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Edenburgh, August 22.

**W**Hat apprehensions soever may be had of these Countreys, all things are upon inquiry found to be in a quiet posture, and the Militia in so great readines and so well setled, that no disturbances can in probability be wrought amongst us; this day all our Militia are to be drawn up together, and a view to be taken of them at their Rendezvous.

*Edenburgh, Aug. 24.* Yesterday arrived here two ships of this place from *Croytick* in *France* laden with salt, telling us that the Sickness raging with much violence at *Rouen*, all trade and intercourse is at present forbidden with that City.

*Lisbonne, Aug. 10.* The last week arrived here a man of War from *France*, with Orders to Monsieur de *St. Roman*, to take upon him the Quality of Ambassador from His most Christian Majesty. The Baron de *Batteville* is suddenly expected from *Madrid* under the same Character from His Catholique Majesty.

This week arrived an English ship from *Bristol*, which off at sea met with four Turkish men of War, which civilly dismissed her. This day is heard great firing of Guns at sea, and 'tis much feared that these Corsairs may have met with some Genious ships which are daily expected upon the Coasts bound for this Port.

*Galiz, Aug. 12.* Several Ships arrive daily here from *England*, *France*, *Biscay* and *Holland*. Several Privateers are abroad with Sally Commissions, which somewhat disturb our Trade, and have of late taken two or three English Ships; but 'tis hoped the appearance of some English Men of War upon these Seas will easily reduce them to reason. His Excellency the Earl of *Sandwich* is suddenly expected here from *Seville*.

*Malaga, Aug. 14.* This week put in here two ships of *Drepano* with a lading of Salt, telling us that they had discovered four Caravels of the Corsairs of *Barbary* which were flying about these seas.

On Friday last the Evening, put to sea 9 Gallies of the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>d</sup> Squadrons of *Naples* and *Sicily*, under the Command of the Duke de *Ferrandina* for the assistance of the Venetians in the defence of *Candia*. The Captains Gally, with the General Seigneur *Gianettino Voria*, and one other still remaining in Port. The German Foot continue still in their Quarters; some Companies of Italians are to be sent into *Spain* to fill up the Tertia belonging to *Don Dominico Pignatelli*, and several vessels are hiring for their transportation.

Two Gallies belonging to the Great Duke of *Tuscany* passed this last week by this Port for *Messina*.

*Venice, Aug. 17.* A Ship lately arriving here from *Corsu*, the Master thereof gives us intelligence, that it was there commonly reported that the Turks had drawn together twelve thousand men in *Morea*, with intention to embark them with the first opportunity for *Canea*, for which end many large Saiches and Bregantines lay ready in those parts, and particularly at *Napoli di Malvata*, and were to pass over under the convoy of several Galleons, and Ships of *Tripoli*, which for that intent were by the Grand Signiours Order cruising upon those Coasts.

He farther tells us that the Admiral had order'd his Fleet in several Squadrons, to continue constantly cruising about

the Isle of *Candia*, to watch every motion of the Enemies Ships, and if possible to engage them. One Squadron of them had met with some Ships of *Barbary*, laden with Men and Ammunition from *Constantinople*, for the succour of the Visier, who were accordingly attempting their passage; but our Men of War interposing, gave them so warm an entertainment with their Canon, that they were forced with much damage to give off their attempt, and retire themselves to *Rhodes*.

Later intelligence arriving by the way of *Otranto* and *Rome* informs us, that the Turks having for several days together plaid hard upon the Fort *Sabianera* with their great Guns and Mortar-pieces, had afterwards given a furious assault to it, which they for some time continued with much resolution, but by the extraordinary valour of the besieged, were forced to give over with exceeding great loss of men; and that in Revenge of this storm, Monsieur *St. Andre Montbrun* had made a stout sallie upon them, in which he had slain near upon 2000 Turks; and moreover, that there was so great a dearth and scarcity of provisions in the Turkish Camp, that a pound of bread was sold for forty Aspers, and other provisions at proportionable rates, by which means great numbers of them perished for want of food, and about 1500 had in few days left the service.

The Popes Gallies under the command of *Francisco Vincenzo Rospigliosi* have joyned with our Fleet, together with a considerable number of other Auxiliary Gallies; at his arrival he made an excellent Treat aboard his Gally for the Venetian Admiral and many of the principal Officers, whom he complimented in the Popes name, and made them several Presents, distributing likewise a considerable summe of moneys amongst the Soldiers of our Fleet.

*Rome, Aug. 18.* On Thursday morning last the Duke de *Chaulnes*, Ambassador from His most Christian Majesty, received advice by an Exprels from *France* of the Queen his Mistress safe delivery of a second son, of which he gave an account in his yesterdays Audience to the Pope; he has now made all his visits, and may in few days depart hence on his return for *France*.

By the way of *Otranto* we have advice, that on the 9<sup>th</sup> past, the Popes Gallies under the command of General *Bailly Vincenzo Rospigliosi* joyned (together with those of *Maliba*) with the Venetian Fleet, where a Council of War being called, they resolved in case of danger, that all the Generals should with the Soldiers of the Fleet put themselves into *Candia* for its defence.

*Madrid, Aug. 22.* *Don Juan* is retired to *Consuegra*, and not to come within 20 leagues of *Madrid*. 'Tis said dispatches are already sent to the Constable of *Castille*, who is with all the speed he is able to transport himself into *Flanders*.

The Conde de *Miranda*, Ambassador from *Portugal*, hath been these eight dayes at *Camara del*, a mile from this place; for whose reception is taken up the house which formerly entertained the French and Muscovite Ambassadors, but intends not to make his entry till the Baron de *Battaville* shall begin his journey under the same Character for *Lisbonne*.

*Paris, Sept. 2.* On Tuesday last the Muscovite Ambassador had his first Audience from his Majesty at *St. Germain*, to whom he presented several excellent Fables with a rich Cimeter and Dagger. Yesterday he returned again to *St. Germain* for his second Audience, in which he intended to open the business of his Negotiation.

The Bishop of *Besiers* having since his return had four hours conference with his Majesty upon the State of affairs in *Poland*, has dispatcht away an Extraordinary Courier into that Kingdom, and has Orders from his Majesty to return thither again by Post.

The young Prince of *Denmark* is arriv'd here incognito

*Paris, Septemb. 5.* His Majesty continues his resolution of going to *Ghambourg*, and ten Companies of his Guards with as many of the *Swisses* are ordered to be in readiness to march to attend him in his journey.

Four hundred *Dragoons* and 200 *Foot* are arriv'd upon the frontiers of *Poitou* to hinder the Assemblies of the *Huguenots* upon the ruins of their demolished Temples, and the Intendent of Justice of that Province has received fresh Orders from the Court to proceed to throw down whatsoever other Temples have not been allowed them by the Edict pass'd at *Nantes*.

Letters of the 27th past from *Nancy* inform us that the Duke of *Lorraine* is much alarm'd at the late proceeding of his Highness the Elector Palatine, who is march'd with 7000 able Soldiers and about 2000 of his Militia forces, with whom he had laid siege to the Town of *Laudslou*, having also a design upon *Hombourg*, but finding it well fortify'd and in a good posture of defence, had desisted from it.

That the Duke of *Lorraine* was preparing for his defence, and had given Order to the Count de *Lisbonne*, and the Count de *Laudemont*, to draw together their forces with all imaginable diligence, which they had already begun to do so effectually, that the Count de *Lisbonne* was already marching with a body of 3500 Horse, and 3000 Foot, and that several Couriers were dispatcht into *Bourgundy* to command the 6 Regiments which were lent thither to the Spanish service, which was believed would find the less difficulty of returning, the Inhabitants of that County having not been overfond to entertain them.

From *Vienna* we are advis'd, that Monsieur *Grimonville* our Resident, and the Duke of *Neuburgs* Minister residing in that Court, have by their addresses to the Emperour, prevail'd with him for his promise in Writing, not to oppose the Election of the Duke of *Neubourg* to the Crown of *Poland*, and that the said Duke intends shortly to visit the Imperial Court before his journey to the Frontiers of *Poland*.

*Bruges, Septemb. 6.* On Friday night last, His Excellency the Marquis de *Cassel Rodrigo* arriv'd at *Ghent*, and the next day took a view of a body of about 6 thousand men which were drawn up in a place appointed near that City for their Rendezvous.

On Sunday night he arriv'd here, accompanied by the Prince de *Chimay*, Governour of *Luxembourg*, the Duke de *Orneville*, Governour of *Artois*, the Count de *Brouay*, and several other persons of the Nobility, passing on horseback through the City, attend'd by three Troops of his Guards to the Bishops place, where he lodg'd that night; the next morning he departed thence for *Ostend*, having his Train augmented by an addition of all the Nobility and Gentry of these parts: from thence he went to *Nieuport*, and afterwards to *Ipres*, taking a view of the fortifications of all places, and the forces and Garrisons in the several parts by which he pass'd.

*Don Piemontello* is expect'd here with the Title of General of all the Spanish Netherlands, and is to take his way by *Paris* to endeavour the composition of all differences relating to the French pretensions: In the mean time for the prevention of all surprizes, a Garrison of 1500 men is plac'd in *Nieuport*, and double Guards set upon all the Forts and Sluices, and all our frontier Garrisons filled with Soldiers.

*Hague, Septemb. 7.* The 5th instant arriv'd here Monsieur *Terlon*, lately Ambassador from His most Christian Majesty in the Court of *Denmark*; he has since his arrival given a visit to the Danish Ministers; and may in few days depart on his way homewards.

Sir *William Temple*, Ambassador from His Majesty of *Great Britain*, has not yet made his publick Entry and continues still incognito in the house of the Heer *Maes*, design'd for the entertainment of the Ambassadors of foreign Princes.

Daily conferences are held for the disbanding or dismissal of the *Lunenbourg* forces. The Ministers from the Dukes of *Lunenbourg* are pressing hard for the payment of the arrears of Subsidies due to them; for payment whereof, the States have sent their Letters to the Provinces concern'd, and order'd the Receiver General to take care for the Collection of them.

*Amsterdam, Sept. 7.* Two dayes since arriv'd here Monsieur *Terlon* the French Ambassador from the Danish Court in his return for *France*. Monsieur de *Pompe*, who lately return'd from the *Swedes* Court, whither he was sent under the same Character from the same King, has been several dayes expect'd here, no without some apprehension least he may have met with some disaster at Sea, he having with his Train embark'd at *Hamburg* about 12 dayes since.

From *Munster* we are inform'd, that since the imprisonment of the Count de *Eenthem* at *Coesvelt*, where he made an abjuration of his Religion, the Bishop of *Munster* has summon'd his Castle of *Benthem*, which surrendring, he plac'd there a Garrison of 40 or 50 Men.

Letters of the 18th. past from *Stockholm* advise us, that the States of *Sweden* still continued their Assembly, and that the King had been somewhat indispos'd of late, but was again perfectly recover'd: That they discourst much of disbanding the Army quarter'd in the Dutchy of *Breme*; and that they were in daily expectation of an Answer from his Imperial Majesty touching their last demands, in order to the full conclusion of the League negotiating between the Emperour and that Crown.

*Plymouth, Aug. 28.* The last night and this morning arriv'd here three ships from *Newcastle*, and three French ships laden with Salt and other Merchandise.

*Weymouth, Aug. 29.* The 27th instant put into this Road a Fleet of 18 sail of English ships outwards bound; one of them being the *Joseph* of *London*, springing a Leak was forc'd to put in here to stop it, and this morning put to sea again with the rest of the company.

*Deale, Septemb. 1.* This day about 20 sail of Merchant Ships set sail out of the Downs with a fair wind, all of them outwards bound.

*Whitehall, Sept. 2.* On Monday morning last His Royal Highness went hence for *Dover*, near which place in a Tent erected for the Solemnity, he intend'd the next day to take the usual Oath as Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, His Grace the Duke of *Richmond*, Lord Lieutenant of the County of *Kent*, being ready with the Militia Forces to attend him on the way, and great preparations made at *Dover-Castle* for his Reception and entertainment.
