

into a consolidated chapelry for all Ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, Woodlands, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, as diocesan and also as the patron in right of his see as well of the vicarage of the said parish of Brodsworth, as of the vicarage of the said parish of Doncaster, and with the consent of John Skipwith Herbert Fullerton, of Thrybergh Park, Rotherham, in the said county of York, Esquire, one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace, as the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Adwick le Street (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Adwick le Street, of the said parish of Brodsworth, and of the said parish of Doncaster, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints, Woodlands, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Woodlands.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Woodlands, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Adwick le Street, of the parish of Brodsworth, and of the parish of Doncaster, all in the county of York and in the diocese of York, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Adwick le Street from the said parish of Brodsworth at the junction of the Wakefield Road with the road called Roman Ridge, and extending thence first north-westward and then south-westward along the said boundary (thereby following in part the middle of the Wakefield Road, and in part the middle of Red House Lane) for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary diverges westward from the middle of Red House Lane, and extending thence first south-westward and then southward along the middle of Red House Lane for a distance of seventy-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Long Lands Lane and with the road leading to Pickburn, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to the point where it is crossed by the line of the Brodsworth Colliery Railway, and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of such line of railway for a distance of seventy-one chains or thereabouts

to the point where the said line of railway crosses the middle of Roman Ridge, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Roman Ridge (thereby following in two parts the boundary which divides the said parish of Brodsworth from a detached portion of the said parish of Doncaster) for a distance of seventy-two chains or thereabouts to the point opposite to the northern side of Green Lane where the last-mentioned boundary meets the boundary which divides the parish of Arksey, in the said county and diocese, from the said detached portion of the parish of Doncaster, and extending thence first north-eastward and then in various directions along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following in one part the northern side of Green Lane and in another part the northern side of Long Edge Lane) for a distance of one mile and fifty-three chains or thereabouts to the point in the middle of the stream called Langthwaite Dike where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said parish of Adwick le Street from the said detached portion of the parish of Doncaster, and extending thence first westward and then generally north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following the course of the Langthwaite Dike) for a distance of one mile and ten chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the Great North Road at or near its junction with Doncaster Lane, and extending thence northward along the middle of Doncaster Lane for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the eastern end of the fence forming the northern boundary of the Hanging Wood Quarry, and extending thence north-westward in a straight line for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts to the southern end of the wall or fence forming the north-eastern boundary of the Woodlands Recreation Ground, and extending thence north-westward along the said wall or fence for a distance of eight chains and a half or thereabouts to its northern end, and extending thence north-westward in a straight line for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to the southern end of the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the Adwick le Street Cemetery, and extending thence north-westward along such wall or fence for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its northern end on the southern side of Windmill Balk Lane, and extending thence north-westward in a straight line (thereby crossing Windmill Balk Lane) for a distance of eighteen chains and a half or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Tenter Balk Lane distant twelve chains precisely from its junction with the Great North Road, and extending thence north-westward in a straight line for a distance of fifty-four chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Red House Lane distant five chains precisely from its junction with the Great North Road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Red House Lane for a distance of five chains precisely to its junction with the Great North Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the Great North Road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Wakefield Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the Wakefield Road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Roman Ridge upon the boundary which divides
