

# The London Gazette.

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Genoa, May 23.

This day arrived here a Genoese Bark from *Alicant*, the Master whereof reports, that he saw on Sunday last 20 French Men of War before *Rosés*, and that he heard the firing of several Bombs.

*Turin*, May 30. Our Army which had been several days encamp'd at *Carignan*, (consisting of about 20000 Men) marched on the 28th to *Vigon*, and this day to *Riue* near *Pignerol*, to consume the Forage about that place; and in few days they will be joined by the German Troops; Count *Palfi* one of their General Officers arrived here the 27th, and the Marquis de *Leganez*, Governor of *Milan* on the 28th, and several Councils have since been held about the Affairs of the Campaign. The Duke of *Savoy* continues at *Chieri* in perfect Health. The French and Irish desert apace from *Pignerol*, there coming hither sometimes 20 in a day; They complain of the great hardships they suffered through the scarcity of Provisions; And we are assured from other hands, that in *Dauphine* and the Neighbouring parts Bread is at 7 Sols the Pound, and that there have been great Disturbances on this account.

*Hanover*, May 29. On the 27th Instant arrived here Sir *William Cole*, Envoy Extraordinary from Their Majesties of *Great-Britain*, to Compliment the new Elector of *Brunswicke Lunenburg* upon his Accession to that Dignity; and accordingly he had his publick Audience yesterday, to which he was Conducted with several English Gentlemen that accompanied him, in 3 of the Electors Coaches, being attended by his Electoral Highnesses Pages and Footmen, who walked by the sides of the Coach in which was the Envoy and the Electors Master of the Horse. and after them Sir *William's* own Livery Men, to the number of 12, all with their Hats off. Upon the Market-Place was drawn up a Company of Guards, and another before the Court, where the Envoy was received by Monsieur *Kopsftein*, and a great many Gentlemen of the Court, and being with the usual Ceremonies brought to the Room of Audience, he made His Majesties Compliment, and delivered his Congratulatory Letter to the Elector, who received the same with all possible Acknowledgments, and many Assurances of his constant Service and Gratitude to His Majesty; The Envoy had likewise Audience of the Electores; and was afterwards invited to Dine with his Electoral Highness at *Herenhausen*, a House of Pleasure of the Electors, about an English mile from hence; where the Envoy made likewise His Majesties Compliment to the Electoral Princesses.

*Piemont*, May 30. There is come considerable news from *Transylvania*, the last Letters from thence telling us, that the Moscovites had drawn a great Army together about *Kiow*, part of which would march towards the *Crimee*, and the rest towards *Budziack*, which had extremely alarmed the Tatars, and would hinder them from sending any of their Troops to the assistance of the Turks in *Hungary* this Campaign. From *Upper-Hungary* we have an account, that General *Hufler* was come before *Jeno*; that on the 18th Instant he possessed himself of the Suburbs of that place, and that he would attack the Town so soon as his Artillery was come up; The same Letters say that *Tickly* was sick. The Duke of *Croy* is expected here towards the end of this week. The Duke of *Wurtemberg* is returned towards the *Rhine*.

*Hailbronn*, June 6. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* continues in his Camp, which reaches almost to the Gates of this City,

where the Hessian Horse under the command of the Count de *Lippe*, and some other Troops that were quartered in the *Black Forest* have joined him, so that his Army is now reckoned at 30000 Men. On the 4th and 5th Instant some of the Enemies Squadrons appeared so near to this place, that we fired our Cannon at them, and killed several Men and Horses; and they likewise discharged some Field Pieces against the Imperial Forces, who stood all that day in *Barthalia*. Towards Evening the French retired to their Camp at *Sintzheim*. Prince *Lewis* has sent several Expresses to hasten the March of the Saxon Forces, who we expect will join us about the 10th of this month. The late Governor of *Hydelbergh* continues under Arrest, and has been several times Examined before the Council of War.

*Frankfort*, June 7. The Confederate Army is still encamped near *Hailbronn*; and the French at *Sintzheim*, within 3 hours march of each other. The Count de *Lippe* with the Cavalry of the Landgrave of *Hesse* has joined Prince *Lewis*, as the Saxons will do in 3 or 4 days, and then he will advance towards the Enemy; who, we hear, have sent most of their Baggage over the *Rhine*. On the 5th Instant the Landgrave of *Hesse* took a Review of his Infantry at *Hochst*, not far from *Mentz*; They are between 7 and 8000 strong, and will be speedily reinforced by some Troops of *Munster* and *Lunenburgh*.

*Cologne*, June 9. Most of the *Brandenburgh* Troops that are now in the Diocese of *Cologne*, will decamp to-morrow, and march towards the *Meuse*, and these quartered in this City will march out the same day. The Forces of the Elector *Palatin* have likewise orders to march, and his Electoral Highness intends to go to-morrow to *Zulpich* to take a Review of them. The Letters come in this day from the *Palatinate* advise, that the French Army under the command of the Marshal de *Lorge* was encamped near *Sintzheim* between *Hydelberg* and *Hailbronn*, destroying the Country round them. And that Prince *Lewis* continued encamped with the Confederate Forces before *Hailbronn*; That the Hessian Cavalry had joined him, as it's believed the Saxon Troops (who arrived 10 days ago near *Wartsburgh*) have done by this time; and besides the Militia (or chosen Men as they call them) of the Country, making 18000, were actually on their march towards *Hailbronn*. The French have still a Garrison in the Castle of *Hydelbergh*.

*Paris*, June 8. This week was published here an Order of the Council of State, by which the old and new Pieces of Money are made Current till the end of this month, according to the Regulation of the 28th of *April* last. The Letters from *Piedmont* of the 31th past tell us, that the Enemies Troops under the command of the Marquis de *la Parelle*, which had encamped at *Carignan*, were come to *Buriasque* near *Pignerol*; and that Monsieur *Catinat* had thereupon ordered some Battalions to advance in order to reinforce that Garrison. They write from *Roussillon*, that the French Forces under the command of the Duke de *Noailles* arrived before *Rosés* on the 29th of the last month.

*Brussels*, June 10. The French Army commanded by the Duke of *Luxemburgh* marched on the 7th Instant to *Walbeim*; The Marshal de *Benfurst* encamped the same day about *Gembloirs*; and we hear since that the Marquis de *Harcourt* is detached with a body of Men towards *Huy*. On the 8th Instant Lieutenant-General *du Puy* marched with the 1000 Halls, who were posted about *Zanderlecke*, to our Camp near *Louvain*, and this morning a great many Pioncers were sent thither out of our Neighbourhood. Several Battalions are likewise marching from *Sath*, *Oudenarde*, and other Places in *Flanders*, to join our

our Army. The Deferters continue to come in in great numbers from the French Army, among whom are many Suilfers; There come sometimes 2 or 300, and even 400 in a day.

From His Majesty's Camp at Park, June 11. We continue in our Camp near Louvain. The French Army commanded by the Marschal de Luxembourg lies encamped along a Rivulet which passes by Walkem, about 3 or 4 Leagues from us; but greatest part of their other Army commanded by the Marschal de Boufflers passed the Meuse yesterday at Namur, where the French King is himself, and it's said they intend to attack Huy, to facilitate the design they seem to have upon Liege by opening the passage of the River. In the mean time they have put themselves at Liege into a very good posture of Defence, for with the Detachment of 9 Battalions which His Majesty has sent thither, and the Troops of Brandenburg, they have now in and about that City 25 Battalions of Foot, and as many Squadrons of Horse, making together 20000 Men, besides the Forces of the Elector Palatine, who lie ready if there be occasion, to enter likewise into the Place. His Majesty has sent 4000 Men to Maestricht to reinforce the ordinary Garrison; and the Forces that are now encamp'd here consist of 40000 Foot, and 20000 Horse and Dragoons, with 114 Pieces of Cannon.

A Party of the Garison of Charleroy has lately taken about 40 Mules and 20 Led Horses belonging to the Duke of Mairan; other French Officers, the Ladies of the French Court narrowly escaping whilst our Men were busied in rifling the Baggage laden on the Mules.

An Express came last night from Prince Lewis of Baden to the Elector of Bavaria, with an account, that the French were endeavouring to pass the Neckar, but he believed they would not be able to do it; And the Courier adds, That immediately after he left the Camp he heard for a good while a continued firing of Cannon, so that we are hourly expecting to hear of some Action on that side.

It is reported that the French King is going back from Namur towards Versailles, and that the Dauphin will march with 30000 Men under the Marschal de Boufflers towards the Rhine, but we do not yet know what credit to give to it.

Hague, June 12. The Councillors of the Court of Justice are to make their Report on Wednesday next to the States of Holland, about the Affair of M. theurs Allewin, which its believed will be then brought to some determination.

Plimouth, June 2. Yesterday the English and Dutch Fleet, together with the Streights Squadron, passed by this Port to the Westward; And the same day sailed hence to join them all the Merchant Ships bound to Virginia, Bilboa, and other Parts under the Convoy of the Plimouth, Winchester, Crowne, Archangell, and Soldadoes. This day came in the Oxford from Falkmuth.

Falkmuth, June 3. Yesterday in the Forenoon the Fleet appeared before this Harbour with a great number of Merchantmen. The outward bound Ships that were in this Port sailed with their Convoy, and joined them soon after.

Plimouth, June 4. The Hambal Privateer of Middleborough of 30 Guns, commanded by Captain Okerman, arrived here yesterday with two French Prizes, which he took the last week, one of them about 6 Leagues from Belle-Isle, and the other off of Ushant; He had taken 3 more from Guinea and other parts which he left at Bilboa. One of the first mentioned Prizes is called the Two Brothers of 24 Guns, and the other the Hope of 20 Guns, both laden with Sugars, and bound home from Martenico, whence they came on the 4th of April, having on board many Passengers, being Persons of the chiefest Consideration who lived on that Island, and brought away with them the best of their Movables. They declare, that Sir Francis Wheeler, with the English Fleet, consisting of 60 Sail, arrived at Martenico 3 days before, and that the Forces under the Command of Colonel Foulke landed on the side of St. Lucia without any opposition, and were become Masters of the whole Island except the Fort, which they suppose would be likewise quickly taken. That the French Governor had notice of their coming but 3 days before their arrival, whereupon he ordered all the Men, Women, and Children, and others that were unfit for service, to retire to the Mountains; These two Ships, being the great Consideration they were in, and giving all for lost, made their escape, leaving two other Ships there who were likewise on board divers of the Planters who fled from the Island. Many of the most considerable Inhabitants

of Guadalups were likewise fled from thence, and the rest were ready to submit to the English upon their first approach; so that they believe the English are likewise in possession of that Island.

Deale, June 6. This day arrived in the Downes from the Westward Their Majesties Ship the Salley-Rose, with the Berkeley-Castle, Captain Barret Commander, from Legburne, and two Merchant Ships from Alicant, one from Malaga, one from Barbadoes, one from New-England, and one from New-Yorke, who all sailed again immediately for the River.
