

2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(a) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.

(b) That they are native-born or naturalised British subjects.

3. At each examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as the Postmaster-General may from time to time fix.

4. The examination will be in the following subjects, viz.:—

1. English Composition (including writing and spelling).

2. Arithmetic (first four rules, Simple and Compound, including English and Metrical Weights and Measures, Reduction, Vulgar Fractions and Decimals, excluding Recurring Decimals).

3. Geography.

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency will not be regarded as qualified.

5. No Candidate will be admitted to examination who does not, at such time as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce an undertaking, signed by his parent or guardian, that he will, if successful, reside within a suitable distance from the Post Office, either with his parents or guardians, or with relations or friends approved by such parents or guardians.

6. Candidates must be at least 5 feet in height, and no officer will be retained in the service who does not attain the height of 5 ft. 4 in. before completing his 19th year.

7. (i) Persons actually serving in the Army or Navy are ineligible to compete. (ii) Persons holding situations in the Civil Service, Probationary Engineer Cadets in the Navy, and apprentices in His Majesty's Dockyards, must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination before the commencement of the competition.

8. Persons who have entered upon or completed a course of education or training for the occupation of teacher, on account of which grants are payable from the Exchequer, will not be qualified to receive appointments until the consent of the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, as the case may be, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

9. Application for permission to attend an examination must be made at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

10. A fee of 5s. will be required from every Candidate attending an examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination for at least two situations as Male Learners at Cork, in the Department of the Postmaster-General, will be held at Cork on the 28th May, 1914, under the above-mentioned Regulations.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 7th May, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

BOROUGH OF SWINDON.

Whereas by sub-section 1 of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, it is enacted that within any limits or place referred to in regulations made by the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour:

Notice is hereby given, that the council of the borough of Swindon have made application to the Local Government Board for a regulation to be made in pursuance of the said sub-section putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising the following roads or parts of roads within the borough, namely:—

Marlborough Road (from the Railway Bridge to High Street), High Street, Wood Street, Victoria Road, Regent Circus, Regent Street, so much of Bridge Street as extends from Regent Street to Fleet Street, and so much of Fleet Street as extends from Bridge Street to the Bridge next mentioned, and the Bridge over the Wilts and Berks Canal:

Notice is hereby further given, that objections to the making of any such regulation may be sent in writing to the Local Government Board, at their offices at Whitehall, London, on or before the twenty-fourth day of April, 1914.

A copy of any such objection should be sent at the same time by the objector to the council of the said borough addressed to the Town Clerk.

DISTRICT Auditors Act, 1879: Assignment of Duties and Districts (Supplemental).

NORTHAMPTONSHIRE AUDIT DISTRICT.

To George Langford Gibson, Barrister-at-Law, District Auditor;—

To the North Bucks Smallpox Isolation Hospital Joint Committee;—

And to all others whom it may concern;—

WHEREAS by section 4 of the District Auditors Act, 1879, it is enacted that the Local Government Board may from time to time assign to District Auditors their Duties, and the Districts in which such Auditors respectively are to act, and may from time to time change wholly or, in part such Duties or Districts;

And whereas by an Order dated the 22nd day of March, 1909, We, the Local Government Board, certified the appointment of George Langford Gibson as a District Auditor, and assigned to him the duties therein mentioned and the District in which he should act as Auditor, and which in the said Order was termed "The Northamptonshire Audit District";
