His Week arrived here a Felucca from the Coast of Provence, the Patron whereof informs us, That the French Gallies, 35 in number, who had been before Roses, were returned to Marseilles; and that the Squadron of Men of War under the Count d'Estree was sailed towards the Ocean. The French give out that they have made a Peace with the Tripolins, and that feveral French Slaves have been already Released in pursuance thereof.

Milan, July 8. The French Garison of the Fort of Se. Vinite, July 11.
