• Our Advices from Stachholme inform us that the States of that Kingdom ftill controue their Affembly, where all Affaits are driven on with much forcery; that we know not yet what progrefs they have made in the Concernments of the Queen Chriftina. That the Treaty was far advanced, if not altogether concluded between that Crown and the Emperour, the onely thing disputed between the Ministers of both Parties being the payment of the fum of 38000 Rixdollers, which is required of the Emperour. They farther cell us that the King of Smedeland has been lately formewhat indipoled, but not by any dangerous distemper, and that His Majefty halt difmifted the, French Ambaffadour with much honour, having beides the ordinary Prefents, given him fis Picure rich y list about with Diamonds.

Some few dayes fince arived here the Prince of Parms from Poland, Sweden, and Denmark, intending after fome Jutle ftay to take his way thorow Lunenbourgh, Saxony, Meiffen, Thuring, and Francony, and then to pals down the Rhine for the Netherlands, and 'tis faid may afterwards take a View allo of England, France, and Spain.

From Celle we are adviled, that the Dakes of Lunenburg have disbanded two Regiments of Horfé belonging to the Count de Waldee their General, two Fost Companies of aColonel Haxthuifen's Regiment, and two others of the Regiment of Colonel Veiler i and given all of them both Officers and Soldiers above their pay, two moneths wages as a gratuity, which has lo won upon them, that they have freeby offer'd up in the least intimation, to bo in readinels to lerve them upon any occasion which may prefent it lelf.

From Ratisbonne they write, that the Emperor had order'd it to be propoled in the Colledge of Princes, that care might be taken for the lecurity of the Circle of Burgundy; but the Deputies there affembled not having (ufficient inftruflions from their Princes, Ge. in the point, they have shought fit to put off the debate for fome time.

- Bruffels. Ang. DI. The coming of Don Juan is more then ever doubted of, by realon of a Letter lately lent by two Fregats arrived at Oftend from Corunna to the Count de Salayar by Gowernor of Bruges, from Dont Mutthed Pasinno Secretary to Don Juan, informing him that he was forry that he has not hitherto been able to purfue his intentions of transforting himself into the Netherlands according to bis own defire, as well as that of the Quan Regent and Council of Spain, but that he has for fome time been much indificiend, which obliges him to reitre alittle into the Counder for the recovery sof his health, the Air of that place where he then was, not at all agreeing with his confitution; defining thim to difinit's fuch perfons as he had entertained to make up fits Train, promiting him to fludy fome ways of making him a return fuitable to the care and pains he had been at in that and other affairs relating to his fervice.

"The Marquis de Cafiel Rodrigo has reduced all the German horfe and a confiderable part of the Infantry, and has displaced leveral Officers in other Regiments whom he found, to be most disfairsh'd with his Governmen', and disputed his Commands; and yefterday, Orders were illued out for the Reduction of all the old Tertias and Regiments of Foot to 16 Companies in each Regiment, and all the new ones to \$2 apiece.

Hague, Aug. 23. The Spanish Ambassadour having by a Memorial informed the States, that the French have drawn fome of their forces both horse and foot about F4ernes, Winoxbergen, and the adjacent places; thereby crearing jealousies of fome defiga upon the places to which they pretend as dependencies upon their late Conquests; defining some course might, be taken that nothing may be done to the disturbance of the Peace lately concluded between the Two Crowns : the States have accordingly fent an Express to their Ambassadour the Heet Van Beuninghen at Paris, to use his endeavours with the Most Christian King for the fecurity of the Peace, and that he would be pleased to refer his pretenfons to be confidered by Mediators.

The States have refolved upon the disbanding of the 12000 men which were this year railed, and to difcharge and fend-away the Luncabourgh forces. The Marine Regiment of 4000 is to be fill continued with halfpay. They are alfo reducing the forces railed in 1665, to 65 men im each Collonels Company, and 55 in all the reft; and the Troops of Horfe to 45 men apiece.

Upon information given to the States that much Silver is privately conveyed out of these Provinces into France, contrary to the Laws; they have ordered strict inquiry to be made into it, and the Offenders to be rigorously punished.

Portfmouth, Ang. 18. The 15th inftant in the Evening. Sir Thomas Allen let fail with the foundron-under his Command from Spitthcad, and on the backlide of the Ifle of Wight met with those other thins which were sent to him from the Downs. This morning came in here the Resolution and Warspight, the former touched in her passage upon the Sand called No mans Land, but came off again without prejudice.

Whitehall, Aug. 19. On Munday laft, His Excellency Monfieur Colbert, Ambaffador from His Moft Chriflian Majefty, made his publick Entry, attended by a -ňumerous Train of Coaches with fix horfes, conducted in His Majefties Coach by the Earl of Portland and Sir Charles Cotterel Mafter of the Ceremoniss, end complimented at his Houle by the Lord Crofts.

This day he was with a great train of Coaches attended to Whitehall, and conducted to His publick Audience in the Banqueting-Houle, by the Earl of Chefterfield and Sir Charles Cottorels with the usual Ceremonies practised upon such occasions.
