Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the thirty-first day of July, in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and four-teenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Andrew, Langton, in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the nineteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-first day of the same month, a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate on Langton Moor, in the parish of Saint Margaret, Langton, in the said county of Lincoln and in the said diocese of Lincoln, and the said consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Langton.'

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Langton, has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us, to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Langton, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Lee, bishop of the said diocese of Lincoln (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Langton, shall be altered so that all those portions of the parish of Roughton, of the parish of Martin by Horncastle, of the parish of Thornton, of the parish of Woodhall, of the parish of Thimbleby, and of the parish of Edlington, all in the said county and diocese, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and are thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such parishes, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Langton.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the herein-before mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing scheme or representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Andrew, Langton, in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln, being:—

"I. All those contiguous portions of the parish of Roughton, of the parish of Martin by Horncastle, of the parish of Thornton, of the parish of Woodhall, and of the parish of Thimbleby, all in the said county and diocese, which, taken together, are bounded upon the west by the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Langton, upon the south-east partly by the parish of Kirkstead, and partly by the parish of Kirkby-on-Bain, both in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east, upon the northeast, and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Kirkby-on-Bain from the said parish of Roughton at the southern corner of the unenclosed land known as Roughton Moor, and extending thence north-westward along the fence forming the south-western boundary of Roughton Moor for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to the northern end of such fence on the south-eastern side of Horncastle Road upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Roughton from the said parish of Martin by Horncastle, which boundary at this point coincides with the boundary of the urban district of Woodhall Spa, and extending thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the said urban district boundary (thereby following in part the last-mentioned parish boundary, and the south-eastern side of Horncastle Road, and in part the north-eastern side of Sandy Lane) for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the point where such urban district boundary meets the boundary of the civil parish of Woodhall, and also the boundary which divides the said parish of Martin by Horncastle from a detached portion of the said parish of Thornton, and extending thence north-eastward along the said civil parish boundary (thereby following the boundary which divides the said parish of Martin by Horncastle from the said detached portion of the said parish of Thornton, and from the said parish of Woodhall), for a distance of sixtyeight chains or thereabouts to the point near the north-eastern corner of Highall Wood, where the last-mentioned boundary meets the boundary which divides the said parish of Thornton from the said parish of Woodhall, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Odd's Beck (thereby following in part the said boundary which divides the said parish of Thornton from the said parish of Woodhall, and crossing at two points the boun-
