

in Holy Orders, Francis Augustus Bevan, of Number 54, Lombard Street, in the city of London, Esquire, John Francis William Deacon, of Number 20, Birch Lane, in the city of London, Esquire, the Reverend Edward Grose Hodge, of the Vicarage, Paddington, in the said county of Middlesex, Clerk in Holy Orders, and Sir Harry James Veitch, of Number 34, Redcliffe Gardens, London, S.W., as the Patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John, Chelsea (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Chelsea and of the said new parish of Saint John, Chelsea, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew, Chelsea, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'the Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Chelsea.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Chelsea, comprising:—

"1. All that portion of the parish of Chelsea, in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London, which is bounded upon the south-east by the parish of Battersea, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Southwark, upon the south-west by the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint John, Chelsea, in the said county of Middlesex and in the said diocese of London, upon the north-west partly by the new parish of Saint Mary, West Brompton, and partly by the new parish of Saint Peter, South Kensington, both in the said county of Middlesex and in the said diocese of London, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter, South Kensington, from the said parish of Chelsea at the junction of Fulham Road with Elm Park Gardens, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Elm Park Gardens for a distance of eight chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to its junction with Elm Park Road and Vale Avenue, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Vale Avenue for a distance of ten chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with King's Road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of King's Road for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with the road on the south-western side of Paulton's Square, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such road for a distance of seven chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to its junction with Danvers Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Danvers Street

for a distance of eight chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to its junction with the road known as Chelsea Embankment, and extending thence south-eastward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the River Thames upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Chelsea from the said parish of Battersea.

"2. And also all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John, Chelsea, which is bounded upon the north-east by the above described portion of the said parish of Chelsea, upon the north-west by the said new parish of Saint Mary, West Brompton, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-west and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary, West Brompton, from the said new parish of Saint John, Chelsea, at the junction of Fulham Road with the road called Netherton Grove, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Netherton Grove for a distance of eight chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to its southern end, and extending thence south-eastward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of Gertrude Street, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of Gertrude Street for a distance in all of one chain or thereabouts to its junction with Langton Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Langton Street for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with King's Road almost opposite to the western end of World's End Passage, and extending thence eastward to and along the middle of World's End Passage for a distance of twelve chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Riley Street upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Chelsea, from the said parish of Chelsea."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.
