Turin, June 29.

Our Army continues encamped near *Pignerol*, and is daily reinforced. The Troops of the Milanese are on their march thither. *Casal* is closely blockt up, and we hear that the Spaniards have taken the Castle of *St. George*, which was defended by 300 men, most of whom were put to the Sword. We have Advice from the Valley of *Barcelonnette*, That the *Sieur de la Roche*, who Commands our Troops quartered on that side, had laid an Ambush for the Enemy, and cut off 400 of them. Prince *Eugene of Savoy* arrived here on Monday last from *Vienna*. *Venice*, July 3. The Doge arrived on the 13th of the last month at *Corfu*. The Popes Gallies are joyned with those of *Malta*, and have taken their Course towards the *Levant*.

Vienna, July 4. The Letters from the Imperial Camp near *Mohatz* of the 29th past, tell us, That on the 26th 5 Regiments of Foot marched under the Command of General *Archinto* to *Verismarton*, and pass'd the *Danube* in Boats; The rest of the Imperial Infantry was to pass the same River on the 29th and 30th, and two Bridges were laying over it for the passage of the Horse, which would be finish'd in two days. We have Letters from *Adrianople* of the 7th of the last month, which give an account, That on the 24th of *March*, my Lord *Paget*, and the two Dutch Ambassadors, had a publick Audience of the Grand Visier, at which the Mufti, the Caimacan, and the other principal Officers of the Port were likewise present. On the 27th the Visier was Deposed; The Caimacan was advanced to that Station, and his Chyaya, a Candior, was made Caimacan; The Aga of the Janisaries was sent Passa to *Damascus*, and a new Aga, and a new Teiterdar, or Treasurer, were called from *Constantinople*. On the 4th of *April* my Lord *Paget* had Audience of the New Visier, by whom he was received with great Respect, and his Excellency was expecting in few days an Answer to the Proposals he had given him in Writing. In the mean time the Turks went on but slowly with their Preparations for the Campagne; The Janissar Aga, when these Letters came away was still at *Adrianople*, but propos'd to be going to the Camp in Ten days; About a Week after the Grand Visier would follow, and about a Fortnight after that, the Forces would begin their march, which were not then above 6000 strong, but in their march they will be joyned by the Atiaticks and Tartars, and the Troops from *Bosnia*, *Serua*, &c. and will be the latter end of *July* at soonest before their Army can reach *Belgrade*; so that the Imperialists are like to have time enough to attempt something considerable before the Enemy can be in a posture to oppose them. 'Tis generally believed that the design is upon *Belgrade*.

Hallbron, July 11. Prince *Lewis of Baden* is still encamped at *Wimpfen* on the *Neckar*. Three Imperial Regiments are on their march from the *Black Forest* to joyn him; as are also 3000 Men from *Bavaria*, and the Regiment of *Wurtemberg* consisting of 2000 Men. This day the Margrave of *Saxe* was detached with 4 Regiments; and we have just now Advice, That Prince *Lewis* has or-

dered the whole Army to pass the *Neckar* with a Resolution to march towards the Enemy.

Francfort, July 12. On the 10th instant the French attackt the Pass of *Zwingenberg*, and were twice repuls'd by 3 or 400 Saxons who were posted there, but receiving fresh and strong Reinforcements, in the third Assault they made themselves Masters of it; after which the Marechal *de Lorge* march'd with the French Army towards *Darmstadt*. The Troops of *Saxony* and *Hesse* have posted themselves at *Langen* and *Sprenglingen*, about 2 or 3 Leagues from hence.

Cologne, July 14. The Letters from the *Moselle* say, That the *Duuphin* was come to *Creutznach*, and that his Troops had pass'd the River *Nabe*. The Brandenburg Forces, under General *Fleming*, arriv'd the 12th inst. near the Village *Linburg* in the *Westerwalt*; and several Regiments of Horse are detached out of the *Neuburg* Troops, who pass'd the *Rhine* at *Bon* on the 11th, with Orders to march after the *Brandenburgers*, and to joyn with them, and the other Confederate Forces about *Meutz*, or *Francfort*, as there may be occasion.

Paris, July 13. We have at present no News of the French Fleet but what comes by several Vessels from the Coast of *Biscay* and *Lisbon*, who confirm, That the Marechal *de Tourville* continued between *Lagos* and *Cadix*, expecting the Count *d'Estree* with the *Thoulon* Squadron from the *Streights*. The French Gallies are returned to *Marseilles*, but have not brought any Troops from *Roses*, as was Reported. The Count *d'Estree*, before he Sailed out of the Gulph of *Roses*, detach'd the Count *de Blenac*, with 2 Frigates, to Cruise in the Channel of *Malta*; and sent 4 other Men of War to *Thoulon*.

Brussels, July 15. On the 11 Instant, the Duke of *Wirtemberg* was detach'd from our Camp near *Louvain*. with 13 Battalions and 20 Squadrons; The 12th he came with the Cavalry to *Ninove*, and the 13th to *Audenarde*, where the Foot arriv'd Yesterday; Part of the Garrisons of *Aech* and *Audenarde*, are gone out to joyn him; and last Night he continu'd his March towards the Enemy's Lines, between the *Lys* and the *Schelde*.

From His Majesties Camp at *Parke*, July 16. Yesterday we had a Report of the Enemies marching to *Leeuwe*, a small place between this and *Maastricht*, where Colonel *Trelawney* is posted with a Detachment of about 1000 Men; and the Army was thereupon order'd to be in a readiness to march, but we had soon after notice to the contrary, and that our last Convoy to that place was safely arriv'd there. This Morning we had Advice, That the Marechal *de Luxemburg* march'd on the 14th with 50 Squadrons of Horse, 10 Battalions, and some Field pieces to *Tongres*, in order to fall upon part of the Garrisons of *Liege* and *Maastricht*, being 18 Squadrons and some Foot, who lay encamp't near that place, under the Command of Count *Tilly*; who having notice thereof, retir'd over the *Saer*, leaving only three Squadrons to secure his Retreat; The French sent against them the like number of Squadrons of the Household, who were beaten back to their main Body, and many of them killed, but fresh Squadrons coming on, ours, who behaved themselves in this occasion with great Bravery, were oblig'd to retire, with the loss of about 100 Men, and some of their Baggage, which fell into the Enemies Hands. The two Armies continue in the same Camps.

Hague.

Hague, July 17. The States of Holland are now assembled, and the Court of Justice has given in to them the Sentence they have formed in the Business of the Sieurs Allewyn; but it is not yet made publick.

Dublin, July 5. On the 3d instant his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant embarked on the *St. Albans*, and about Noon was under sail for England, having appointed the Lord Chancellor, and Sir Cyril Wych, to be Lords Justices of this Kingdom, until the arrival of the New Lords Justices from England, who were yesterday Sworn accordingly in the Council Chamber.

Chester, July 8. On the 6th instant his Excellency the Lord Viscount Sydney, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, landed at *Nelson*, having been attended in his passage from *Dublin* by four Men of War, and three Yachts; His Excellency came hither in the Evening, and was received with the usual Solemnity; and yesterday his Excellency went from hence to *Witchurch* in his way towards *London*.

Falmouth, July 6. On Monday last came in the *Greenwich* Prize with 4 Ships laden with Coals from *Wales*, retaken by her and the *James* Galley from two French Privateers of four Guns each. The French Prisoners that were taken on Board them are brought ashore.

Plimouth, July 9. On the 7th Their Majesties Ship the *Mary*, with two Brigantines, came in from Cruising on the Coast of *France*, where she took near the *Ile of Basse* a Ship of 40 Guns, 12 Patternoes, and 140 Men, and brought her into this Port: The Prize pretends to be a *Genouevise*, but there is good ground to believe that she belongs to *Martinique*; She came last from *Havre de Grace*. Yesterday the *German* Spy, carrying two Guns, Captain *Wright* Commander, brought in a French Privateer of four Guns, and 40 Men, being a new Vessel, which had been but two days out of *St. Marks*; She was taken on the 7th instant off of the *Island*.

Wimborh, July 10. Yesterday arrived here the *Dolphin* Privateer, and brought in a French Prize of 35 Tuns, and two Guns, laden with Wine and Materials for Building; She was bound from *Havre de Grace* to *Brest*, and was taken on the 30th past 7 Leagues N. W. by N. off of *Guernsey*.

Dunelm, July 10. Yesterday in the Afternoon came into the *Downs* a new Merchant Ship, called the *Chambers* Frigate of 30 Guns, and 50 Men, Captain *Thomas South* Commander, who came in Company of the *Diligence* Packet Boat from *Shoreham*, where they were both built; On the 3th instant off of *Beachy* they were attackt by 6 French Privateers, two of 20 Guns, the rest from 16 to 18, with whom he engaged several Hours, till the Enemy bore away. The *Chambers* Frigate is very much shattered in her Masts and Rigging, but had only one Man killed, and but few wounded. The *Diligence* is gone on towards *Harwich*.

Whitehall, July 11. Their Majesties having been Graciously Pleas'd to Constitute the Right Honourable my Lord *Capel*, Sir *Cyril Wych*, and *William Dromond* Esq; to be Lords Justices of Ireland, his Lordship and Mr. *Dromond* set out yesterday on their Journey towards that Kingdom.
