Naples, August 4.

THE new Levies are continued in this Kingdom for the Service of the State of Milan. Several Vessels laden with Ammunition and other Necessaries for the Garrison of *Finai*, will Sail from hence with the first fair Wind. Two Gallies are fitting out here, being appointed to Cruise for the security of our Coasts, which have been of late infested by several small Corsairs of *Barbary*.

Venice, August 21. This Week, if the Wind and Weather permit, another Convoy will set Sail for the *Levant*, with a great Supply of Provisions and Ammunition, as well as Money and Recruits for the Army, which, according to our last Advice from the *Morea*, consisted of about 20000 Men. The Popes Gallies, with those of *Malta*, had joined our Fleet, and the Doge *Morofini* had sent a Squadron of Men of War to Cruise in the *Archipelago*, and to raise Contributions upon the Islands; We expect our next Letters will tell us, that he has undertaken some great Enterprize, for the good Success of which, the Senare have ordered publick Devotions. From *Dalmatia* they write, That our Troops had in a late Excursion made a great Ravage in the Enemies Country, and that among the Prisoners they took there was the Son of the Bassa of *Periga*, with some other Persons of Consideration among the Turks. The last Letters from *Rome* tell us, That the Difference between the Emperors Ambassador and that Court was not yet adjusted; The Pope had offered to Grant a Pardon to the Ambassadors Servants, who had assaulted his Archers, upon Condition he would desire it, but his Excellency had refused to make this step on his side. The Busineis about the French Bishops continues still under great Difficulties.

Warsaw, August 15. On the 9th instant the King of *Poland* received Advice, That a great Party of Tartars had made an Incurfion into the Province of *Wolinia*, but being met by some Troops of the Great Duchy of *Lithuania*, who were marching to our Army, which is encamped near *Wisnezich*, the Tartars, after a

sharp dispute, were routed, 200 of them killed upon the place, and 100 taken Prisoners. We hear likewise that our Troops posted in the new Fort near *Caminiceo*, have lately defeated another Party of Turks and Tartars; The Prisoners they took Reported, That a Body of 10000 Tartars was come into the Neighbourhood of that Place; And that the Cham was marched with the like number towards *Hungary*. Two days ago arrived here from *Danzicke* the Abbot *Polignac*, Ambassador of *France*, who had yesterday a private Audience of the King. A General Diet of this Kingdom will be held here in *December* next.

Vienna, Aug. 22. On Sunday last the Emperor and the whole Court assisted at a Solemn Procession from the Church of the *Augustins* to the Cathedral of *St. Stephens*, where publick Prayers were made for the Prosperity of his Imperial Majesties Arms against the Turks, and particularly for the good Success of the Siege of *Belgrade*; and on this Occasion his Imperial Majesty made a Religious Vow, to Rebuild all the Churches in *Hungary* that have been Demolished in the Course of this War, and to lay the Foundation of a new one on the Hill not far from this City, called *Calenberg*, on which side the Imperial and the rest of the Confederate Forces came down upon the Turks and raised the Siege of this Place in 1683. We have an account from *Croatia*, That the Baron *Dellunovich* had with 2000 Men made an Excursion as far as *Busin*, destroying all the Corn and Forage thereabouts, and taking divers Prisoners; and that another Party of Croats had been as far as *Cruppa*, and had made a great Spoil in those Parts. Divers Vessels pass daily down the *Danube* with Ammunition and Provisions for the Imperial Army before *Belgrade*. The Count *de Torofini*, Envoy from the Duke of *Guastalla*, having received the Investiture for that Duchy, is now on his return to *Italy*; The like Ceremonies will be shortly performed for the Electorate of *Saxony*, and the Duchy of *Mecklenburg*, for which the Preliminaries are not yet adjusted.

Hailbron, Aug. 29. The Confederate Army is still encamped near this place; On the 26th arrived here Prince *Lewis* of *Neuburg*, Great Master of the *Tentonic* Order, and Coadjutor of

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of *Menin*, to visit Prince *Lewis of Baden*. The Dauphin has left the French Army, and is returned towards *Verfailles*, having made Detachments for *Piedmont* and *Flanders*; The latter is to pass the *Rhine* at *Philipsburg*, and thence to march towards *Creuznach* and the *Moselle*, being commanded by the *Marschal de Boufflers*.

Frankfort, Aug. 30. We have an account from *Strasbourg*, that orders were given for the furnishing of Provisions for the Detachment of 10000 Men that's designed for *Piedmont*, in the several places through which they are to pass. And that the City of *Strasbourg* is commanded to provide 10000 measures of Corn, and all the other places of the *Upper and Lower Alsace* proportionably, for the French Magazines, which are at present very empty: We are told likewise, that the Hospitals at *Strasbourg, Landau, &c.* are filled with sick Soldiers who have been sent thither from the French Army.

Coblentz, Aug. 31. Two days ago passed by this place by Water 340 Sailors, with their Officers, who have been raised for the Service of the States General of the *United Provinces*, and they told us, that many others, who were listed for the same Service, would follow in few days.

Cologne, Sept. 1. We have Advice from *Creuznach*, that the French had laid two Bridges over the River *Nahr* near *Soberenheim* for the passage of the Detachment which is sent from their Army on the *Rhine* towards *Flanders*. The States of *Fuliers* and *Bergues* are now assembled at *Dusseldorp* to grant the Elector *Palatin* a Subsidy for maintaining his Forces. The *Minister Troops* were reinforced 3 days ago by the Regiment of *Cernaris*, which had been some time quartered about *Coblentz*, and they are now marching to join with those of the Elector *Palatin*, who are posted in the *Eiffelt*, about 8 Leagues from hence.

Edinburg, Aug. 31. The Lords of the Privy Council, pursuant to His Majesties Letter, have ordered a Proclamation to be Issued out for Adjourning the Parliament to the Ninth day of *January* next. This day Sailed out of *Leith* Road divers Merchant Ships bound for *London*, under Convoy of the *Sweepstakes* Frigate.

Plimouth, Sept. 3. Yesterday Sailed from hence the *Woolwich*, with several Merchant Ships bound home from the *Barbadoes*.

Cowes, Sept. 2. Yesterday Sailed out of this Road for *Holland* several Prizes that have been sent in by Dutch Privateers; And this Afternoon arrived here four Dutch Merchant Ships, to wit, *The Land of Promise*, of *Ziricksee*; and the *Suttonhall of Flushing*, both from *Guinea*; The *Love of Flushing* from the *Canaries*, and the *Love of Flushing* from *Sumatra*; They came out from *Palmyra* and *Plimouth*. This day the *Wine and Salt*, taken by a *French* Commandant.

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Whitehall, September 9, 1693.

This morning came in the Three Mails, that were due from Holland, and brought the following Advices.

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Turin, Aug. 28. N. S.

OUR Army is marched in two Bodies, and by different ways, one by the *Perouse*, and the other by the Valley of *St. Martin*. The Design of the Duke of *Savoy* is to Attack the *Mareschal de Catinat*, who lies at *Fenestrelles*, and has Fortified his Camp. His Royal Highness has left a Body of Horse, with six Batallions of Foot, to block up *Pignerol*, who have ruined all the Country round to hinder the Enemy from drawing any Subsistence from thence: We are working to repair the Fortifications of *St. Brigide*, and hope by the 15th of the next Month to have put it into a good Condition of Defence; after which 'tis believed we shall Bombard *Pignerol*.

Vienna, September 2. The Letters from the Camp before *Belgrade* give an Account, That the Trenches were opened the 12th of the last Month at Night; The day following the Enemy made a great Sally, and with some Advantage at first, but in conclusion they were beaten back with considerable loss; And in this occasion we lost about 200 Men. On the 17th the Turks had a mind to try their Fortune in another Sally, but it did not succeed so well as the former, for they were repulsed with great loss on their side, and very little on ours. On the 19th the heavy Cannon arrived in the Camp, and on the 25th they began to batter the place: The Trenches in the mean time were carried on within 100 Paces of the Counterscarp, and our Bombs had already occasion'd a great fire in the Town. A Detachment was sent to attack *Semandria*. The Grand Visier seems to be under a great Irresolution, Whether to attempt to succor the Besieged or not. The last week we had advice, That not thinking himself strong enough for such an Undertaking, he was marched with the Cham of *Tartary* towards *Transilvania*: But fresher Advices say, That they had changed their march, and seem'd resolved to repass the *Danube*, and to move towards *Belgrade*.

Cologne, Septemb. 11. The Letters from the Upper *Rhine* tell us, That the French Army was separated, and would repass that River in three Bodies. The Detachements were marching towards *Piedmont* and *Flanders*, and the Dauphin was gone home. The Confederate Army had passed the *Neckar*, and it was believed they would attempt something before they go into Winter-Quarters. The French have demolished the Castle of *Heydelberg*.

Paris, September 11. The Dauphin arrived the 9th at *Versailles*. The Letters from *Piedmont* tell us, That the Duke of *Savoy* was marching towards Monsieur *Catinat's* Camp at *Fenestrelle*. The French Fleet was, by our last Advice still at *Thoulon*; And 'twas said, that Monsieur *Tourville* would put to Sea again about the middle of this month with such Ships as could be got ready by that time.

From His Majesties Camp at *St. Quentins Linnich, September 14. N. S.* The Duke of *Holstein Ploen* came to the Camp on the 5th instant. On the 9th the French marched from *Soignies* to *Estiennes* near *Mons*; Since which they have invested *Charleroy* in order to besiege it: They were to break ground this day, and have already begun to raise their Batteries. We have had very great Rains for these 2 or 3 days. The Recruits from *England* are arrived at *Willemstadt*.

Hague, Septemb. 15. The States of *Holland* will meet again to Morrow. The Danes discontinued Firing upon *Ratzburg* on the 2d instant; and the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and the House of *Lunenbourg* about the said Town are in a fair way of Accommodation; Whereupon the Danish Forces will withdraw out of the Dutchy of *Saxe-Lawenburg*. The French have Besieged *Charleroy*; And we are told that the King has sent for 20 Batallions from *Liege* and *Mastricht* to Reinforce his Army. The Siege of *Belgrade* goes on with good success.
