

# The London Gazette.

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From Monday June 19. to Thursday June 22. 1693.

Naples, June 1.

Yesterday arrived here the Gallies of Sicily to joyn with those of this Kingdom, *Sardinia*, and *Turfs*; They are together 24 in number, and have Orders to go out with the Spanish Fleet which lies now ready to Sail. There have been felt again several small Earthquakes in Sicily.

*Turin*, June 13. The Duke of *Savoy* intends to take the Field in few days. Greatest part of the German Troops are advanced near to this place in order to joyn his Army, and the rest are on their march, except a Detachment that lies about *Casal*: Several Mules that were going thither with Salt and other Provisions have been lately taken by the Spaniards, together with some Officers who would have put themselves into that place.

*Warsaw*, May 26. The Emperors Ambassador, after several Conferences with the Ministers of this Court about the present Juncture of Affairs, is now preparing for his return to *Vienna*, and will have his Audience of Leave this Week or the next. The Envoy from the *Cham of Tartary*, who has been so long here, will be at last dispatched with an Answer; That the King of *Poland* is resolved not to depart from the Confederacy he is engaged in with the Emperor and Republick of *Venice*, and no to enter upon any Treaty of Peace without their Concurrence and Inclusion. The King has called together all the Senators to Consult with them about the State of the Kingdom, and the Measures to be taken with relation to the next Campaigne.

*Vienna*, June 13. Yesterday Prince *Eugene* of *Savoy* parted from hence for *Piedmont*, with the Emperors Instructions relating to the Campaigne on that side. The last Letters from *Hungary* advise, That the Regiment of *Styrum* arrived on the 8th instant at the Rendezvous near *Mohatz*, where those of *Baden*, *Old Starensberg*, *Thungen*, *Archinto*, *Anhalt*, *Nem*, *Aerberstein*, *Rabutun*, *Castel*, *Ehbenzokern*, and *Bassompierre*, were encamped some days before, under the Command of General *Archinto*, and the rest of the Imperial Forces designed to compose our main Army were daily expected. The Auxilliary Troops of *Brandenburg* are passed by *Jablunka*, in their march towards our Camp. 'Twas said the last Week, that the Turks had drawn together a Body of their Troops about *Belgrade*, and that they were marching to attack *Peter Waradin*, but we have had often the like Reports, and this last has no more of Truth in it then the former, for our freshest Advices say, That the Enemy had not above 6000 Men together in and about *Belgrade*, who continued on the other side of the *Save*, without making any shew of passing it. On the 8th instant arrived a Courier from *Warsaw*, with the News, That the Princess of *Poland* (the Emperors Sister) was brought to Bed of a Son. The Marquis de *Burgomanero*, Ambassador here from the Catholick King, is made a Grandee of *Spain*, and has received Compliments thereupon.

*Hailbron*, June 19. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, upon advice that the French Army marched towards the Country of *Wirttemberg*, decamped from the Neighborhood of this City, and marched towards *Marbach* and *Canstadt*; The Enemy in the mean time advanced as far as *Pfortzheim*, and 'tis believed their design was against *Stuttgart*; but upon the motion of our Army they are marched back towards the *Rhine*. The late Governor of *Hydelberg* being a Knight of the Teutonick Order, has been Degraded of the same; and it's believed he will be carried from hence to-morrow to the Imperial Camp, to suffer the Sentence pass'd upon him by a Council of War.

*Francfort*, June 21. The Elector of *Saxony* is expected here in 2 or 3 days; and his Troops are

on their march to joyn the Hessiens, and to form a Camp between this City and *Mentz*. The French have been prevented in their design of falling into the Country of *Wirttemberg*, by the march of Prince *Lewis* towards *Canstadt*; They are since returned to *Bruchsal*; and 'tis said that Prince *Lewis* has passed the *Necker* at *Marbach* to follow them.

*Cologne*, June 23. We have advice from the Country of *Eyffelt*, that the Dauphin was come to *Vian-den* in the Dutchy of *Luxemburgh* with 40 Squadrons of Horse, 12 of Dragoons, and 27 Battalions of Foot, and by the Letters from *Trier* we understand that this Army would be the 29th of this Month on the *Moselle*, and designed to pass that River at *Liser* and *Montroyal*; and that in the mean time they were baking Bread for these Troops at *Trier*, *Montroyal* and *Luxemburgh*. From the *Upper Rhine* they write, that Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* was encamped on the 18th Instant near *Olmarsheim* on the *Neckar*, and that the French Army retired towards *Philipsburg*. The Saxons and Hessiens were going to form a Camp near *Mentz*. The Troops of the Elector *Palatin* were to joyn yesterday with those of *Brandenburg* under General *Flemming* at *Duren*.

*Paris*, June 22. The French King arrived the 16th at *Mezieres*, where he staid the 17th, and went on the 18th to *Retel*. The Dauphin continues his march towards *Germany* by the way of *Marche-en-Faminc*. The Garison of *Rosés* marched out on the 10th Instant according to their Capitulation; but the Fort de *la Trinite*, which stands on a Rock at the entrance into the Gulfe, held out still; a Battery of Mortars was raised against it, and the Count d'*Esfrée* would continue there with his Squadron, until it was taken. The Letters from *Pignarol* of the 14th tell us, that the Duke of *Savoy* was resolved to enter into *Dauphine* or *Provence*; That the *Mareschal de Catinat* was gone to give the necessary Order to the Troops that are posted at *Mont Dauphin*; and that he had sent the Duke of *Vendosme* to Command in *Provence*. They have advice here, That the French Fleet was on the 14th instant off of the Rock of *Lisbon*, and the general Report is that they are gone to *Cadix*.

*Brussels*, June 24. Our Parties from *Charleroy* are very troublesome to the Enemy, who continue in their Camp between *Bessut* and *Tillemont*; They had laid several Bridges over the River *Dyle* for the conveniency of Foraging, but Monsieur de *Puy*, Lieutenant General of the Spanish Horse, went lately out with a Detachment, and broke some of them down; and Major *Jacob*, with his Fusiliers, has broke down their Bridge near the Abbey of *Florival*.

From His Majesty's Camp at *Parke*, June 25. On Monday about Midnight we had a Report, that the Enemy were burning their Camp, and going to march; but the next day we were informed that it was only the accidental burning of some of their Tents. We have had lately

very great Rains, and particularly last Night, when the Waters from the Hills came down with such violence, as to carry away divers Tents, Wagons, and Horses, that were in the hollow ways, and some People were drowned, several Houses that stood in the way of the Torrent were likewise carried away. We reckon the French Camp must have received much more damage than ours, as standing on lower Grounds. We hear that one of our Parties, Commanded by a Spanish Officer, has taken near Charle-roy another Convoy that was going to the French Army, which lies still near us; All Provisions are very scarce in their Camp; They have used the Country People so ill, that all who can, fly before them with what they have. Many Deserters come over to us, who say, that their numbers would be yet greater if they were not strictly watched. Our Camp is very well supplied with Provisions, and with Oats for our Horses. Yesterday the Duke of Wintenberg with a strong Detachment went very near to the Enemies Camp, but there happened no Action, only he alarmed all their Army.

Hague, June 26. The States of Holland are still assembled, but it's believed they will adjourn in a day or two till the 15th of the next Month. The Deputies of the Admiralties have lately had several Conferences with those of the States, about the Memorials given in by the Envoys of Sweden, Denmark, and Portugal, for Reclaiming of Ships taken and brought in by our Privateers, and upon their Report the States will take a final Resolution, and Communicate the same to the said Ministers.

Edinburg, June 15. On the 12th the Act of Compensation had the Royal Assent by the Touch of the Scepter. On the 13th and 14th *Neill Payne* appeared before the Parliament, but by reason of the Straintness of their time the Sessions being to end the next day, his Tryal was referred to the Justiciary. This day the Lord High Commissioner gave the Royal Assent to an Act for Regularizing the Judicatures; An Act explaining a former Law about Corresponding with Rebels; An Act allowing time for the Clergy to take the Oaths till the 10th of July; An Act for Commissions of Justiciary in the Highlands, and to several other Acts. A Letter to His Majesty was Read and Approved. And then the Parliament was adjourned till the 12th of September next.

Plymouth, June 16. On the 14th arrived here the *Jacob of Rotterdam*, *Thomas Janson* Master, from the *Tercera Islands*, who says, That on Sunday Morning last he left Sir *George Rookes* Squadron with the Merchant Ships under his Convoy, about 90 Leagues from the Lands-end.

Plymouth, June 18. Yesterday sailed hence to the Westward, the *James Galley* and the *Deptford*, with several Victuallers bound to the Fleet. This day came in from *Zealand*, two Dutch Men of War, and the *St. Albans Prize*.

Hull, June 19. This day arrived in the *Humber*, the *Centurion* from *Leith*, with a small Privateer of 6 Guns, and 30 Men, which he took in his passage berwixt *Scotland* and *Newcastle*. There are also in *Humber* two Dutch Men of War, belonging to *Rotterdam*, one of 42, and the other of 36 Guns, and two belonging to *Amsterdam*, one of 40, and the other of 16 Guns and 6 Privateers, which are Convoys to several Merchant Ships.

Portsmouth, June 19. Last Night arrived at *St. Helens*, the Homeward bound *Canary Fleet*, and they are now coming to *Spithead* with their Convoy, the *Dreadnought*, *Oxford*, *Unity*, and *Humber* Fireship.

Yarmouth, June 19. Saturday Night and Sunday Morning, passed through our Road, about two hundred Sail of laden Colliers, bound to the Southward.
