From Franche Comte we are advised of the arrival of the Prince d'Aremberg at Befançon, where he was receiwed with all demonstration of joy by the Inhabitants, and eis said, he has Orders to transferre the Parliament and University from Dole to that place, which they intend to forrifie with all diligence, according to the model laid do n by the French, for the which he has employed an able Engineer. Paris, Aug. 23. His Majesty having by a Courier from Portugal, received intelligence of a deligne and conspiracy lately discovered for the alteration of the Government of thar Kingdom, has dispatcht away the said Courier to assure the Prince Don Pedro, that if his affairs require, he shall be ready to affift him with a strong body of men; affuring him allo, that he shall continue as he promised by Monsieur ate St. Romain his Ambassador, 'o be a Warranty for the Treaty of peace concluded botween Spain and Portugal.

The Marquis de Louvoy, whom His Majesty has made Surintendent of all his Fortifications, is ordered to take a view of all those of his new Conquests, and to strengthen them as he shall find most convenient for their desence.

From Malines we are informed, that the Soveraign Conficil of the Low-Countreys affembled in that City, have by their Proclamation permitted the publication of the new Translation of the new Testament, printed at Mons, deliving it to be Orthodox, and approved of as such, by Country's, forbidding the reception of the Popes Brief, in reconfiguration of the faid Translation, as being published withour the leave of His Catholick Majesty.

The four differeing Bishops have by their addresses and mediation of several persons on their behalf, obtained of the Comissioners, that their hearing may be deferred for a formight; some of the Commissioners have objected against the Popes Brief, as giving them a power only to condemn, but not to acquir upon the hearing, which they lay makes them not Judges in the cause of the Bishops, but only executors, of the Orders sent them by the Court of Rome, but \*tit hoped that this affair may yet admit of an accommo-

dation.

.Amsterdam Aug. 27. Several of our Greeland Fishermen are lately arrived at the Texel, and others daily expected, but not with such returns as were hoped for. Divers thips are also come in from the Eastwards and Morway.

By our Ships some time since arrived from the East-Indies we are advited, that the Fleet let out from Batavia in November 1666. confisting of about 20 sail, great and fmall, had for some time good success in the'r attempts, having attacked and ruined a Negaree or large Town belonging to the King of Macassar, wherein was his principal Magazin: where understanding by some prisoners they had taken, that the faid King of Macassar had drawn together, about 600 small Vessels, and 20000 men with whom he had belieged the Town of Bugees, which had rebe led against him; The Durch taking with them Rayab Paraicab, whom the present King of Macassar had formerly driven out of his Territories, marched towards him, upon whose appearance 5000 of the King of Macassars Army immediately revolted, by which means they eafily dispersed the sest of the Army, burning near 500 of their Vessels, and afterwards went off to the Islands of Fanda and Moluccos: in their return back in Aug. 1667. they sook in a confiderable Town of the Macassars, called Glison, defeating afterwards another Body of his men, and destroying several Villages in the Island of Gelebes. Since these successes, their fortune has much declined in those parts; the King of Macassar having reinforced his Army, and defeated both the Dutch Forces and the Bugees his Rebels, with the flaughter of 9 ro 10000 men and their General :Our people notwithstanding are again preparing at Batavia to try their fortunes upon the Enemy.

Tarmouth, Aug. 1). Here are lately arrived five fail of our fishing ships from Iseland, the rest of the Flees with the man of Wat their Convoy being hourly expected. The Colliers drive on their Trade with much fecurity. A vessel which came out of Hull was lately cast away off the Well, and all her men loft with her. This day tailed hence two ships of this place with Merchants goods, for Retterdam.

Several persons which have been employed from this place to Iseland with our Fishery, have had their goods arrested by a Danish man of War of 6 Guns, on pretence that the Trade of that place is farmed of the King of Denmark by particular persons.
