Issue of New Certificate.

The Management of the School known as the Maurice Girls' Home, situated at 7, Mattock Lane, Ealing, having been taken over by the Church of England Waifs and Strays Society, the Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that, on the application of the new Managers, he has issued a new Certificate, certifying that the said School is fit for the reception of girls sent to an Industrial School in pursuance of the provisions of the Children Act, 1908 (8 Edw. 7, c. 67), or of the Elementary Education Act, 1876 (39 and 40 Vic., c. 79).

The Certificate, which bears date the 13th September, 1913, provides that the number of children resident in the School at any one time, whether sent thereto in pursuance of the said provisions or not, shall not exceed thirty-two.
