

of Saint John the Evangelist, Sparkhill, and partly by the new parish of Saint Christopher, Springfield, upon the south by the new parish (sometime particular district) of Christ Church, Yardley Wood, upon the south-west by the new parish of All Saints, King's Heath, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of School Road, north of its junction with Ashfield Road and Prospect Road, where the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, King's Heath, from the said new parish of Moseley, diverges westward from following the middle of School Road, and extending thence first northward and then north-eastward along the middle of School Road for a distance of seven chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Cotton Lane, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Cotton Lane for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Wake Green Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Wake Green Road for a distance of six chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction with Mayfield Road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Mayfield Road for a distance of twenty-one chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Sandford Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Sandford Road for a distance of eight chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Anderton Park Road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Anderton Park Road for a distance of fourteen chains and a half or thereabouts to the point at or near its junction with Cadbury Road, where it is crossed by the boundary which divides the said new parish of Moseley from the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, Balsall Heath.

"II. And also all that portion of the said new parish of Christ Church, Yardley Wood, which is bounded upon the north-west by the above described portion of the said new parish of Moseley, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Moseley from the said new parish of Christ Church, Yardley Wood, at the junction of Swanshurst Lane and Coldbath Road with Yardley Wood Road, and extending thence first southward and then south-westward along the middle of Yardley Wood Road for a distance of twenty-six chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Brook Lane, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Brook Lane for a distance of twenty-five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Wheeler's Lane and Coldbath Road upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Yardley Wood, from the said new parish of Moseley."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Birmingham.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish of Langar, in the county of Nottingham, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the civil parish of Barnston cum Langar, in the county of Nottingham, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:—

BARNSTON CUM LANGAR.—Forthwith and entirely in the church of Saint Andrew, Langar, in the county of Nottingham; and in the following portion of the churchyard, namely:

All that part of the churchyard attached to the church of St. Andrew in the Civil Parish of Barnston cum Langar and containing an area of 438 square yards or thereabouts, which is bounded as follows, that is to say, by a line commencing at a point in the fence or wall forming the northern boundary of the said churchyard distant four yards or thereabouts from the south-western corner of the garden forming part of the property known as Langar Hall, thence proceeding in a southerly direction to the nearest point in the northern boundary of the said church, thence proceeding in a southerly and westerly direction along that boundary to the western boundary of the said church, thence proceeding in a southerly direction along the said last-mentioned boundary, and thereafter continuing in the same direction to the northern boundary of the footpath leading from Langar Hall to the said church, thence proceeding in a westerly direction along that boundary to the western boundary of the said churchyard, thence proceeding in a northerly direction along and thereafter following the boundary of the said churchyard to the point first hereinbefore mentioned.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 2nd day of March next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels
