Long, Jane Long, George Lord, William Marsh, Harriet Marsh, Edwin Potten, James Sayers and Alan Tyrrell, at their decease, subject to the condition that no part of the coffins containing the bodies shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

WHITLEY AND MONKSEATON.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of St. Paul, Cullercoats, in the County of Northumberland (Civil Parish of Whitley and Monkseaton), and in the Churchyard, with the following exceptions, that is to say —

- (a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.
- (b) In any earthen grave now existing in thesaid Churchyard the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is provided that, in case it appears to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burnal-grounds or places of burnal, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the

churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such Parish.

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Llanferras, in the county of Denbigh, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in the Civil Parish of Llanferras aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that the burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed.

And whereas, by an Order in Council dated the 21st day of September, 1914, notice of such representation was given, and it was ordered that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 2nd day of November, 1914, and that the said Order in Council be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation one month before the said 2nd day of November, 1914.

And whereas the said Order in Council of the 21st day of September, 1914, has been duly published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed in the manner directed by the said Order.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the opening of any new burial-ground in the said Civil Parish of Llanferras, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, be and the same is hereby prohibited, and that burials in the said Parish be discontinued as follows, viz.—

Llanferras.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint Berres, Parish of Llanferras, county of Denbigh; and in the old portion of the churchyard, with the following exceptions, that is to say —

In the undermentioned earthen graves now existing in the said portion of the Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the bodies of the following persons at their decease, viz.:—

- (1) Robert Edwards, of Pentre Carrig, inthe said Parish, in the grave of his wife,
- (2) John Hughes, of Maeshafn, in the said' Parish, in the grave of his wife, subject in each case to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth-less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
