The Museum has always received, and will, I am sure, continue to receive, the generous support of the Government, but it has also profited to a remarkable degree by the publicspirited liberality of many generations of individual benefactors, to whom the nation

owes a debt of gratitude.

The new galleries which We are met to open to-day form a worthy addition to one of the noblest public buildings of My Capital. They will enable your ever-growing collections to be displayed to more advantage, and will provide better accommodation for students and for the work of the staff, and will thus, I trust, extend and enhance the influence of the Museum as one of the chief educational agencies of the world.

I accept with pleasure the beautiful album illustrating the architectural development of I desire to assure you of My the Museum. strong personal interest in the work and development of the Museum, which will, I am confident, ever maintain the traditions of a great past, and will go forward to a future of even wider usefulness.
