Milan, June 10.

OUR Governor the Marquis de Leganez returned higher on the 2d instant from Turin, and has since held several Councils of War with the Count de Louvoigny, Maître de Camp General, and the other General Officers of the Forces in the Service of this State, who are now on their march from their several Quarters towards Piedmont, except those that are to be employed in the Blockade of Casal; The Garison of which place is much weakened of late by Desertion, and suffers through the scarcity of Provisions; and to streighten them yet more Orders are given to attack the Castle of St. George, which is situated near Casal: The Enemy in the mean time endeavour to put Men into the place, in small Parties, but most of these have been taken Prisoners, and among others several Officers. We are told that the King of Spain has agreed to the Sale of the Duchy of Sabioneda, to the Duke of San Pietro for 800000 Crowns, or which he is to pay 250000 here in ready Money.

Venice, June 13. Several Vessels are arrived here which met the Doge on Saturday last off of Zara in Dalmatia, taking his Course for the Levant. Another Convoy is preparing, which will be ready to Sail towards the end of this month with Twelve Hundred new raised Men, (who are already arrived at the Lido) and with Provisions and other Necessaries for our Fleet and Army. We have an account from the Morea, That Lieutenant General Domenigo was putting the Troops of this State into a posture, to undertake some considerable enterprise upon the Doge's arrival. The Gallies of Malta are Sailed towards the Levant: to joyn with the Venetian Fleet.

Vienna, June 17. The Imperial Troops arrive daily at the General Rendezvous near Mohatz, where the whole Army, together with the Auxilliary Forces of Brandenburg and Hancuer, will be encamped by the end of this month. We do not yet hear of the motion of the Ottoman Troops in any considerable Body near our Frontiers; And the Advices from Turkey continue to speak of the great disorder their Affairs are in, and of the Discontents among the Asiatick Troops, which retard their marching into the Field. The Count de Veterani, who Commands the Imperial Troops in Transylvania, and Count Palfi who serves in Piedmont, are likewise made Lieutenant Generals of the Emperors Forces.

Hailbron, June 22. The Confederate Army, under the Command of Prince Lewis of Baden continues encamped at Omarsheym on the Neckar, and the French near Bruchsal. On the 18th instant, Major General Hydersdorf, late Governor of Hydelsberg, Knight of the Teutonicke Order, was Degraded of that Honour by Command of the Great Master: His Life was saved at the Intercession of some Eminent Persons, but a more Ignominious Punishment was inflicted on him; For after that the Collar of his Order was taken from him, and he was put out of the Assembly of the Knights, (who for that purpose were met together

at Hailbron.) in all the disgraceful manner that is practised on the like Occasions, he was delivered to the common Hangman, who carried him with his Hands bound in a Cart on the 19th instant to the Imperial Camp, and a long Line of the whole Army, which was drawn up in Battalia. At the head of his own Regiment the Sentence of the Council of War against him was Read; after which the Hangman broke his Sword over his Head, and threw the pieces in his Face; and then, being for ever Banished out of the Dominions of the House of Austria, and the Circles of Suabia and Franconia, and the Upper Rhine, and all his Goods and Estate forfeited, he was carried by the Hangman beyond the Neckar and left there.

Francfort, June 23. The Elector of Saxony and the Landgrave of Hesse arrived here two days ago, and were received by the Burghers in Arms, and the Discharge of the Cannon round the Town. This day passed by this place by Water some Saxon Regiments of Foot; the rest follow, and the Horse marches by Land towards Mentz, where they are to joyn with the Hessian, and some other Confederate Forces, and together will form an Army of 25000 Men, to observe the French Forces that have been detached from Flanders, and who are expected on the Moselle about the beginning of the next Month.

Cologne, June 26. The Brandenburg Forces, under General Fleming, marched yesterday from Ducren towards Kerpen; They will be joyned by the Troops of the Elector Palatin and Bishop of Munster, and make a Body of 20000 men. The French Army, under the Dauphin, marches by reason of the difficulty of the ways, in 4 Bodies, towards Montroyal, where they are to pass the Moselle about the first of the next month.

Paris, June 26. The French King arrived the 20th of this month at Rheimes, where he staid the day following, and parted the 22th for Soissons. The last Letters from Germany tell us, That the Marechal de Lorge was encamped at Obstat near Bruchsal; and the Confederate Army on the Neckar, between Hailbron and Canstadt. The Dauphin encamped on the 20th instant at Dorte, in his march towards Montroyal. From Catalonia we hear, That the Fort de la Trinite in the Gulph of Roses surrendred on the 15th instant. 'Tis said that a Courier is arrived here, who left the French Fleet, Commanded by the Count de Tourville, on the 12th instant off of Cape St. Vincent.

Brussels, June 28. We had very great Rains the last Week, by which the French Camp has suffered very much; And we are assured that the scarcity of Provisions increases among the Enemy every day. The Army, Commanded under the Dauphin, by the Marechal de Boufflers, continues its march towards the Moselle, having had on the 26th instant their Head Quarters at Gerolstein.

From His Majesties Camp at Parke, June 29. The Armies continue still in the same Posts. The Prisoners we take, and the Deserters who come over to us daily, do all confirm the great scarcity of Provisions in the Enemies Camp; in-somuch that a Loaf of Bread usually Sold for Three Pence, is now Sold for Twelve Pence, and a Quart of Beer at the same Price. The German Letters say, That the Dauphin advances by slow marches towards *Montroyal*, where he designs to pass the *Moselle*; 'Tis thought he may arrive at that place about the beginning of the next month.

Hague, June 30. The States of *Holland* are still assembled, having before them the Affair of Messieurs *Allewin*, which will be now determined in a day or two. The Deputies of the several Admiralties having made their Report to the States General concerning several Prizes taken by our Privateers, are gone home again. The Letters from *Brabant* bring advice, That the late great Rains have done much damage in the French Camp. There are Letters from *Vienna*, which say, they had Advice from *Turkey* of a great Revolt in *Azia*; That the Persians and Arabs were in motion, and that Things were in a mighty Disorder at *Constantinople*; of which we must expect the certainty by our next Letters.

Plymouth, June 23. This day arrived here the *Soldados* Frigate, and brought in a French Privateer of 13 Guns, lately Commanded by Captain *Waltch*, who was killed in the Engagement; She also took a small Vessel laden with Cordage and Corn going to *Drest*; and left the *Greenwich* in Charge of another Privateer.

Torbay, June 22. The Fleet came in here yesterday in the Evening to take in a supply of Provisions, and after that will immediately go to Sea again. The *Greenwich* and a *Brigantine* are now plying in, having taken three French Privateers, one of 18, another of 14, and a third of 4 Guns.

Dale, June 24. The Merchant Ships from *Oporto* arrived the 21th in the *Downes*, and Sailed again the next Morning for the River, under Convoy of the *Bona-venture* and *Mary Galley*, who having seen them over the Flats, are returned into the *Downes*; where the homeward bound *Country Fleet* arrived yesterday in the Evening with their Convoy. Two Dutch Privateers have brought into the *Downes* seven Prizes.

Dorsetford, June 25. About three this Morning was Launched Their Majesties Ship, called the *Edinburgh*, of 50 Guns, built by *Edward Snellgrove* at his new Dock here.
