Rome, August 29. N Monday last was held a private Confiftory, where feveral Bithopricks were proposed. The Differences that nave fo long depended between the French and this Court, about the Regale and the four Propolitions of the Allembly of the Clergy in 1682, are at last adjusted, and an Express has been dispatched to France by the Cardinals d'Estree and Fourbin, with the Treaty of Accommodation, which they concluded 3 or 4 days ago, after several Meetings, with the Cardinals Carpegna, Stada, Panciatici and Albani, empowered by the Pope for that purpose; at the return of this Express, the Treaty will be Published in due form, and after that, the Pope will grant his Bulls to fuch of the French Clergy who affifted at the before-mentioned Affembly of 1682, and have fince been nominated to Bishopricks by the French King, being 15 in number. The Business about the Imperial Ambassador's Servants continues in the same state, tho' several Cardinals, as well as the Venetian Ambassador, do very zealously employ their Offices to compose it. The Pope, upon the Instances of the Spanish Ambassador, has granted the Catholick King the Tenths of the Ecclefiaftical Revenues within all his Dominions. The endeavours that have been used to reconcile matters at Naples concerning the Inquisition, have hitherto had little fuccels, however the Congregation appointed by the Pope to confider of Exredients to make up this bufiness, continues to

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have frequent meetings about it. Genoun, Sept. 2. By several Barks that are arrived in this Port from Toulon, we understand, That the French Fleet was taking in Provisions and other necessaries, in order to their putting to Sea again about the middle of this Month; The general report is, that they defign to return into the The French have lately fent some Men from Provence to reinforce the Garifons of Nice and Villa Franca.

Venice, Sept. 4. The last Letters from the Morea give an Account, That the Doge Morofini was still at Porto Porro; and that the Turks were encamped about Corinth with a Body of 14 or 15000 Men. We have advice from Constantimople, That the Lord Paget, Ambassador from Their Majestics of Great Britain arrived there on the 28th of July: That the Grand Vizier was marched towards Transilvania, with a very imall Army, not having with him above 20000

Men, befides the Tartars who were to joyn him in his March; and that Offina Batla, late Calmacan of Constantinople, being sent to some Government on the Borders of Perjin, a Mellenger was dispatched after him to take oir his Head, but having got notice of it it's faid he made his cicape. The Letters add, That feveral Princes of the Arabs were in Arms, and gave great disturbance to the Turks in those Parts.

Warfaw, Sept. 4. The Advices from Lemberg of the 27th past fay, That the Garison of Caminiec had, with the affiftance of the Tartars (of whom there lies a confiderable Body in the Neighbourhood of that place) made an attempt to surprise the Fort de la Trinite about a League from Caminiec, but that they were repulled by the Poles, who are Posted there under the Command of Colonel Brandt. The Forces of this Crown are still Encamped at IFisnewice, from whence a strong Detachement is fent to attack the Tartars near Caminiec, and to destroy all the Corn and Forage thereabouts. The Abbot de Polignac, who is lately come hither in the quality of Ambassador from France, has begun to make his vifits to the Senators and other Persons of Principal Note at this Court; 'Tis faid his chief business is to assist the Envoys that are here from the Tartars, in order to make a separate Peace between this Crown and the Turks, in which, according to the present difposition of this Court, they are not like to have any better success now than they have had formerly in their endeavours of the same kind.

From General Veterani's Camp at Salvards, August 28. Upon advice of the Grand Vizier's marching back towards the Danube, we decamped from Schosburg on the Frontiers of Tranfilvania, and came to this place; and Coll. Polland, who was fent before with a Detachement of Horse and Dragoons, had Orders to Post himself. near Lippa. Several Parties have been sent out to gain Intelligence; and by the freshest Information we have of the Enemy, they were Encamped near Widin on this side the Danube. The Tartars who had joyned the Vizier in expectation of making an Incursion into Transitusnia, and of getting good store of boory, are much dissatisfied at the altering of this design, and many of them have deferted the Turkish Camp, and are gone home again; The common report makes the Force the Vizier has with him, to confift of about 50000 Men; but the greatest part of these being Tartars, and un-

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
