

England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of Saint Mary, Gateforth, situate in the Parish of Brayton, in the County of York, and in the Diocese of York.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Mary, Gateforth, situate as aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said Parish of Brayton, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Mary, Gateforth, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Gateforth cum Hambleton.’

“And with the like consent of the said Cosmo Gordon, Archbishop of York, (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Mary, Gateforth, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same Church for the time being: Provided always, that, so long as the Reverend Thomas Cheese, Clerk in Holy Orders, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Brayton, shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said Church of Saint Mary, Gateforth, situate as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said Thomas Cheese: And Provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The District Chapelry of Gateforth cum Hambleton, being:—All that part of the

Parish of Brayton, in the County of York, and in the Diocese of York, which is included in the Townships of Gateforth and Hambleton, save and except that part of the said Township of Gateforth which is bounded upon the south by the Township of Burn, upon the east by the Township of Brayton, both in the said Parish of Brayton, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said Township of Brayton from the said Township of Gateforth crosses the middle of Gateforth New Road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Gateforth New Road for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern end of the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered 1 upon the map or plan annexed to this Representation, and extending thence southward to and along the said fence and along the fence forming the eastern boundary of the close numbered 2 upon the said map or plan for a distance in all of thirty-nine chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned fence meets the fence forming the northern boundary of the towing path on the northern side of the Selby Canal, and continuing thence southward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line (thereby crossing the said towing path and the said canal) for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Township of Gateforth from the said Township of Burn.”

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of York.

“nor (except to such extent and upon such conditions as may be directed by the prescribed Officer) shall such report or any of the said documents or information be shown or disclosed to any counsel or any solicitor for either of the parties.”

Rule 28d.—The Court or a Judge may at any time (and whether or not any application be made by any person for such purpose) discharge any order made under these Rules whereby a person has been admitted to take
