3. This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1915, which day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of this Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 19th day of January,

1915, in the words following, viz.:—
"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman; or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we consider it desirable that the Junior Accountant Officer serving as Clerk to the Inspecting Captain of Air Craft should receive an allowance in recognition of the extra work and responsibility devolving upon him in

that appointment:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant to this officer of an allowance of 2s. 6d. a day, with effect as from the 8th May, 1913, the date on which he commenced his special

duties.
"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concur-

rence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 17th day of December, in the year 1914, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 112, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Cornworthy, in the County of Devon, and in the Diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Cornworthy is vested for an estate in fee simple, in possession, free from incumbrances, in Arthur Johnston Mackey, of No. 2, The Close, Exeter, in the County of Devon,

Esquire.

"And whereas the said Arthur Johnston Mackey is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and pre-sentation to the said Benefice of Cornworthy, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Archibald, now Bishop of Exeter, and his successors in the same Bishopric.

"And whereas the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness, and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited, or by some or one of them, is made necessary, he, the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Cornworthy which is hereinbefore mentioned, and hereinafter recommended and proposed, will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the Cure of Souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson, so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid, arises or exists, that is to say in the Parish of Cornworthy.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Arthur Johnston Mackey (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme, and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of
