"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property, in the parishes of Saint Mary, Lambeth, and Saint Giles, Camberwell, in the county of Surrey, now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of the several indentures, particulars whereof are set forth in the schedule hereunder written, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments situate in the parishes of Saint Mary, Lambeth, and Saint Giles, Camberwell, aforesaid, and particularly described in the same indentures and schedule, became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us.

"And whereas some portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, on account of their character or situation, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands, tenements, and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments, so vested in us as aforesaid.

under and by virtue of the said several indentures or any of them, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time, as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or

hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parlia-

ment.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Luton and of the new parish (sometime consolidated chapelry) of Saint Paul, Chatham, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said new parish of Luton and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Chatham, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry

for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of All Saints, Chatham, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Reginald, Bishop of Rochester, as such Bishop and also as the patron, in right of his See, of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Chatham, and with the consent of the Reverend Edmund Godfrey Burr, Clerk in Holy Orders, the rector or incumbent of the rectory of the parish of Chatham, in the said county and diocese, and, as such rector or incumbent, the patron of the vicarage of the said new parish of Luton (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and scaled this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Luton and of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Chatham, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of All Saints, Chatham, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints, Chatham.'

WHEREAS by the Coroners Act, 1844, it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alteration should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said justices in general or quarter session assembled, to resolve that a petition shall be presented to His Majesty praying that such division or alteration be made, and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the coroner or coroners of such county as thereinafter provided; and that the clerk of the peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every coroner for such county and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said justices into consideration, and the justices shall confer with every such coroner who shall attend the meeting of the justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of the inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of the said Act; and such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to His Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the clerk of the peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a true copy of such petition, certified under his hand, to every coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, if he shall think fit, with the advice of His Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Him-by any coroner of the same county concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to His Majesty 'o direct the issue of a Writ de Coronatore Eligendo for the purpose of authorising the election of an additional coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of the said Act as to His Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and every such Order shall be published in the "London Gazette";

And whereas by the Local Government Act, 1888, the powers and business of the said justices in respect of the matters aforesaid in each county were transferred to the council of

such county;

And whereas by an Order in Council made on the 24th day of April, 1847, under the provisions of the hereinbefore first recited Act, the county of Warwick was divided into three districts for coroners' purposes and the purposes of the said Act, which said districts were named respectively the Northern District, the Central District and the Southern District, and such districts were to comprise respectively the several parishes, townships and places set forth and enumerated in the said Order;

And whereas by an Order in Council made on the 14th day of August, 1878, under the same provisions of the said hereinbefore recited Act, the said Southern Coroner's District of the said county was altered by adding thereto the parishes of Stretton-upon-Fosse with Ditchford, and Whitchurch with Crims-

cott, Whimpstone, and Bruton;

And whereas a petition has been presented to His Majesty praying that the parish of Bickenhill, now in the Southern Coroner's District of the said county, be taken from that district and be added to the Central Coroner's District, and that the parishes of Claverdon and Wolverton, now in the Central Coroner's District of the said county, be taken from that district and be added to the Southern Coroner's District;

And whereas the said petition, with the reasons upon which it is founded, has been

duly certified to His Majesty;

And whereas all the provisions in that behalf of the hereinbefore first-recited Act have been duly complied with;

And whereas the coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to His Majesty concerning the said proposed altera-

And whereas His Majesty has, with the advice of His Privy Council, taken into consideration the said petition, and is minded to make such alteration as aforesaid;

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is

pleased to order, direct, and declare, as it is hereby ordered, directed, and declared, that:—

- 1. From and after the date hereof alteration shall be made of the division heretofore made of the county of Warwick for coroners' purposes and for the purposes of the Coroners Act, 1844, as follows:—
 - (a) The parish of Bickenhill shall be separated from the Southern Coroner's District of the said county and annexed to the Central Coroner's District;
 - (b) The parishes of Claverdon and Wolverton shall be separated from the Central Coroner's District of the said county and annexed to the Southern Coroner's District.

 2. This Order shall be published in the

And whereas it is expedient to amend the Principal Order so as to make proper provision for bringing the said Order into operation in the said Protectorates.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Seal Fisheries (Crown Colonies and Protectorates) Order in Council, 1914."

2. The Principal Order shall come into operation in the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Protectorate, the Solomon Islands Protector-

ate, and the Somaliland Protectorate forthwith.

3. The Schedule to the Principal Order is hereby revoked, and the Schedule to this Order substituted therefor.

FOREIGN ORDERS AND MEDALS.

Foreign Office, May 20, 1914.

The KING has commanded that the following Regulations relating to the wearing of Foreign Orders and Medals by British subjects shall be substituted for those previously in force, the text of which was published in the London Gazette of May 12, 1911:—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING FOREIGN ORDERS AND MEDALS APPLICABLE TO PERSONS IN THE SERVICE OF THE CROWN.

Orders.

- 1. It is the King's wish that no subject of His Majesty in the Service of the Crown shall accept and wear the Insignia of any Foreign Order without having previously obtained His Majesty's permission to do so, signified either:
 - (a) By Warrant under the Royal Sign-Manual, or
 - (b) By private permission conveyed through His Majesty's Private Secretary.
- 2. Permission given by Warrant under the Royal Sign-Manual will enable the Insignia of the Foreign Order to be worn at all times and without any restriction.

Private permission will only enable the Insignia to be worn on the occasions specified in the terms of the letter from the King's Private Secretary conveying the Royal sanction.

3. Full and unrestricted permission by Warrant under the Royal Sign-Manual is contemplated in the following cases:—

For a Decoration conferred-

On an Officer in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces lent to a Foreign Government; on an Officer in His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces attached by his Government to a Foreign Navy or Army during hostilities; or on any British Official lent to a Foreign Government and not in receipt of any emoluments from British public funds during the period of such loan.

4. Private or restricted permission is contemplated for Decorations which have been conferred in recognition of personal attention to the Head of a Foreign State, and which are therefore of a more or less complimentary character, and will, as a rule, only be given on exceptional occasions when in the public interest and for political reasons it is deemed expedient that the acceptance of a Foreign Decoration should not be declined. Private permission will generally be given in the following cases:—

For a Decoration conferred:-

(1.) On British Ambassadors or Ministers abroad when the King pays a State visit to the country to which they are accredited;

(Note.—A State visit is defined as one on which the King is accompanied by a Minister or High Official in attendance.)

(2.) On Members of Deputations of British Regiments to Foreign Heads of States

(3.) On Members of Special Missions when the King is represented at a Foreign Coronation, Wedding, or Funeral; or on any Diplomatic Representative when specially accredited to represent His Majesty on such occasions; and such Members of His Staff who actually attend the ceremonies in their official capacity;

(4.) On Naval and Military Attachés only after completion of five years' service at the post to which they are appointed in that

capacity;

- 5. Private or restricted permission will not be given to—
 - (1.) British Ambassadors or Ministers abroad when leaving;
 - (2.) Members of British Missions announcing the Accession of a Sovereign:
 - announcing the Accession of a Sovereign;
 (3.) British Officers attending Foreign
 Manœuvres;
 - (4.) Naval Officers of British Squadrons visiting Foreign Waters.
- 6. The desire of the Head of a Foreign State to confer upon a British subject in the Service of the Crown the Insignia of an Order must be notified to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs either through the British Diplomatic Representative accredited to the Head of the Foreign State, or through his Diplomatic Representative at the Court of St. James.
- 7. When His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall have taken the King's pleasure on any such application, and shall have obtained His Majesty's permission for the person in whose favour it has been made to wear the Insignia of a Foreign Order, he shall signify the same to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, in order that he may cause a Warrant, if it be a case for the issue of a Warrant as defined in Rule 2, to be prepared for the Royal Sign-Manual.

When such Warrant shall have been signed by the King, a notification thereof shall be inserted in the Gazette, stating the service for which the Foreign Order has been conferred.

Persons in whose favour such Warrants are issued will be required to pay to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department a stamp duty of 10s.

8. The Warrant signifying His Majesty's permission may, at the request and at the expense of the person who has obtained it, be registered in the College of Arms. Every such Warrant as aforesaid shall contain a clause providing that His Majesty's licence and permission does not authorise the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining to a Knight Bachelor of His Majesty's Realms.

9. When a British subject in the Service of the Crown has received the Royal permission, full or private, to accept and wear the Decoration of a Foreign Order, he will not be allowed to accept and wear the Decoration of a higher class of the same Order without His Majesty's approval, which will only be given if the higher honour is being conferred in circumstances contemplated by these Regulations.

Medals.

10. Medals which constitute a particular class of a Foreign Order are subject in all respects to the Regulations in the same manner as higher grades of the Order, except that permission to wear will be given by Letter and not by Royal Warrant.

11. The King's unrestricted permission to accept and wear a Foreign Medal will only be given in the case of a Foreign Medal conferred by the Head or Government of a Foreign State for saving or attempting to save life at sea

or on land.

12. The King's unrestricted permission to accept and wear a Foreign War Medal will only be given to (1) Officers of His Majesty's Military or Naval Forces if serving with a Foreign Army or Navy with His Majesty's licence, and (2) Military or Naval Attachés or other Officers officially attached to Foreign Armies or Navies during hostilities.

13. In exceptional cases, when for special reasons it is deemed expedient that the acceptance of the Medal should not be declined, His Majesty will grant restricted permission. Such cases will be judged on their merits, and the circumstances in which the Medal may be worn will be specified in the Letter conveying His Majesty's permission.

14. The term "person in the Service of the Crown" includes persons in receipt of a salary or pension from Public Funds, or holding a Royal Commission in any part of His Majesty's Dominions, Protectorates, or Possessions.

15. Ladies are subject to the Regulations in all respects in the same manner as men.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING FOREIGN ORDERS AND MEDALS APPLICABLE TO PERSONS NOT IN THE SERVICE OF THE CROWN.

Orders.

- 1. It is the King's wish that no subject of His Majesty shall wear the Insignia of any Foreign Order without having previously obtained His Majesty's permission to do so, signified either:
 - (a) By Warrant under the Royal Sign-Manual, or
 - (b) By private permission conveyed through His Majesty's Private Secretary.
- . 2. Permission given by Warrant under the Royal Sign-Manual will enable the Insignia

of the Foreign Order to be worn at all times and without any restriction.

Private permission will only enable the Insignia to be worn on the occasions specified in the terms of the letter from the King's Private Secretary conveying the Royal sanction.

3. The full and unrestricted permission by Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual is designed to meet cases where the Decoration may be said to have been earned by some valuable service rendered to the Head of the State conferring it, or to the State itself. Application will be made to His Majesty for full permission by His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs on behalf of any person who, not being at the time in the Service of the Crown, is either in the salaried employment of a Foreign State or has rendered valuable services within the period of two years immediately preceding the notification of the Decoration to His Majesty's Government as prescribed under Rule 5.

The expression "valuable services" must be

construed as meaning some service rendered to Foreign Head of State or Government specifically, and must be indisputably valuable in the strict sense of the word. Though such services need not necessarily be gratuitous, as in the case of a person actually in the employ of a Foreign Government, they must be unconnected with any transaction of a commercial or financial character brought about in the ordinary course of business. The term "valuable services" does not therefore, as a general rule, apply to services connected with the fulfilment of Government or Municipal contracts, the financing of Government or Municipal loans. It also does not include Red Cross Services, presentation of objects of value to Public Museums and Institutions, pecuniary donations or endowments, personal performances, services in connection with Exhibitions and Industrial Congresses, services in the domain of art, literature, science, education, and agriculture, services rendered by British subjects in the capacity of honorary foreign Consular Officers.

4. Private or restricted permission is contemplated for Decorations which have been conferred in recognition of personal attention to the Head of a Foreign State or Member of a Reigning House, and which are therefore of a more or less-complimentary character. Private permission is as a rule only given on exceptional occasions, when in the public interest and for political reasons it is deemed expedient that the acceptance of a Foreign Decoration should not be declined.

Decoration should not be declined.

5. Both in the case of full and in that of private permission the matter will be submitted to the King by His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

The desire of the Head of a Foreign State to confer upon a British subject the Insignia of an Order, or the fact that he has done so, must be notified to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs either through the British Diplomatic Representative accredited to the Head of the Foreign State, or through the Diplomatic Representative of the latter at the Court of St. James. His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall be under no obligation to consider claims that are not brought to his notice through one of these channels.

6. When His Majesty's Principal Secretary

of State for Foreign Affairs shall have taken the King's pleasure on any such application, and shall have obtained His Majesty's permission for the person in whose favour it has been made to wear the Insignia of a Foreign Order, he shall signify the same to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, in order that he may cause a Warrant, if it be a case for the issue of a Warrant as defined in Rule 2, to be prepared for the Royal Sign-Manual.

When such Warrant shall have been signed by the King, a notification thereof shall be inserted in the Gazette, stating the service for which the Foreign Order has been conferred.

Persons in whose favour such Warrants are issued will be required to pay to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home

Department a stamp duty of 10s.

7. The Warrant signifying His Majesty's permission may, at the request and at the expense of the person who has obtained it, be registered in the College of Arms. Every such Warrant as aforesaid shall contain a clause providing that His Majesty's licence and permission does not authorise the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining to a Knight Bachelor of His Majesty's Realms.

8. When a British subject has received the Royal permission, full or private, to accept and wear the Decoration of a Foreign Order, he will not be allowed to accept the Decoration of a higher class of the same Order without His Majesty's approval. His Majesty will in such cases grant permission only if the promotion in the Order is conferred for fresh services

which come within these Regulations.

9. These Regulations apply only to Orders of Chivalry. Decorations conferred by Private Societies and Decorations of a purely academic nature, and all Decorations not being Orders of Chivalry, may be accepted without His Majesty's permission, but must not be worn.

Exception is made in the case of a few Foreign Orders, which, though not in strictness Orders of Chivalry, yet are of such a high distinction that, for the purpose of these Regulations, they are to be considered and treated as Orders of Chivalry.

10. Ladies are subject to the Regulations in all respects in the same manner as men.

Medals.

11. Medals which constitute a particular class of a Foreign Order are subject in all respects to the Regulations in the same manner as higher grades of the Order, except that permission to wear will be given by Letter and not by Royal Warrant.

12. Medals for saving or attempting to save life at sea or on land conferred on behalf of the Head or Government of a Foreign State may be accepted without His Majesty's special permission, and may be worn at Court.

13. Medals conferred by Private Societies or Institutions and Commemorative Medals may be accepted without permission, but none of these Medals can be worn.

14. The King's permission must be obtained for any other Medal to be worn. No permission is needed to accept a Foreign Medal if it is not intended to be worn.

15. His Majesty will not grant permission to wear any Foreign War Medal if the person on whom it is to be or has been conferred was

during the war acting in contravention of the Foreign Enlistment Act.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 19TH MAY 1914.)

Animals (Landing from Ireland) Amendment Order of 1914 (No. 13).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling

them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

PART I.

Revocation of Existing Orders.

1. The Animals (Landing from Ireland) Order of 1914, and the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Amendment Orders of 1914 (Nos. 1-12) are hereby revoked.

Regulation of Landing.

2. Cattle, sheep, goats or swine brought from Ireland shall not be landed in Great Britain except in accordance with the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Orders of 1913, as amended by this Order.

PART II.

Landing of animals intended either for slaughter within Landing Place or for movement out of Landing Place, after ten hours' detention.

- 3.—(1.) Cattle, sheep, goats or swine put on board at any port mentioned in the First Schedule hereto may be landed at any Landing Place, or part thereof, described in the Second Schedule hereto and at no other Landing Place.
- (2.) Animals landed at any Landing Place or part thereof described in the Second Schedule hereto shall be subject to the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Orders of 1913.

PART III.

Landing Places available for Animals from Ports in Third Schedule.

4. Cattle, sheep, goats or swine put on board at any port mentioned in the Third Schedule hereto may be landed at any Landing Place or part thereof described in the Fourth or Fifth Schedule hereto and at no other Landing Place.

Conditions applicable to Animals landed at certain Landing Places.

- 5.—(1.) This Article shall apply to all animals landed at any Landing Place described in the Fourth Schedule hereto.
- (2.) Animals so landed shall be subject to the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Orders of 1913, except that the animals shall not be moved from the Landing Place until the expiration of ninety-six hours after the landing of the last animal of the cargo, and then only in accordance with the following provisions of this Article.
- (3.) Any swine accompanied by a licence granted under the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1906 may be moved from the Landing Place with the permission of an Inspector of the Board. Such swine shall be subject to the provisions of that Order as to subsequent movement and as to detention and isolation after arrival at the place of destination specified in the licence.

- (4.) The removal of any other animal from the Landing Place must be authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Board.
- (5.) Before the issue of a licence under the preceding paragraph (4) for movement from the Landing Place each animal to which the Licence relates shall be marked in such manner as may be required by an Officer of the Board.
- (6.) Each animal moved with a Licence granted by an Inspector of the Board shall be moved to a slaughterhouse or other place of detention specified in the licence, and not elsewhere, and (except as hereinafter provided) shall be there detained and isolated, under the supervision of a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority, from other animals for a period of fourteen days after the date of its arrival, unless it is previously slaughtered in the place of detention; provided that the animal may, with the written authority of an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the place of detention is situate, be allowed to come in contact in the place of detention with other animals, and in case of such contact all the animals shall become liable to detention and isolation as if they had been moved to the place of detention under the same licence.
- (7.) Animals moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route, and as far as practicable by railway, and duving such movement shall not be permitted to come in contact with animals not being moved under this Article.
- (8.) In the case of any animal slaughtered in the Landing Place, the head or feet or the hide shall not be removed from the carcase until after the carcase has been examined in the Landing Place by a Veterinary Inspector of the Board.

PART IV.

Requirement of slaughter of animals landed at certain Landing Places.

6. Animals landed at any Landing Place or part thereof described in the Fifth Schedule hereto shall be subject to the provisions of the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Orders of 1913, except that the animals shall not be moved from the Landing Place, and shall be slaughtered therein within ninety-six hours after their landing.

Special Provisions as to Animals Destined for Manchester and Deptford Irish Animals Landing Places.

- 7.—(1.) Animals, if intended to be landed at the Manchester Landing Place under this Order, shall not be carried through the Eastham lock until they have been examined by a Veterinary Inspector of the Board, and unless and until the Inspector certifies that his examination and information do not show that there is, or during the voyage has been, an animal on board affected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.
- (2.) A vessel conveying animals intended to be landed at the Deptford Landing Place shall not, whilst any of such animals are on board, enter any port in Great Britain other than the Port of London.

PART V.

Conditions applicable to animals shipped from Port in Sixth Schedule.

8. Cattle, sheep, goats or swine put on board at a port mentioned in the Sixth Schedule hereto may be landed at any Landing Place or part thereof, and on landing shall be subject to the provisions of this Order applicable to animals landed at that Landing Place or part thereof.

PART VI.

GENERAL.

Condition of Landing at any Landing Place.

9. The landing of any animals under this Order must be authorised by the Superintendent or person in charge of the Landing Place.

Provisions as to Licences.

- 10.—(1.) Where animals are moved with a licence under this Order, the licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an Inspector of the Local Authority, or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District, by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.
- (2.) A movement licence granted under this Order shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue.
- (3.) A copy of a licence under this Order shall be sent by the Inspector granting the licence to the Clerk of the Local Authority of the District in which the place of detention is situate.

Conditional Permits.

11. An Inspector of the Board may impose conditions on the removal of anything from a Landing Place for which a permission granted by an Inspector is required, and if any person fails to comply with any such condition which is specified in the permission and which he is thereby required to observe he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Movement from Landing Place subject to other Orders and to Regulations.

12. Nothing in this Order or in any Order relating to the landing or movement of animals brought from Ireland shall be deemed to authorise the movement of an animal in contravention of an Order of the Board or a Regulation of a Local Authority.

Offences.

13.—(1.) If any animal shall be landed in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the landing, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is

landed shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act. 1894.

- (2.) If any animal shall be moved in contravention of this Order, or is not slaughtered or is not isolated as hereby required, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Landing Place, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the owner and person in charge of the animal which is not so slaughtered or isolated, as the case may be, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
- (3.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, before the expiration of the period of detention, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark on any animal affixed under this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act,

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

14. The provisions of this Order, except where it is otherwise provided, shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Commencement,

15. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-second day of May, nineteen hundred and fourteen.

Short Title.

16. This Order may be cited as the ANIMALS (Landing from Ireland) Amendment Order or 1914 (No. 13).

Cattle, sheep, goats or swine which have been moved from any Irish Animals Landing Place before the twenty-second day of May, nineteen hundred and fourteen, under a Licence granted by an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries under the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Amendment Order of 1914 (No. 5) shall on that date cease to be subject to the conditions as to subsequent slaughter or detention and isolation prescribed by that Order.

A Notice of Dissolution of Partnership not signed by all the Partners, or their legal representatives, must be accompanied by a Statutory Declaration made by a Solicitor of the Supreme Court to the effect that such notice is given in pursuance of the terms of the partnership to which it relates.
