

house and premises known as Highfield and the house and premises known as St. Andrew's, and extending thence eastward to and along such wall or fence for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its eastern end on the western side of Church Path; and extending thence first eastward to and then southward along the middle of Church Path for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Frederick's Place, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Frederick's Place, for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to its junction with the Great North Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of the Great North Road for a distance of eight chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint John, Whetstone, from the said New Parish of Christ Church, North End, Finchley."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 30 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, as amended by Section 2 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1893, it is (amongst other things) provided that, if a majority of the whole Council of a Borough agree to petition, and the Council thereupon petition, The King for the alteration of the number and boundaries of the Wards of the Borough, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, from time to time, by Order in Council, to fix the number of Wards into which the Borough shall be divided, and that the Borough shall be divided into that number of Wards, and that where an Order in Council has been so made the Secretary of State shall appoint a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the boundaries of the Wards and apportioning the Councillors among them.

And whereas a majority of the whole Council of the Borough of Pontefract did, on the 4th day of March, 1914, agree to petition, and the Council of the said Borough thereupon petitioned, His Majesty for the alteration of the number and boundaries of the Wards of the said Borough.

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 14th day of May, 1914, to fix the number of Wards into which the Borough of Pontefract should be henceforth divided, and to order and direct that the number of the said Wards should be six.

And whereas on the 29th day of May, 1914, the Right Honourable Reginald McKenna, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, did appoint Harold McKenna, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, a Commissioner to prepare a Scheme for determining the boundaries of such Wards, and for apportioning the Councillors of the said Borough among such Wards.

And whereas by Section 30 (5) of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is provided that, in case of alteration of Wards, the Commissioner shall so apportion among the altered Wards the Councillors for those Wards as to provide for their continuing to represent as large a number as possible of their former constituents.

And whereas the said Commissioner has accordingly prepared the following Scheme, dated the 29th day of July, 1914:—

"BOROUGH OF PONTEFRACT.

"I, Harold McKenna, in pursuance of the powers given me by virtue of the appointment under the said Act, do hereby determine, as hereinafter mentioned, the boundaries of the six Wards into which the said Borough is divided, which Wards are hereinafter named and numbered as follows, that is to say:—

- No. 1. WEST WARD.
- No. 2. NORTH WARD.
- No. 3. EAST WARD.
- No. 4. SOUTH WARD.
- No. 5. MILL HILL WARD.
- No. 6. CENTRAL WARD.

And where in the following descriptions of the Ward boundaries (so far as such descriptions do not refer to the Borough boundary) a street, road or footpath is given as the boundary of a Ward, the boundary is to be taken as the centre of such street, road or footpath, and where any street or road is described as joining another street or road, the point of junction is to be taken as the point at which lines drawn along the centres of the two streets or roads and continued would intersect each other, and a point described as being opposite a street or road is to be taken as opposite the centre of the street or road.

And where a river or stream is given as the boundary of a Ward, the boundary (except when it refers to the Borough boundary) is to be taken as the *medium filum* of such river or stream.

No. 1. WEST WARD.

I do hereby determine that West Ward shall comprise so much of the Borough of Pontefract as is contained within the following boundary:—

Commencing at the northern boundary of the Borough at the point of intersection of the Borough boundary with the Leeds and Barnsdale Main Road and thence proceeding in a south-easterly and easterly direction along the centre of the Leeds and Barnsdale Main Road to the intersection of Back Tanshelf thence in a westerly direction along the centre of Back Tanshelf to and along the centre of Crab Hill and Love Lane to the Pontefract Barracks wall thence following the said wall in a south-easterly direction to the centre of the Wakefield and Weeland Main Road thence along the centre of the said road in a south-westerly direction to the Borough boundary thence following the Borough boundary in a generally
