Turin, June 6.

THE Duke of Savoy came hither on the 30th past, and held a Council of War, at which the Governor of Milan and the Duke of Schonberg were present, and the next day his Royal Highness returned to Chiari in very good Health, where 'tis thought he will stay till he takes the Field. Our Army is still encamped about Rive; The German Troops are on their march, and will have joyned them in few days; Our Parties in the mean time make frequent Excursions towards Pignerol, and one of them advanced 3 days ago so near to that place, that the French fired upon them from the Walls, and a Detachment of the Garrison was sent out to fall upon our Men, but they received the Enemy so warmly, that they beat them back, killing several, and taking some Prisoners. Yesterday Prince Eugene's Regiment of German Horse marched through this place towards our Camp.

Milan, June 3. The Marquis de Leganez, our Governor, returned hither last Night from Turin, and has commanded the Forces of this State to march with all the diligence they can towards Piedmont in order to open the Campaigne on that side. At the same time some Troops are appointed to block up Casal.

Vienna, June 10. Yesterday being the Emperors Birth-Day, when He entered into the 54th year of his Age, was observed at this Court with much Solemnity. Our Troops found in Jeso a great quantity of Ammunition, but the Garrison wanted Provisions; The place is strong, being fortified with a good Wall, and a large and deep Ditch; and within the Town is a Castle of four Towers, with another Ditch round it: We lost in this Siege about 400 men, but no Officer above a Captain, and only one of that Rank; and the Imperial Forces that were employed in it are since marched to the General Rendezvous near Esseeke. The Duke de Croys is still here, but will depart towards the end of this Week for Hagary.

Hailbron, June 16. Prince Lewis of Baden is returned from the Conference he has had with the Elector of Saxony at Lohr; whose Troops lie at present between Ochsenfurt and Ketzingen; but as yet we do not certainly hear whether they will joyn the Confederate Forces that continue encamped near this place, or whether they will form another Body with the Troops of Hesse, and Act seperately. The French Army is moved nearer to the Rhine, and lies now within two Leagues of Philipsburg; We are assured that they lost in their late attempt to pass the Neckar, and by Desertion since, near 3000 men; On the other side Prince Lewis's Army has within these few days been reinforced by 4 or 5000 new raised Men.

Frankfort, June 18. The Confederate Army is still encamped near Hailbron, to observe the Motions of the Enemy; who, by our last advice were encamped between Bretzen and Philipsburg, having sent a Detachment of Horse towards Piedmont. The Elector of Saxony, and the Landgrave of Hesse are expected here in a day or two; and it's said that their Troops are to joyn together, and to form a Camp about Mentz. The French continue to demolish the Castle of Hydelberg. The Confederates have put a Garrison of 2000 Men into Stuttgart in the Country of Wirtemberg.

Colague, June 19. The Dauphin, with the Detache-

ment from the French Army in Flanders passed on Tuesday last the River Ourt at Hottou, and thence continued his march towards St. Vyt; his Army is said to be about 25000 strong. The Brandenburg Troops that marched lately out of this Diocess towards the Meuse, are coming back towards the Rhine, to joyn with the Forces of the Elector Palatin and Bishop of Munster, and to form a Camp near Dueren in the Country of Juliers. The Letters from the Palatinate, give an account, That the French Army, under the Marschal de Lorge was drawn nearer to the Rhine, being encamped within two Leagues of Philipsburg; That they had sent a strong Detachment of Horse towards Piedmont, and that 'twas certain, that the Enemy, since their marching towards Hailbron had lost above 2500 men, part by Desertion, and the rest killed or taken Prisoners. Prince Lewis of Baden was still encamped near Hailbron, to see which way the Enemy would take their march. Other Letters, which we receive just now, say, That the French were marching towards the Country of Wirtemberg; and that Prince Lewis of Baden had thereupon decamped with his Army, and had posted himself about a League and a half above Lauffen near Camstadt, and within five or six Leagues of the French Camp.

Hamburg, June 19. We had lately advice, That the King of Denmark had ordered an Encampment of his Troops near Rensbourg in the Country of Holstein, which gave some Jealousie to the Neighbouring Princes; and induced the King of Sweden, as we are informed, to declare, That he would employ his Forces against those that should disturb the quiet of the Circle of the Lower Saxony. But the last Letters from Copenhagen advise, That the King of Denmark has Countermanded his Troops that were designed for the said Encampment.

Paris, June 19. We have the Confirmation of the taking of Roses, but do not yet know the Particulars, nor the Capitulation, farther, than that the Chevalier de Noailles arrived before the place the 6th, with the French Gallies, and landed 1200 Men, who went into the Trenches to relieve our Troops, who were very much fatigued. The Governor of the place was dangerously wounded, and the Town was Surrendered on the 9th instant; The Spaniards had drawn together a Body of 12 or 14000 Men. The Letters from Pignerol of the 10th tell us, That the Duke of Savoy was going to put himself at the head of his Army, with a Resolution to march again into Dauphine; and that a small Camp was forming to block up Casal. The Count de Caprara, as General of the Emperors Forces in Italy, had caused two Orders to be Published in Montferrat; One forbidding the Montferrins to carry any Provisions to Casal on pain of Death; and the other Commanding all the Subjects of that Principality, at present in the French Service, to quit the same on pain of Confiscation of their Estates, &c. The French King was the 14th of this month at Marientburg, the 15th at Racroy; yesterday he intended to be at Rheims, to stay there the 19th, to go the 20th to Soissons, the 21th to Flanders Correts, thence to Chantilly, and to be the 25th or 26th at Versailles.

Brussels, June 21. The French Army Commanded by the Duke of Luxemburg continues in the same Post we gave you an account of in our last, his Camp reaching from Boffut almost as far as Tillermont, and his head Quarters being at Meldert. We are assured from all hands that there is in the Enemies Camp a great scarcity of Provisions, and that the Soldiers suffer extremely, which occasions a great

Defertion among them; We hear, that to secure their Convoys, that come to their Army from *Namur*, they are Fortifying *Gemblours*; But this will not cover their Convoys from *Mons*; and on our side we are endeavouring to intercept them; In order whereunto 2000 Horse were detached yesterday from our Army to joyn the Garison of *Charleroy*; and 4 Troops of Dragoons have been sent to reinforce the Guard that is kept in the Wood of *Soignies*. Our Army is still encamped near *Louvain*; where the 6000 Brandenburgers that have lain some time at *Willeburn*, *Erps*, and *Querpes*, will joyn them to day or to morrow. And the Earl of *Athons* lies with a seperate Body of Men at some distance from the Left Wing of our Army, to cover *Leewe* and *Diest*. The Brandenburg Troops that lay about *Liege* are marched toward the *Rhine*, and with the Forces of *Nuburg* and *Munster* will form a Camp of 20000 Men under General *Fleming*, to observe the French Army that's marching under the *Dauphin*, who, as we hear has pass'd by *St. Yve*, taking his way towards *Trier*.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Parke*, June 22. The Armies continue in the same posture; and His Majesty goes frequently to the Hills about the midway between the two Camps to view the Enemy and the Defiles that are between us. They have laid some Bridges over the River *Dele* at *Florival*. The Deferters that come over to us daily, do all say, that Provisions are very scarce in the French Camp. Their Convoys pass with some difficulty, and a Party of the Garison of *Charleroy* has lately taken one that was going to their Army from *Namur*, after having beaten the Troops that guarded it. The Electoral Prince of *Hannover* and his younger Brother are both in our Camp.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Parke*, June 23. at one in the Morning. We have just now Advice, That the French are burning their Camp in order to march; The King has sent out several Parties to learn the Truth of it, and it is believed so. His Majesty will be immediately on Horseback, and the whole Army in motion to follow them.

Hague, June 23. Monsieur *Hanken*, who has long resided here as Envoy from *Hannover*, has lately received Plenipotentiary Powers from the Elector his Master, and took his pace yesterday in the Congress of the Allies. The Prince of *Feize* is gone to our Army, which according to our last Letters was still encamped at *Parke* near *Louvain*. We have Advice, That the *Dauphin* marches only with 12000 men towards the *Palatinate*, having left the rest of the Forces that were lately detached from *Flanders*, under the *Marschal de Boufflers*, to joyn the *Marquis de Harcourt*, who has with him 4 or 5000 men on the *Moselle*. The last Letters from *Germany* tell us, That the *Marschal de Lorge* was march'd towards the Country of *Wirtemberg*, and that Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* was thereupon advanced near to *Gaußels* on the *Neckar*, and had put a good Garison into *Stuttgart*.

Dublin, June 22. Their Majesty's Ship the *Dover*, Captain *Cressé* Commander, has taken off of *Cape Clear* a French Privateer of 30 Guns and 185 Men, and brought him into *Kinsale*.

Edinburg, June 10. Yesterday and this Day the Parliament had under Consideration several publick Acts. *Neveill Payne* is to be Tryed on Tuesday next before the Parliament, who upon his Petition have allowed Council to Plead for him.

Weymouth, June 14. This day pass'd by *Portland* our home ward bound *Canary Fleet*, which came last from *Falmouth*, with divers other Ships, and their Convoy, bound to the Eastward.

Portsmouth, June 16. Yesterday two Dutch Men of War, who arriv'd at *Spitthead* two days before from *Zea-Land*, sail'd hence to joyn the Fleet.
