

# The London Gazette.

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From Thursday June 1. to Monday June 5. 1653.

Turin, May 26.

On the 23d Instant arrived here the Duke of *Schouberg* from *Flanders*, and yesterday he went to *Chieri* to wait upon the Duke of *Savoy*; who continues in very good health. The Germans having settled their Contributions with the Duke of *Modena*, who is to pay them 100000 Pistoles, they are now on their march towards the Rendezvous at *Carignan*; The Troops of *Milan* are likewise moving this way, and we are assured that the Marquis de *Legonez* will bring into the Field this Summer 14000 Men, which being joined with the German Forces, and those of his Royal Highness, will make an Army of above 40000. We hear that some Spanish Troops are posted at *St. Georges* near *Casal*, in order to block up that place.

*Vienna*, May 27. The Imperial Forces begin to assemble at their Rendezvous near *Mohatz* between *Buda* and *Esfelke*; and the Auxiliary Troops of *Brandenburg* and *Hannover* have received Orders to hasten their march thither; The Duke de *Croy*, who is to have the chief Command over the Emperor's Forces in *Hungary* this Campaign, continues still at *Graz*, in *Stiria*, by reason of an Indisposition, which will not suffer him as yet to begin his Journey thither. The Letters from *Upper-Hungary* advise, that General *Heusser* had been with a Body of Horse to observe the situation of *Jeno*, but found the late great *Rains* had rendered it so unaccessible, the place being in a manner surrounded by *Moras*, that he had not yet made any attempt upon it; But some of his Troops had met with a Party of Turks who had been to Conduct a small Convoy of Provisions to *Jeno*, and had cut off most of them. On the other side 500 Turks of the Garison of *Gyula* had made an Excursion towards *Debrezin*, and had carried away several Hundred Head of Cattle, after having routed a Party of 100 Hussars, and killed several of them. The Advices from *Turkey* say, that the late Alteration at the Port had retarded the march of their Troops; but that to encourage them, 'twas given out, that the Grand Signior would go himself to the Frontiers. Yesterday we received Letters from Monsieur *Heemskerck*, the Dutch Ambassador, dated the 12th of *April* at *Adrianople*, which give new hopes of a Peace with the Turks, the Grand-Vizier, *Caimacan*, and all the great Officers of the Seraglio being very much inclined to it.

*Hailbron*, June 2. Yesterday Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* took a general Review of the Confederate Forces, encamped near this City, which consist at present of about 25000 Men; The same day he received Advice, by an Express, that the Troops of *Saxony*, who are 12000 effective Men, were come near to *Wartsburg*, and the Courier was sent back immediately, with directions for them to continue their march thither with all the speed they can. The Troops of *Hesse*, who are above 6000, will likewise join us in few days, to which end their Horse are already on their march; In the mean time we have fortified our Camp, where Prince *Lewis* intends to expect the Enemy who we hear are moving this way.

*Francfort*, June 3. The Imperial Hessians met some days ago with a French Party, and cut them all in pieces except two, whom Prince *Louis* sent back to the French Army, with this Message: That he was come from a War against the Turks, and thought he had now to do with Christians, but that he found the French acted more like Barbarians then they, as appeared by the destruction of *Hydelbergh*, and the Massacre they had made of the Inhabitants; That the French had likewise in several Oc-

casions broke the Cartel settled between the two Armies, for which reason he did not think himself obliged any longer to observe it, and for the future would treat them, as the Hussars had done to this Party they lately met with. We have an account from *Hydelbergh*, that the French, among their other Barbarities, have opened the Tombs of the Electors that were buried there, and particularly of the Elector *Charles Louis*, the Elector's his Wife, and the Elector *Charles* their Son, throwing their Bones and Ashes about the Streets, and carrying away the Leadn Coffins which the dead Bodies were laid in. Yesterday and this day passed through this City several Regiments of *Hessian* Horse, who are going under the Command of the Count de *Lippe*, to join Prince *Lewis* near *Hailbron*. The French have broke down the two Bridges they had made over the *Neckar*. They have not yet demolished the Castle of *Hydelbergh*, but the Mines are ready to blow it up; and in the mean time they keep in it a Garison of 2000 Men.

*Cologne*, June 5. We have an account from the *Upper-Rhine*, that Prince *Lewis* has fortified his Camp near *Hailbron*, and that the Saxons and Hessians would join him in few days, after which he would march towards the Enemy; Who, as these Letters assure us, are not so numerous as was at first reported. The *Brandenburg* Troops in *Garison* here are ordered to march towards the *Meuse*.

*Paris*, June 5. On Monday last *Te Deum* was Sung here for the taking of *Hydelbergh*. The French King, who was taken ill at *Quenoy*, and continued so 2 or 3 days, went thence on the 2d Instant to the Army; The Ladies are gone to *Dinant*. The Duke of *Orleans* arrived the 31th past at *Vitre*, being received by the Duke of *Chaulnes* at his entering into *Britany*, of which he is Governor. They write from *Germany*, that the *Mareschal de Lorge* was marched towards *Hailbron*, believing the Enemy upon their approach would abandon that place. The Letters from *Brest* say, that the French Fleet was gone towards *Belle-Ile*; and those from *Provence* tell us, that the Count d'*Estree* was on the 22d past still near the Isles of *Hieres*, the Gallies not having yet joined him, but a day or two after they understood by a small Vessel come in to *Marseilles*, that he was failed, but they knew not whither.

*Brussels*, June 7. The French Army commanded by the Duke of *Luxemburgh* marched on the 2d Instant from *Givry* towards *Ettines*, and *Haine St. Pierre*, and *Haine St. Paul*, where they continued on the 3d. The 4th they marched again, and encamped between *Trafignies* and *Arquenme*, within half a League of *Nivelle*; The French King, who had been stopt several days by his Indisposition at *Quenoy*, arrived, with the Dauphin, in the Camp; and yesterday the Army marched to *Fleurus*, their Right reaching as far as *Sombref*: The *Mareschal de Boufflers* having marched from *Tournay* to *Leuze*, *Cambron*, *Sognies*, and *Raux*, advanced on the 3d from this last place to *Ville Sur Haine*, and has since followed the Duke of *Luxemburgh*. On the 5th our Army marched from *Dighin* to *Louvain*, where the Earl of *Athlone* joined.

joined them with 2000 Men. Yesterday in the afternoon the Elector of *Bavaria*, with the Marquis de *Beimar* our Maître de Camp General, and the Count d'*Egmont*, went from hence to the Camp near *Louvain*; Monsieur du *Puy* Lieutenant-General of the Spanish Horse remains here, and about 1000 Horse, most English, are posted near this City. Divers Deserters come hither daily from the French Army.

From His Majesties Camp at Park near *Louvain*, June 8. On Friday last the King marched from *Dijon*, and came hither the same day with all the Foot, and both the Trains of Artillery. Lieutenant-General *Talmash* and Sir *Henry Bellasis* with the English and Scotch Foot joined us in our march, as did also the Three Troops of Horse Guards; And this day Monsieur *Ouvkerke* came in with the Horse and Dragoons, and the Earl of *Athlone* likewise joined us with the Forces he had drawn together about *Mastricht*. The French King marched yesterday with his Army from *Fleurus* to *Rameliers*, moving towards the *Meuse*, and the Marschal de *Boufflers* from *Genap* to *Walheim*. Deserters come into our Camp daily in great numbers, and among them are many Irish, being some of those that were lately detached for *Catalonia*. From *Germany* we have an account, that the Cavalry of the Landgrave of *Hesse* had passed the *Main* at *Frankfort*, and were marching with all diligence to join Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, and that his Infantry were encamped between *Mentz* and *Frankfort*; That the Troops of *Saxony* would be the 6th Instant at *Hanau* within 12 English miles of *Frankfort*, and that the Marschal de *Lorge* was marched towards *Hailbron*, where Prince *Lewis* lay strongly intrench'd, being resolved to wait his coming; And by Letters of a fresher date we are told, that the Marschal de *Lorge* being advanced near to *Hailbron*, Prince *Lewis* put his Army, consisting of about 25000 Men in Battalia, and faced the French the whole day, who, though they pretend to be 50000 strong, did not think fit to attack him, but retired towards *Sintzheim*.

*Hague*, June 9. The Court of Justice is still taken up with the Examination of Monsieur *Alwin*, for which purpose they met again this day in the Prison. The Count of *Oxenstern* will part from hence in 2 or 3 days for *Vienna*, where he is to reside as Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Sweden*. The Letters from *Paris* say, that the French Fleet have Orders to keep upon their own Coast.

*Plymouth*, May 30. By a Vessel that came from *Scilly* on the 27th, we had an account, that there were seen two days before off of that Island about 30 great Ships, which they took to be French Men of War; but they prove to be Swedish and Danish Merchant Ships under the Convoy of a Swedish Man of War called the *Oland*, bound home from *Portugal*, who are since come into the Channel, and were met by Their Majesties Ship the *Carlisle*, which went out of this Port yesterday. This day came in from Cruising Their Majesties Ships the *Mountague* and *Rockster* with a Dutch Man of War; The former brought in a French Prize, being a Ship of about 650 Tuns, 26 Guns, and 140 Men; she came from *Smirna*, but last from *Marseilles*, richly laden, to the value of 50000 *l. Steel*.

*Newcastle*, May 30. On Sunday last sailed out of this Harbour above 300 Sail of laden Colliers bound to the Southward.

*Weymouth*, May 31. The Fleet, which sailed yesterday from *St. Helens*, sailed by *Portland* this morning, taking their Course to the Westward with a fresh Gale at the North East.

*Tarborough*, June 2. On Wednesday and Thursday last passed through our Road near 300 Sail of

Laden Colliers; They met the Light Fleet under *Pemborough-Head*. There are still in our Road about 100 Sail of Light Ships bound to the Northward.

*Dover*, June 3. This morning came into the Downs the King William Yacht from *Jamaica*; and the *St. Albans* sailed with some Ships under her Convoy to the Westward.
