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Twin, August 31.

THe Duke of Savoy is encamped at *Bringha*, about a Mile and half from *Perouse*; from whence he has sent out several Detachments to view the Enemy; who lie intrencht at *Fenstrella*. Great Preparations are made for the Bombarding of *Pignerol*, which in the mean time is blocked up by our Troops that are posted at *Burafca*, and other Places. 'Tis reported, That Monsieur *Catinat* has received a Reinforcement of 6000 men, drawn out of the Militia of the Neighbouring Provinces.

From the Imperial Camp before Belgrade, Septemb. 1. On the 26th of the last month we began to Fire upon the Town with 21 pieces of Cannon, all 25 Pounders, which were placed on a Battery near the Counter-carp. On the 27th General *Huster* marched from the Camp with a Body of Horse and Dragoons, intending to pass the *Danube* at *Semlyn*, and to attack the Enemy in the Intrenchments they have made on the other side of the River; At Night, the Marquis de *Montoto*, Adjutant General, was killed with a Musket Bullet, as he was standing upon the said Battery by the Duke de *Croy*, who had at the same time a happy escape, another Bullet passing through his Hat, without doing him any harm. On the 28th we began to work on another Battery on the Left; The Detachment of Horse designed towards *Semenaria* was Countermanded. A Party of 300 Turkish Horse attack our Guards near *Semlyn*, but were repulsed with the loss of 40 of their men. The same day the Enemies Gallies appeared near *Semlyn*, and after some Cannonading on both sides, retired again; A Troop of Hussars returned to the Camp with 13 Prisoners, and one Standard, having defeated a Turkish Party near *Vipalancka*. The 29th the Enemy made a shew of Sallying out, but perceiving we were in a posture to receive them, they kept within their Works; They fired very much all this day, but did us little mischief; In the Night it blew very hard, and one of our Ships of 15 Guns, which lay before *Semlyn*, broke from her Anchor, and drove towards the Enemies Gallies, whereupon our Men quitted the Vessel, after having set her on Fire; The Turks thought at first it had been a Fireship, and therefore durst not come near her. The 30th we had advice, That the Grand Viceroy was come to *Vienstlaw*, not far from *Widin*, and that he was drawing what Force he could together for the Relief of *Belgrade*: In the Evening, Major General *Keyserfeldt*, the Emperors Chief Ingenier, as he was viewing some Works he had ordered to be made, received a wound by a Musket Shot, of which he Died soon after; We began a third Battery on the Right. The 31th a great Council was held, and Expresses were dispatched to General *Veterani*, and to Colonel *Kiba*, who is posted with a Body of Croats on the *Sava*. This day Orders are given for all the Horse to furnish themselves with Forage for 14 days, and to draw within our Lines. We are now advanced within ten Paces of the Counter-carp, and are preparing to attack the same.

Vienna, Sept. 9. By Letters from the Imperial Camp before *Belgrade* of the 2d instant, we have Advice, That General *Huster* had driven the Enemy from their Intrenchments on the other side of the *Danube*, and had likewise

taken a little Island, where the Turkish Saiks and Gallies used to lie; who were forced to retire under the Cannon of *Belgrade*, so that the Belieged are now cut off from their Communication with *Zemlauer*. The Siege goes on successfully; The Imperialists being advanced so far that they hoped in 2 or 3 days to be lodged on the Counter-carp. The Duke de *Croy* had ordered all the Regiments to make Provision of a fortnight's Subsistence, and to encamp within their Retrenchments, where he would expect the Grand Viceroy, who was come near to *Miana* with 50000 Turks and Tatars. We hear from *Tianstovnia*, That General *Veterani* was encamped the 28th of the last month at *Safvaros*, intending to regulate his march by the Advice he should receive of the Enemies Motions.

From the Confederate Camp near Gommaringen, Sept. 12. On the 7th we marched from *Bitzingheim* to *Gaglingen*, where Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* took his Head Quarters, the Elector of *Saxony* having his at *Brackenberrn*, and the Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* at *Pfaffenborn*. The 9th a Party of Hussars brought in several Prisoners, who said, That the French Cavalry was reduced to a very ill Condition, and that they had lost a great number of Horses by Sicknels during the Campaign. On the 9th, the 4 Bavarian Battalions which had been posted near *Ulm*, to cover that place, returned to our Camp. On the 10th the Army marched to *Eppingen, Islingen*, and this Place, where we received the Confirmation of the Enemies having quitted *Hydelberg*, after springing of several Mines in order to demolish the Castle, which had not the designed effect. Yesterday we had advice, That the Marschal de *Lorge*, with the French Forces under his Command, was marching towards the Country of *Brissow*, to continue the Forage on that side; whereupon the four Bavarian Battalions were sent to joyn with General *Wurtz*, who is posted with some Troops for the security of the *Kunzingen Dal* against the Enemies Incursions: This day the Landgrave of *Hesse* marched from our Camp with his own Troops, and those of *Brandenburg* towards the *Neckar*. A Detachment of 100 men is sent to *Hydelberg*, to Post themselves in the Castle.

Frankfort, Sept. 16. The Troops of *Hesse* and *Brandenburg* are expected this Evening at *Weinheim* in the *Bergstract*; A Bridge is laying for them over the *Maine* at *Cestheim*, from whence they will continue their march to *Nientz*, with design to pass the *Rhine* there, and to Besiege the Castle of *Ebernburg*. Prince *Lewis* lies with the rest of the Confederate Forces near *Smitzheim*. The Elector of *Saxony* is expected here to morrow.

Cologne, Sept. 18. The Confederate Army on the *Upper Rhine* is separated; The Forces of *Hesse*, *Brandenburg*, and *Neuburg*, passed the *Neckar* the 16th, and are coming down towards *Nientz*, whilst Prince *Lewis* observes the French, who are marched towards the Country of *Brissow*. The Marschal de *Boufflers* was by our last advice encamped near *Birkenfels*, about 10 hours from *Trarves*, the Motions of the Hellicens, &c. having stopt his march towards *Flanders*, and obliged him to send a Detachment to cover *Ebernburg*. They write from *Alsace*, That the French Detachment designed to *Piedmont*, passed on the 4th instant near the City of *Strasbourg*, consisting but of 1300 Horse. The Troops of the Elector *Palatin* march towards the *Meuse*.

Hamburg,

Hamburg, Sept. 18. The Hopes we gave you by our Letters of the 11th instant of an Accommodation between the King of Denmark and the House of Lunenburg, concerning Ratzburg are since that time very much lessened; however the Ministers Mediators continue to employ their Office for the bringing this matter to a good Conclusion; and in the mean time the Cessation is prolonged till to-morrow Night.

Paris, Sept. 18. The last Letters from Toulon say, That the Marschal de Tourville intended to Sail from thence on the 15th of this month, to return with the French Fleet to Breff. We have an account from Flanders, That the French have Besieged Charleroy; That they had taken several Officers who endeavoured to get into the place; and that the Trenches would be opened the 15th instant. They write from Strasbourg of the 13th, That the Marschal de Lorge was encamped at Steinhaußen near Fort Louis; That from thence he would march to Renken, about four Leagues from Strasbourg, and having thid three or four days to refresh his Troops, would march into the Brisgow, and continue there till they went into their Winter Quarters; The Detachment under the Marschal de Boufflers decamped on the 7th from the Neighbourhood of Spire, and marched towards Luxembourg. 'Tis said, that the Differences between this Court and that of Rome are at last adjusted, and that the Project agreed on for that purpose was brought hither two days ago by the Abbot of Narbonne. In pursuance of a late Order of Council, forbidding all People to lay up a greater quantity of Corn than what is necessary for their private Uses, Commisshiners are appointed to visit all Houses and Convents in this City; and Orders are sent to the Intendants of the several Provinces, to see that the same be strictly observed; And 3 days ago was published an Ordinance against carrying any Corn out of this Kingdom; the sea-city whereof encreases daily, as does the Misery of the People.

Brussels, Sept. 20. The French Invested Charleroy on the 10th, with the expectation from their Neighbouring Garrison, who were afterwards joined by a Detachment from the Duke of Luxemburg's Army; On the 12th the Artillery they had at Malinoge arrived at Marchienne au Pont, that from Mousart Charleroy, and the Cannon from Mons at St. Amand. The 15th the Army began to throw Bombs into the place; and on the 16th the Trenches were opened; On the 17th the Belieged, to the number of 300 Foot and 40 Horse, made a Sally, with good Success, that they killed many of the Enemy, and filled up their Trenches, and then retired without the loss of one Man on our side. Yesterday the French took a Half Moon, or Ravelin, which cost them 2 or 300 Men, but they were soon after broken out of it again; and the same day the Belieged made another Sally, in which they killed 5 or 600 of the Enemy. The Siege is carried on by the Marschal de Villeroi, Monsieur Vankin the French Kings principal Ingenieur, the Marquis de Harcourt, and the Count de Gussard, and to cover it, the Duke of Luxemburg is very strongly posted on the River Pison, having his Quarters in a Castle near the Village of Gony.

From His Majesty's Camp at Nimove, September 21. N. S. On the 17th the Elector of Bavaria marched with a Detachment of 30 Battalions and 40 Squadrons towards Flanders; And on the 20th His Majesty came with the rest of the Army to this place. The French opened their Trenches before Charleroy on the 16th instant; The Belieged have made two vigorous sallies, in which the Enemy (who have yet done nothing considerable against the Town) lost a great many Men.

Hague, Sept. 22. The last Letters from Flanders tell us, That the French have as yet made but little progress in the Siege of Charleroy, that they had taken a Half Moon, and were beaten out of it again, and had already lost above 1000 men. Count Straatman is come hither to succeed the Count de Wintzegrats, as the Emperors Plenipotentiary at the Congress. The Baron de Roffe arrived here the last Week with the Character of Envoy from the Bishop of Liege, but he has not yet had Audience of the States. We have advice from Piedmont, That the Duke of Savoy was encamped on the 5th instant at Bellvet in the Pragelas, within a League of the Marschal de Catinar, who lies at Fontbellies. The two Armies were in sight of each other, but separated by inaccessible Mountain: His Royal High-

ness had been himself with the Generals to view the Passages, by which he might march to the Enemy, but found the design of attacking them impracticable; He endeavoured therefore to cut off their Provisions, and in the mean time was preparing to Bombard Pigneral. Monsieur Catinar expected Reinforcements from Catalonia, and the Upper Rhine, by the 20th of this month.

Deale, Sept. 13. This day Their Majesties Ships the Breda, and the Dreadnought, passed through the Downs to the Northward, under the Command of Rear Admiral Nevill.
