## DORMANT FUNDS IN COURT.

SUPREME COURT PAY OFFICE, ROYAL COURTS OF JUSTICE, LONDON,

February 28, 1914.

Funds.—The Supreme Court Funds Rules, 1905, provide that:—

"On or before the 1st day of March in every third year the Paymaster shall prepare, in such form and with such particulars as the Treasury may from time to time direct, a list or statement of the accounts in the books of the Pay Office to the credit of which there stood on the 1st day of September then next preceding, any funds not less than £50, which have not been dealt with, otherwise than by the continuous investment or placing on deposit of dividends, during the 15 years immediately preceding the last-mentioned date." (Rule 101.)

In pursuance of the above Rule, the following Alphabetical List of Accounts in the several Divisions of the High Court, which have not been dealt with since 1st September, 1898, is published in the London Gazette for general information, together with an Index of Names, and cross-references to the sub-titles of the several accounts.

This is the only authorized List of dormant or unclaimed Funds in Court.\*

Amount.—The aggregate amount of these funds is about £1.250,000, distributed over more than 3,800 separate accounts. One-half do not exceed £150 in value, and only about one-twentieth exceed £1,000.

Wyman and Sons, Limited, Fetter Lane, London, E.C., at the price of One Shilling each. Applications to the publishers for copies to be sent by post must enclose a sufficient amount to cover postage, in addition to the cost of the Gazette. The Gazette is registered at the General Post Office for transmission by Inland Post as a newspaper. The postage rate to places within the United Kingdom is one halfpenny for each copy. For places abroad the rate is a halfpenny for every 2 ounces, except in the case of Canada, to which the rate, by Canadian Magazine Post, is a penny for every pound or fraction of a pound.
