Francfort, June 7. The Consederate Army is still encamped near Hailbron; and the French at Sintzheim, within 3 hours march of each other. Cologne, June 9. Most of the Brandenburgh Troops that are now in the Diocese of Cologne, will decamp to morrow, and march towards the Musse, and the forces of the Eicstor Palatin have likewise orders to march, and his Electoral Highness intends to go to morrow to Zulpich to take a Review of them. The Letters come in this day from the Palatinute advise, that the French Army under the command of the Merselmal de Lorge was encamped near Snitzheum between Hydelorg and Haibron, dettroying the Country round them. And that Prince Lewis continued encamped with the Contederate Forces before Hailbron; That the Hesselm Cavalry had joined him, as it's believed the Saxon Troops (who atrived to days ago near Wiartshurgh) have done by this time; and belides the Militia (or chosen Men as they call them) of the Country, making 18000, were actually on their match towards Hailbron. The French have still a Garison in the Castle of Hydelbergh.
