

killing or taking of the following Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of West Sussex:—

Avocet, Bee-eater, Common Bittern, Little Bittern, Buzzard (all species), Chough, Tree-Creeper, Crossbill, Stone Curlew (Great Plover, Thick-knee), Flycatcher (both species), Goldfinch, Great Crested Grebe, Grosbeak, Heron, Hoopoe, Kingfisher, Common Kite, Wood Lark, Linnet, Martin (both species), Nightjar (Fern Owl, Goat Sucker, Night Hawk), Nutcracker, Oriole, Osprey, White Owl, Raven, Redpole, Roller, Siskin, Tree Sparrow, Spoonbill, Stork, Swallow, Bearded Tit, Dartford Warbler, Waxwing, Wheatear, Woodpecker (all species), Wren, Fire-crested Wren, Golden-crested Wren.

All Birds protected on Sundays in certain areas.

V. During that particular period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act of 1880, and by Clause II of this Order, does not apply, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited in that part of the Administrative County of West Sussex which is comprised in the Poor Law Unions of Horsham, Midhurst, Petworth, East Preston, Thakeham, Westbourne and Westhampnett, and in so much of the Steyning Union as is in the said Administrative County, which area is outlined in red on a map deposited with the Clerk of the County Council, sealed with the Home Office seal, and dated the 29th August, 1914.

The House Sparrow and Wood Pigeon deprived of protection.

VI. The whole of the Administrative County of West Sussex is hereby exempted from the operation of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, so far as the House Sparrow and the Wood Pigeon are concerned.

EGGS.

All Eggs protected in certain areas.

VII. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of any species of Wild Birds is prohibited for a period of five years from the date of this Order within the undermentioned areas:—

1. All land in West Sussex situate within 200 yards of the high water mark at ordinary high tide of Chichester Harbour.

2. Old Pagham Harbour (as reclaimed in 1876 and altered by the breaking in of the sea on the 16th December, 1910) and all land situate within 200 yards of its boundaries, including Allstone Beach; also all land situate within 200 yards of the Level Commissioners Rife, running from Ferry Sluice past Medmeney Sluice as far as Marsh Farm, Earley, which two areas are outlined in blue on a map deposited with the Clerk of the County Council, sealed with the Home Office seal, and dated the 29th August, 1914.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the County.

VIII. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of the following Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of West Sussex:—

Avocet, Common Bittern, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Crossbill, Stone Curlew (Great Plover, Thick-knee), Dotterel, Peregrine Falcon, Goldfinch, Great Crested Grebe, Sand-Grouse, Harrier (all species), Heron, Hobby, Hoopoe, Kestrel, Kingfisher, Common Kite, Lapwing (Peewit or Green Plover), Wood

Lark, Nightingale, Nightjar (Fern Owl, Goat Sucker, Night Hawk), Oriole, Owl (all species), Kentish Plover, Little-Ringed Plover, Raven, Redshank and other Sandpipers, Shrike (all species), Spoonbill, Tern (all species), Bearded Tit, Dartford Warbler, Wheatear, Woodpecker (all species), Wren, Fire-crested Wren, Golden-crested Wren, Wryneck.

Repeal of former Order.

IX. The Order of the 30th August, 1909, is hereby repealed.

WILD BIRD (ENGLAND).

The Wild Birds Protection (County Borough of Great Yarmouth) Order, 1914.

Dated 31st August, 1914.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1908, and upon application by the Council of the County Borough of Great Yarmouth, I hereby make the following Order:—

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (County Borough of Great Yarmouth) Order, 1914."

BIRDS.

Close Time extended.

II. The period during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall be extended throughout the County Borough of Great Yarmouth, so as to be between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of September in any year, so far as regards all Birds mentioned in the Schedule to that Act, as amended by the Act of 1881, or added thereto by Clause III of this Order, except Woodcock, the close time for which shall be extended so as to be between the 1st day of February and the 13th day of August in any year, and Snipe, Teal, and all species of Wild Duck, the close time for which will remain as fixed by the Act of 1880, namely, between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of August in any year.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

III. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the County Borough of Great Yarmouth to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the Schedule to the Act:—

Great Bustard, Crossbill, Sand Martin, Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant).
