A PROCLAMATION,
Requiring the Attendance of the Members
of both Houses of Parliament.

MARIE R.

WE being desirous that the
Members of both Houses
may have convenient No-
tice of the time when their
Attendance in Parliament will be requisite, to
the end they may order their Affairs so as that
there may then be a full Assembly, Have
(with the Advice of Our Privy Council)
thought fit to Issue this Our Royal Proclama-
tion; hereby Declaring and Publishing Our
Will and Pleasure, That Our Parliament shall
on the Third Day of October next (to which
Day the same is now Prorogued) be further
Prorogued unto Thursday the Six and Twen-
tieth Day of October next. In Order to
which Prorogation We shall Expect the Atten-
dance only of such Members as shall be Resi-
dent in or near Our Cities of London and
Westminster. And Our Purpose being that
Our said Houses of Parliament shall not only
Meet upon the said Six and Twentieth Day of
October next, but shall Sit for the Dispatch
of divers weighty and important Affairs, We
do therefore hereby Charge and Require all the
Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights,
Citizens and Burgeses of the House of Com-
mons to give their Attendance at Westmin-
ster on the Six and Twentieth Day of October
next accordingly.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the
Twenty Eighth Day of September,
1693. In the Fifth Year of Our
Reign.

Plimouth, Sept. 26. The Weather
continues very Tempestuous. There

Bristol, Sept. 27. Since my last
are come in here the *Mary, Joseph
Ruddocke* Master, from *Corke*; and a
Ship of 120 Tuns from *Nensis*.

Yesterday the *Smallow* Prize passed by
this Road towards *Southampton* from
Guernsey; whence she came on the
25th instant with six Vessels under
her Convoy, one of which the *King
David* of *London*, a Galliot Hoy, is
come in here, and the Master of it
tells us, That before they came from
Guernsey, they heard that the new
Fortifications which the French were
making at *la Hogue*, are all ruined by
the breaking in of the Sea.

Deale, Sept. 29. Their Majesties
Ships the *Falmouth, Mary Galley, Harp-
shire, Greyhound, Dartmouth, and Swift-
sure*, continue still in the *Downes*, to-
gether with two Dutch Men of War.
This Morning came in the *Hope*,
Captain *Hinde* Commander, from the
Barbadoes.

London, Sept. 30. Yesterday the
Common Hall Assembled to choose
a Lord Mayor, and a Poll being taken,
Sir *William Ashurst* and Sir *John Hou-
blon*

blon had a great Majority of Votes; who will be returned to the Court of Aldermen at their next Meeting, and then the choice of a Lord Mayor for the year ensuing will be declared.

On the 28th the new Sheriffs, *Thomas Abney Esq;* and *Sir William Hedges*, were according to Custom Sworn before the Lord Mayor, and Court of Aldermen, at the *Guildhall*; And this day the Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, attended by the City Officers, went by Water to *Westminster*; and at the *Exchequer Bar*, the new Sheriffs were presented to the Barons by Mr. Recorder, with the usual Ceremonies; After which the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, attended as before, returned to *Drapers Hall*; where they, together with the Officers of the Court of *Exchequer*, were Entertained by the Sheriffs at a great and splendid Dinner.

Whitehall, Octob. 1. We have an account that Rear Admiral *Mitchell* arrived with the great Ships on the 25th of the last Month in the *Gunfleet*, and still continued there on the 29th; The Weather had been so bad that in several days he could not send off a Boat.
