Cadiz, June 11. N. S. This day arrived here an English Privateer called the *Cloudsly Galley*, who says, That on Saturday the 6th he saw the French Fleet, consisting of 120 Sail, of which about 70 great Ships, 16 Fireships, 6 Bomb Ketches, and the rest Tenders and Victuallers, lying in *Lagos Bay* where they were still on the 9th, except about 20 Sail, who were Cruising Westward.

Lisbon, June 13. The French Fleet, consisting of 114 Sail of all sorts, has been these 8 days on the Coast of *Algarus*. On the 11th an Express arrived here, with an account, That they were still in *Lagos Bay*; And this day 'tis reported, That the Count *d'Estree* was joyned with the *Marschal de Tourville*, and that the Fleet was standing to the Westward, to double the *Cape of St. Vincent*.

O Porto, June 20. The French Fleet was by our last advice in the Bay of *Lagos*, between *Cape St. Vincent* and *Faro*, where it's said the Count *d'Estree* has joyned them. When the *Marschal de Tourville* came first on the Coast of *Portugal*, he put out English and Dutch Colours; But the Portuguese sending on Board him, he excused his not giving them notice of his arrival upon their Coast, being, as he said, driven in by the Weather.

Groyne, June 26. This Afternoon arrived here the *Bonadventure*, *Noah Barton* Master, from *Leghorne*, but left from *Cadiz*, whence he came about 28 days ago; and eight days after he put into the Bay of *Quartier*, between *Lagos* and *Faro*, where he was informed by the Portuguese, That in *Lagos Bay* there were about 40 French Men of War, which were said to be the *Thoulon Squadron*; And the next day he heard near 100 Guns fired in the Nature of Salutes; Three days after he left *Quartier*; and on the 25th instant in Foggy Weather, he fell in with 2 Fleet of Ships in the Latitude of 43, standing to the Southward, the Wind at N.

Vienna, June 20. The Letters from *Mohatz* of the 15th instant tell us, That there were then Encamped near that place 24000 Imperialists; and that the Auxillary Troops of *Lunenburg* were expected in the Camp in two or three Days; Those of *Brandenburgh* will be this day between *Leopoldst* and *Comorra*; and to morrow the Envoy of *Brandenburgh*, with the Counts of *Coningsbeck*, *Strauman*, and *Staremberg* go thither to take a review of them. The Advices from the Frontiers say, That the Turks are not yet in any manner of readiness to take the Field; A Party of 1500 of them attempted lately to burn some small Boats near *Peter Waradin*, but were Repulsed and obliged to withdraw in great disorder. Here are strong reports of a Revolt among the *Alitick Troops*, and of great Disorders at *Constantinople*, of which we must expect the Confirmation. The Duke de *Croy* is gone to the Army, and General *Heuster* will follow in a day or two. The design of *Gyula* is laid aside for the present; but there is a discourse that the Imperialists will attack *Belgrade* or *Tamefwær*.

Hailbron, June 27. The Confederate Army under Prince *Lewis* is still Encamped at *Omanheim*. 'Tis said that 4000 Saxon Horse are on their march to joyn them, and that Prince *Lewis* so soon as he has received this Reinforcement will pass the *Neckar*, and march towards the Enemy, who continue Encamped about *Bruchsal*, and are said to be now not above 25000 strong, being much weakened by Desertion. The Huffsars bring in much Booty but no Prisoners, for they cut in pieces all the French Soldiers they meet with.

Frankfort, June 28. The Forces of *Saxony* and *Hesse* are on their march towards *Mentz*, and a Camp is marked out for them near that place. The Elector, the Landgrave, and General *Chauvet* are still here. The *Hessian Artillery* with a Regiment of Foot marched through this City two days ago towards *Mentz*.

Cologne, June 30. The Forces of the Elector *Palatin*, to the number of 6000 Men, decamped on Friday last from *Zulpich*, and marched to *Cockheym*, where they were joynted by the *Brandenburghers* under General *Fleming*; and
