RULE OF THE SUPREME COURT.

The following draft Rule is published pursuant to the Rules Publication Act, 1893:—

RULE OF THE SUPREME COURT (MARCH), 1914.

Order XXII., Rule 15, is hereby annulled, and the following Rule is substituted therefor.

In any cause or matter in the King's Bench Division in which money or damages is or are

claimed by or on behalf of an infant or a person of unsound mind not so found by inquisition, suing either alone or in conjunction with other parties, no settlement or compromise, or acceptance of money paid into Court, whether before or at or after the trial, shall as regards the claims of any such infant or person of unsound mind be valid without the sanction of the Court or a Judge, and no money or damages recovered or awarded in any such cause or matter in respect of the claims of any such infant or person of unsound mind, whether by verdict or by settlement, compromise, payment into Court or otherwise, before or at or after the trial, shall be paid to the next friend of the Plaintiff or to the Plaintiff's Solicitor unless the Court or a Judge shall so direct. All money or damages so recovered or awarded shall, unless the Court or a Judge shall otherwise direct, be paid to the Public Trustee, and shall, subject to any general or special directions of the Court or a Judge, be held and applied by him, in such manner as he shall think fit for the maintenance and education or otherwise for the benefit of such infant or person of unsound mind.

The provisions of this rule shall also apply to all actions in which damages are claimed or awarded or recovered by or on behalf of an infant or person of unsound mind not so found by inquisition under the Fatal Accidents Act
