

# The London Gazette.

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Genova, July 5.

**T**his Week arrived here a Felucca from the Coast of *Provence*, the Patron whereof informs us, That the French Gallies, 35 in number, who had been before *Roset*, were returned to *Marseilles*; and that the Squadron of Men of War under the Count *d'Estree* was sailed towards the Ocean. The French give out that they have made a Peace with the *Tripolins*, and that several French Slaves have been already Released in pursuance thereof.

*Milan, July 8.* The French Garison of the Fort of *St. George*, who did not Surrender upon Articles as was reported, but were forced to yield at Discretion, are made Prisoners of War, and sent to *Novarre* and *Mortare*, but several *Montferrius*, who were taken among them, were Hanged as Rebels to the Emperor for having continued in the French Service contrary to the Ordonnance which was sometime since published in that Duchy by General *Caprara* in the Name of the Emperor. Four Thousand Germans and Spaniards remain about *Casal* to block it up; the rest of our Troops are marched to *Piedmont*.

*Venice, July 11.* By a Vessel from *Dalmatia* we have Advice, That the *Proveditore General* had detached 1500 Men to attack the Fortress of *Clobuch*, which, though it be a place of great consequence to the Enemy, has notwithstanding at present but a small Garison in it, by reason of the Turks having drawn away the greatest part of their Troops who were quartered in those Parts, to reinforce their Army in *Hungary*; They tell us farther, That another Body of our Forces had obliged the Enemy to quit *Trebigny*, an advantageous Post between *Albania* and *Dalmatia*, by which means their Territories on that side are now laid open to our Incursions; and in effect one of our Parties had made a Ravage as far as *Lubomir*, and brought back several Families who desire to settle themselves under the Protection of the Republick.

*Warsaw, June 30.* They write from *Lemberg*, that our Troops posted in the new Fort *de la Trinite* do greatly annoy the Garison of *Caminiec*, having defeated several of the Enemies Parties who were detached to bring in Provisions out of the Neighbouring Country, and having now lately taken a Convoy that was going thither, under the guard of several Hundred Tartars, who were most of them killed or taken; which has reduced the Turks at *Caminiec* to great Necessities; and to

streighten them yet more, another Body of our Forces is ordered to encamp between the Fort of *la Trinite*, and the Fortress of *Sorocke*, where they will be also at hand to succour either of these places, in case the Enemy, with the assistance of the Moldavians should design an attempt upon either of them. Here have been of late several Reports that the Muscovites were marching with a strong Army against the Tartars, but they do not come from such Hands as may be much depended upon. The new Envoy of *Tartary* has had Audience of the King of *Poland*, and the Business he comes upon is referred to the Consideration of the Senate.

*Vienna, July 15.* The Letters from our Camp near *Veris Marton* of the 7<sup>th</sup> instant give an account that their Bridge over the *Danube* being finished, the rest of the Imperial Foot (part being gone over before in Boats) passed that River on the 3<sup>d</sup>. The Auxillary Troops of *Lunenburg*, and the Imperial Artillery followed on the 4<sup>th</sup>; The Baggage on the 5<sup>th</sup>, and all the Horse on the 6<sup>th</sup>, so that when this Courier came away the whole Army was encamped on the other side of the *Danube*, where they expected the Conjunction of 6000 *Brandenburgers*, and several Regiments from *Transilvania*; and in the mean time were preparing for their farther march towards *Temeswar*, and for the Besieging, as it is generally believed, of that place; which had very much alarmed the Turks, who are not in a Condition to oppose us; for by the last Advices from *Peter Waradin* and *Belgrade*, the Enemy had not then above 14 or 15000 Men on those Frontiers; and had yet no News of the march of the Army under the Grand Visier; However, the Seraskier who Commands the Ottoman Forces now about *Belgrade*, not to be wanting in his Care for the Security and Relief of *Temeswar* in case it should be attacked, had sent a new Batta (with a Reinforcement of Men) to Command there; had ordered two Bridges to be laid over the *Danube* for the passage of the Troops that might be Commanded that way, and had Countermarched 5000 Turks that were designed upon an Expedition against *Brod* or *Marovitz*, and ordered them to march towards the *Danube*. From *Croatia* we have advice, That Captain *Siba*, with 600 Croats had made an Incursion into the Turkish Territories, and had surprized and burnt the Fort of *Gratzinza* in *Bosnia*, killing divers Turks, and taking several Prisoners; after which he returned with a very good Booty of Cattle and other Plunder.

From the Confederate Camp under the Command of Prince Lewis of Baden, near *Kockendorf*, July 19. We encamped here on the 16<sup>th</sup> instant, being about 30000 strong; On the 17<sup>th</sup>, 2000 Horse was sent out under Lieutenant Colonel *Mollendorf* to observe the Enemy, who marched the same day to *Langenbruch*; and 300 Foot were detached to secure the Pass near *Lansfen*; 8000 Saxons and Hessian Horse will joyn us on the 23<sup>d</sup> of this month, and the Foot in a day or two after; 6000 *Brandenburgers*, and 3000 *Neuburgers* are likewise
