a continuance of his Government; and have accordingly in-Attucted their Deputies to pass it home in the General Assembly. They having also been informed that some Endeavours have been used by the Roman Catholicks to suppress thole of a courtery perswation, in matter of Religion, have ordered them so will not only upon the point of their Preservation, that they may not be deprived of their Charges, and the free exercise of the Protestant Religion; but also to take care, that they may not for the future be stigmatized with the Brand of Hereticks, but mentioned with the more favourable Name only of Diffentore

Most of the other Diets have passed without diffurbance, excepting only that of Cracovy, wherein there has been fome Disputes between the Genery and the Senators, the latter having received some affront from the Nobility, who spated not the Person of the Palatine himself; but the particulars

are not yet fold us.

The Nobility are resolved to appear in Arms at the Diet at Warfam, the better to prevent any delign that heay be laid by foreigners against the liberty of the Election. His Maje-By feems not at a I moved to change his resolution, and has in compliance to the States of the leffer Poland, not only dismiss the Duke of Newbourgs Envoye from the Cours but also the Agents sent from the Eniperour and the Elector of Brandebourg.

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. Bruffelts , sug. 29. The Marquils de Caftel Rodrigo having taken a View of the forces at their Rendezvous hear Louvaine, went also into the City, wherethere hath been a great Contell between the Spaniards which were sent this ther to quarter, and the Citizens, the later flanding sliffly to the maintenance of their Priviledges, which commits the defence of that place to the care of the Citizens, exempting them from the burthen of taking in a Garrison; in the Di-fpute the Soldiery possest themselves of two of the Gares, and farther inconveniencies might have followed, had not the Marquils composed the difference; so that all things are now quiet, though the Citizens seem dissatisfied, that they are obliged at present to lose that part of their Priviledge, and in consideration of the vicinity and strength of the French, are necessitated to admit of a Garrison

to take his way thorow France.

The Marquis having sertled the Affairs about Louvaine, and ordered the forces into convenient Quarters, intends for Malines, Dendermond, and afterwards to take a View of faveral Garrisons in Flanders' He has ordered a strict account to be pri-ately taken in all places upon the River of Antwerp, of all the Companies in each Fort, that the Publick may not receive prejudice by falle Musters ? and has taken fuch Order for the furure Establishment of the Pinances, that all forts of perfons thay be comprehended, and no fraud be used upon falle pretentions of Exemption.

This week palled through Ghent the Bilhop of Bester's, the French late' Ambassador in the Court of Poland, in his return for Paris, having with him a lett of curioully spoted Coach-horses, as a Present from that King to the

Dauphin.

The French have filled all their Garrisons with forces, and are builty employ'd in their Quarters in railing men and compleating their Companies, to the no small jealousie

of the neighbourhood.

'I is faid that the States of these Countreys finding themfelves burthened by the present method of raising Moneys, have agreed upon a new project which they have sent into Spain for raising several Milions yearly, which is to comprehend the Ecclesiasticks and Religious as well as the

ple, Ambassador from His Majesty of Great Eritain, arriving at Riswick, the States sent the Sieur Heselt their Sieward, to complement him in their names, The next week 'tis believed he will make his publick Entry.

The Stares have by their Letter to the Swifs Cantons invited them to enter into the Friple Alliance concluded between England, Swedeland, and the States of those

United Provinces.

The Queen Regent of Spain has not yet sent the States any diswer to their Letter which they sent to her, to put her in mind of the promise made for the advancement of a funnie of Moneys to the Swedes, upon the conclusion of the Triple Alliance.

From the Texel we are told of the arrival there of three ships in seven weeks from Carassou, and the coasts of Guiny, from whence they are retured with a rich fraught, informing that the Prince and the St. Katherine, two thips sent out from umflerdam were lafely (before their departure) arrived at Caraffon. Several ships are likewise arrived from Gadie. and lome other of their Fishermen from Groenland.

Paris, Septem. 1. The Parliament of Paris have prohibited all entercourse with the City of Rouen, as hiving been, and still continuing much infected with the Plague,

which is much abated in leveral parts of Picardy.

The Arch-Bishop of Sent, and the Bishop of Chaalome and Meaux have attended His Majesty, desking some accommodation might be made in the buliness relating to the 4 dislenting Bishops, but His Majetty resuled to meddle in that affair, telling them they might apply themselves to the Nun-cio, if they had any propositions to make of that nature.
