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Naples, June 9.

THe Spanish Fleet is now ready, and will shortly put to Sea, together with the Gallies of Naples, Sicily, Sardinia, and Turfis, who are in this Port, 21 in number. Two days ago happened a great disturbance in this City, occasioned by a Quarrel betwixt the Spanish Soldiers of the Armada, and the Footmen of some of the Nobility of this place, several were killed on both sides, all the Shops were shut up, and the Nobility began to be engaged, which might have proved of ill Consequence, but the Soldiers being Commanded on Board their respective Ships, all is now quiet again.

Rome, June 6. The Cardinal *de Fowbin* had on Monday last a long Audience of the Pope, about the Business of the French Bishops, who still want their Bulls; To accommodate which, several Expedients have been proposed, but there has yet been none found to please both Parties. By the last Courier from Spain, the Constable of *Colonus* received a Commillion not only to perform on St. Peter's day next the Ceremony of presenting to the Pope, in the Name of the King of Spain, the Annual Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples, but also to continue the said Function at all times hereafter, when his Catholick Majesty shall not appoint his Ordinary Ambassador to perform the same. Here has lately happened a difference between the Emperors Ambassador and this Court, on the occasion of his Heydukes having fallen upon, and treated very severely, the Sbirris or Officers of Justice, who had Imprisoned one of his Excellencies Servants; which the Pope is much offended at, and has caused a Monitory to be Published, by which the said Heydukes are required to Surrender themselves into the Hands of Justice within three days, and several Persons living in the Neighbourhood where the Fact was committed, being suspected to have assisted them therein, are seized, and put into Prison. The Ambassador complains of this and several other affronts from the Sbirris, and is retired to *Genzano*, a small place, some miles out of Town; where he will continue till he receives Instructions about this matter from *Vienna*. The Pope has sent Orders to his Gallies to Sail for the *Levant*.

Venice, June 12. This Week are arrived at the *Lido* 900 or 1000 German Soldiers, who have been lately raised for the Service of this Republick, and more are expected, which will be sent to the *Levant* with the Convoy that may be ready to Sail towards the end of this month. We hear from the *Morea*, That Lieutenant General *Mocenigo* had taken a Review of the Venecian Forces, and found them in a very good Condition, and that he was putting Things in a readiness against the Doge's arrival, in order to some Enterprize, as 'tis believed, against *Ganea*, in the Kingdom of *Candia*. They write from *Dalmatia*, That Signior *Delfino*, General of the Venecian Forces on that side, had assembled a Body of them together, to make an Incurtion into the Enemies Territories, where they are like to meet with no great Resistance, since the Turks have drawn most of their Troops towards *Hungary*.

Turin, June 16. The Imperial Regiments of Horse of *Montecuculi* and *Paisi* passed through this place the

13th and 14th instant on their march to our Camp at *Burinasque*, within a League of *Pignerol*; Most of the German Cavalry is already arrived there, and the rest follow with great marches; The Forces of the Milanese were to begin theirs yesterday, to the number of 9000 Foot and 3000 Horse. In the mean time our Duke has caused Magazines to be provided at *Corn* and *Lozee* towards the Valley of *Aost*. The Enemies Troops on our Frontiers are divided in several small Bodies to defend the Retrenchments they have made near *Susa* and *Pignerol*, and at other Places to secure the Passages into *Dauphine*. *Casal* is closely blocked up by 5000 Germans and Spaniards.

Vienna, June 24. The Imperial Forces continue to assemble near *Mohatz*, and when those designed for composing the main Army, are all joyned, they will be 45000 strong, without reckoning the Hungarians, Croations, and Radziens. 'Tis confidently said here, that the Imperialists will begin the Campaign with the Siege of *Temiswarer*, or *Belgrade*. Yesterday General *Heusser*, and General *Hofkirken*, went hence to the Army. We do not yet hear that the Turkish Forces are drawn together in any considerable Body; but on the contrary, the Report continues of a Revolt among the Asiatick Troops, who are said to be dissatisfied with the present Grand Viceroy, and demand the Restoring of him who was lately displaced. The Letters from *Croatia* give an account of the Death of Count *Nicholas Erdody*, Ban, or Viceroy of that Country.

Frankfort, July 2. The French Army under the Command of the Marschal de *Lorge*, has passed the *Necker* on two Bridges, between *Manheim* and *Ladenburg*. Prince *Lewis* is at the same time on his march to follow them, and the main Body of the Saxons and Hessians advance likewise towards them; so that we are in great Expectation of a Battle, which Prince *Lewis* seems resolved to press the Enemy to, and they will hardly be able to avoid, unless they repass the *Rhine* at *Manheim*, wherein they will find much difficulty by reason of the present overflowings of that River. The rest of the Saxon and Hessien Troops, to the number of about 8000 lie near *Mentz*, in order to reinforce the Garisons of that place, *Rhinfels*, or *Mentz*, according as they see the Dauphin directs his march from the *Moselle*, which he passed two or three days ago. The late Governor of *Hydelberg* has been found Dead in a Vineyard near the *Necker*, being killed as 'tis supposed by some of the Country People.

Cologne, July 3. The Dauphin arrived on the first instant at *Montroyal*, where, and at *Traerbach* his Troops passed the *Moselle* on the 29th and 30th past. The Brandenburgers under General *Fleming*, who were marching towards the *Meuse*, are Countermanded, and have Orders to joyn the Neuburgers near *Cockenheim*, which so soon as they have done, together with the Troops of *Cologne* and *Manster*, this Body will advance towards *Bon*, and higher up towards the *Moselle* if it be found necessary. The Elector of *Saxony* is going to Drink the Waters at *Swalbach*.

Paris, July 3. By the Letters from *Thoulou* of the 22d past we have the Confirmation that the Count *d'Estree* failed from the Gulf of *Roses* in the Night, between the 16th and 17th of the same month, with 17 Men of War, taking his Course towards the Ocean, to joyn the Marschal de *Tourville*, of whose arrival in the Bay of *Lagos* near
