to advance towards Carignan, and to joyn the rest of the Army; 12000 Men are already encamped there, all in very good Condition, and by the middle of the next Week they will be above 20000, who will daily increase as the Troops can get together from their several Quarters; The Duke of Savoy continues very well, and its thought that he will be going in 8 or 10 days to the Camp at Carignan. The French have lately made new Levies in the Vallies near Pignerol, where they oblige every Family of such a number of Persons to furnish one Man, and to Arm and maintain him at their own Charge. The Marechal de Catinat is to have his Quarters at Fenestrelles, which place he has ordered to be fortified with Pallisadoes.

Vienna, May 23. The Duke de Croy, who is to Command the Imperial Army in Hungary is expected here in few days from Gratz in Stiria, to receive his Instructions with relation to the Campaign; The Troops in the mean time are marching with all the haste they can to their Rendezvous; and it's said that the Auxilliary Forces of Brandenburg are arrived near Breslaw. The Advices from Turkey tell us, That the new Grand Vllier was preparing to go into the Field, having caused his Tentstobe set up at the time of the Full Moon in April; That 'twas given out that the Grand Signior would go himself to the Frontiers; That T. Czekley was endeavouring to draw a Body of Men together in order to fall into Transilvania; But that the Cham of Tartary had declared, that he could not march with his Troops to Hungary, for that his presence was necessary at home to secure and defend his own Country.

Francfort, May 31. The French Army, according to our last Advices, continued about Hydelberg, but would march again to day or to morrow; The Town they have already destroyed, and are now at work to undermine and demolish the Castle; The Capuchins endeavoured all they could to save their Monastery and the Church of St. Jacob, but could not prevail, being answered by the French Generals, to whom they made their Applcation, that they would Treat this City in the same manner as they had formerly done to Spire, Mannheim, Frankendal, and other Places in the Palatinate, and not leave one Stone upon another. The Governor, with the Garison of Hydelberg,

which marched out of the Castle on the 23d, is arrived in Prince Lewis of Baden's Camp near Hailbron, and we hear that he is put under Arrest, for having so ill behaved himself in that occasion; for it appears by all the Relations we have yet seen, that he caused the several Posts to be quitted before the Enemy had gained one foot of Ground, insomuch, that finding the Klungerseims and the Walls deserted, they forced one of the Gates, and entered the Town with little or no opposition. Two Regiments of Horse, and 5 of Foot, of the Troops of Hesse lie now encamped between this City and Mentz, with Orders to put themselves into either of these places, as there may be occasion. The Elector of Saxony's Baggage arrived here two days ago; and his Electoral Highness is daily expected; His Forces march with all possible diligence to joyn Prince Lewis, who has now with him the Troops of Sussia and Franconia, and the Imperial Regiments that were quartered about Estlingen.

Cologne, June 2. The Letters from the Upper Rhine say, That the French have in a most barbarous manner Sacked and Destroyed the City and Castle of Hydelberg, and that they continued encamped near that place till the same was performed. The Governor and principal Officers of the Garison of Hydelberg are put under Confinement by Order of Prince Lewis of Baden, who, when these Letters came away, was still encamped near Hailbron, where he would in few days be joyned by 12000 Saxons. The Troops of Hesse continue in the mean time about Francfort.

Paris, June 1. The Letters from the French Camp before Hydelberg of the 25th of the last Month give an account, That the 21th in the Evening they opened their Trenches against that place, and formed two Attacks; The Enemy at first made a great Fire, as well from their Cannon, as Muskets, and killed and wounded several of our Men. Our Works were continued all Night, and part of the next day, when, towards Evening, we were very much surprized to find that the Garison had abandoned their Posts; upon which our Men entered the Town, and having plundered the same, set it on Fire in several Places. The Governor, with the Garison, retired to the Castle, where they Capitulated the next day, and marched off to the number of 1800 Persons, with what Baggage they could carry, and two pieces of Cannon, and were conducted towards Hailbron. From Bresl we have advice, That the French Fleet, Commanded by the Marechal de Tourville Sailed thence on the 26th of the last month. And from Thoulon they write, That the Count d'Estree, who was forced back by the contrary Winds, sailed again on the 14th past with the Squadron under his Command. Yesterday died here the Count de Maulevrier Colbert.

Brussels, June 3. On Sunday last the Army Commanded by the Marechal de Boufflers marched from Tournay to Lenze; The next day they advanced to Cambrai; Yesterday they were to be at Soignies, and this day at Reux. The Duke of Luxemburg was by our last advice still encampd at Grory; but its said he has caused a Camp to be marked out at Pieton; The Marechal de Joyeuse remains with 7 or 8000 Men to guard their Lines between the Scheldae and the Lys. They write from Charleroy, That the Duke of Luxemburg has sent a Detachment of his Horse towards the Country between the Sambre and the Meuse; And from Namur there are Letters which say, That the Governor's House was making ready to receive and lodge the French King. Our Army is still encamped at Digheim; On Monday last the Cavalry which was at Ghent marched thence to joyn the Foot, under the

Command of Lieutenant General Talmash at Dendermonde; and we hear that this Body advances towards Dighem. The Earl of Arblome is come to Tirlemont with the Troops he had assembled about Masefricht. The Prince de Vaudemont parted from hence this day for Italy.

Brussels, June 4. We hear that the two Armies of the Marechals de Luxembourg and Brufflers are joined together, and that they marched yesterday towards Nivelles and Genap, with 4 days Provision; 'Tis said that the French King is come to St. Demys near Mons. Our Troops that were at Anderlecke marched last Night to Dighem; from whence the whole Army will advance tomorrow towards Louvain; This Morning about break of day Captain Jacobe, who was posted with 50 Fusiliers in the Wood of Soignier, discovered a French Party of 150 Foot, and some Horse, and notwithstanding the inequality of their number, charged them with that vigor, that the Enemies Horse immediately fled, believing that our Men had a Detachment of Dragons with them, because they heard the beating of their march, which was only a Stratagem of our Captains; Of the Enemies Foot 100 were killed, and the rest, who are most Suiffers, are brought hither Prisoners.

From His Majesty's Camp at Dighem, June 4. The Horse and Foot that were in and about Ghent are now come up and encamp about a League beyond us towards Louvain. Tomorrow the whole Army marches towards Louvain, and is to encamp at Park, a little beyond that place; The Dutch Train of Artillery marched thither yesterday; and the English Train is here within a Mile of our Camp; The King will have his Quarters tomorrow Night in Park Abby, where His Majesty had his Quarters the last year. The French Army encamp last Night at Nivelles, and 'tis said are this Night at Genap. His Majesty has sent the Duke of Wirtemberg to Liege, to give Him an account of the Condition of that City. 'Tis said, that the French King was last Night at Maricmont. A Spanish Captain, who with a Party of 50 Men, has the Guard of the Wood de Soignies, met this Morning with a party of 150 of the Enemy, whom he charged and totally routed, killing many of them, and taking divers Prisoners.

Hague, June 5. The Count de Sraetman has assisted at the Congress of the Allies as Plenipotentiary from the Emperor. We have an account from Flanders, That there was discovered a Conspiracy for betraying Dendermonde to the French, and that several Persons are seized upon that account. The last Letters from Germany tell us, That the French are retired from Hydelberg, after having utterly destroyed that Town and Castle; They are gone back towards Philipsburg, or the Country of Wirtemberg.

Edinburg, May 27. On Thursday the Parliament had under Consideration an Act for raising 45000 l. Sterling by a Poll, and the same was further considered yesterday; The Act about Hearth Money was also Read, and the Question being put, Whether a Poll or Hearth Money, the Vote was carried for the former, and accordingly the said Act for a Poll passed the House; which was afterwards adjourned till Monday. On Wednesday were taken and brought hither 3 Persons, who had been lately in the Isle of Betsy, and were now returning thither; one whereof is newly come from France.

Falmouth, May 27. On the 24th instant was put into this Harbour by contrary Winds about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to New England, Barbadoes, and Newfoundland, with their Convoy. Yesterday came in here our homeward bound Canary Fleet, being about 30 Sail, under Convoy of the Dreadnought, Oxford, Unity, and Haater Fireship. They came from thence on the 27th of March last, all full laden. Two Portuguese Ships are come in from O Porto; And the Spanish Alliance Pacquet Boat from the Groyne.

Plymouth, May 28. The 26th came into this Port Their Majesties Ship the Carlisle, with a Dutch Frigate from Spithead, to give Notice to the Merchant Ships here to be in a readiness to Sail. The Rock Privateer came in this Evening.

Newcastle, May 26. On Wednesday last came to our Bar 3 Dutch Men of War, with 3 Merchant Ships under their Convoy from Amsterdam; Between this place and Whiby they retook a Dutch Flyboat of about 300 Tuns, which had on Board a French Lieutenant and several Seamen belonging to the Privateer that took her.

Hull, May 29. Last Week put into Humber about 500 Sail of light Colliers with their Convoy, who sailed again on Friday. On Saturday arrived here two Ships from Rotterdam; They came in Company of 16 Sail more, under Convoy of two Dutch Men of War, who passed by to the Northward.

Deal, May 30. Their Majesties Ship the Kings Fisher, with about 20 Sail of Merchant Ships sailed yesterday to the Westward.

Poufmouth, May 30. The Admirals with the whole Fleet, and the Squadron Commanded by Sir George Rooke, together

with all the outward bound Merchant Ships are now under Sail, taking their Course to the Westward, the Wind at N. E. and by N. The Victory, who came into Harbour about 10 or 12 days ago to stop a Leak, went out again yesterday in order to rejoin the Fleet. Their Majesties Ship the Mounague returning from Cruising off of Ushant, took the 21th instant a French Merchant Ship of 24 Guns and 128 men, bound from Marfeilles to Havre de Grace; as also a Danzicker Laden with Corn, who was going to France.
