ther, and a view to be taken of them at their Rendezvous. Eime, Aug. 24. Yesterday arrived here two ships of this place from Croytick in France laden with falt, telling us that the Sicknel's raging with much violence at Rouen, all trade and entercourle is at present forbidden with that City.

Lisbonne, Aug. 10. 7 he last week arrived here a man of War from France, with Orders to Monfieur de St. Romain, to take upon him the Quality of Ambassador from His most Christian Majesty. The Baron de Batteville is fuddenly expected from Madrid under the same Character from His Catholique Majesty.

This week arrived an English ship from Bristol, which off at lea met with four Turkish men of War, which civilly difmiffed her. This day is heard great firing of Guns at lea, and 'tis much feared that these Corfairs may have met with some Genous ships which are daily expected upon the Coafts bound for this Port,

¢adit, Aug. 12. Several Ships arrive daily here from England, France, Bifcay and Holland. Several Privateers are abroad with Sally Commissions, which somewhat diffurb our Trade, and have of late taken two or three Enghish Ships; but 'tis hoped the appearance of some English Men of War upon these Seas will easily reduce them to reafon. His Excellency the Earl of Sandwich is fuddenly expetted here from Seville.

Auples, Aug. 14. This week put in here two fhips of Prepanewith a lading of Salt, telling us that they had di'covered four Caravels of the Corfairs of Barbary which were plying about there has.

<sup>1</sup> On Friday laff the the Evening, put to fea 9 Gallies of the tyd fquadrons of Naples and Sicil Sunder the Command of the Duke de Ferrandina for the affiftance of the Venetiand in the defence of Gandia. The. Captains Gally, with the General Seignior Gianettino Doria, and one other ftill remaining in Port. The German Foot continue still in their Quarters; some Companies of Italians are to be sent into Spain to fill up the Tertia belonging to Don Doninico Pignatelli, and leveral veffels are hiring for their transportation.

Two Gallies belonging to the Great Duke of Tuscany paffed this laft week by this Port for Meffina.

Vertices, Aug. Ty. A Ship lately arriving here from Corfu, the Matter thereof gives us intelligence, that it was there commonly reported that the Tyrks had drawn together twelve thouland men in Morea, with intention to embark them with the first opportunity for Canea, for which end many large Saichs and Bregantines lay ready in thole parts, and particularly at Napoli di Malvatia, and were to pais over under the convoy of leveral Galleots, and Ships of Tripolis, which for that intent were by the Grand Seigniours Order cruifing upon thole Coafts.

He farther tells us that the Admiral had order'd his Fleet in leveral Squadrons, to continue conftantly cruiking abour, the Ille of Candia, to watch every motion of the Enemies Ships, and if poffible to engage them. One Squadron of them had met with some Ships of Barbary, laden with Men and Ammunition from Conflantinople, for the fuccour of the Vifier, who were accordingly attempting their paffage ; but our Men of War interpoling, gave them to warm an en-tertainment with their Canon, that they were forced with much damage to give off their attempt, and retire themfelves to Rhodes.

Later intelligence arriving by the way of Otranto and Rome informs us, that the Turks having for leveral days together plaid hard upon the Fort Sabjanera with their great Guns and Mortar-pieces, had afterwards given a furious affau t to it, which they for fome time continued with much refolution, but by the extraordinary valour of the befieged, were forced to give over with exceeding great loss of men; and that in Re-venge of this florm, Monsieur St. Andre Montbrun had made a flour fallie upon them, in which he had flain near upon 2000 Turks; and moreover, that there was fo great a dearth and scarcity of provisions in the Turkish Camp) that a pound of bread was fold for forty Alpers, and other provisions at proportionable rates, by which means great numbers of thein perished for want of food, and about 1 500 had in few days left the fervice,

The Popes Gallies under the command of Francisco Vincenzo Rofpigliofi have joyned withour Fleet, together with a confiderable number of other Auxiliary Gallies; at his arrival he made an excellent Treat aboard his Gally for the Venetian Admiral and many of the principal Officers, whom he complimented in the Popes name, and made them feveral Prefenus, distributing likewife a confiderable fumme of moneys amongst the Soldiers of our Fleen

Rome, Aug. 18. On Thursday morning last the Duke de Chaulnes, Ambasiador from His most Christian Majesty, received advile by an Express from France of the Queen his Miftreffes fafe delivery of a fecond fon, of which he gave an account in his yefter days Audience to the Pope; he has now made all his vifits, and may in few days depart hence on his return for France 1

By the way of Otranto we have advice, that on the 9th past, the Popes Gallies under the command of General Baily Vincenzo Rofsigliofi joyned (together with thole of Maltha) with the Venetian Fleet, where a Council og War being called, they refolved in cafe of danger, that all the Genrals should with the Soldiers of the Fleet put themselves into Candia f r its defence.

Madrid, Aug. 22. Don Juan is retired to Consuegras and not to come within 20 leagues of Madrid. 'Tis faid dispatches are already sent to the Constable of Castille, who is with all the speed he is able to transport himself into Flanders.

The Conde de Miranda. Ambaffadour from Portugal, hath been these eight dayes at Camarandel, a mile from this places for whole reception is taken up the houle which formerly entertained the French and Mulcovite Ambailadors, but intends not to make his entry till the Baron de Battaville thall begin his journey under the fame Character for Lifbonne,

Paris, Sept. 1, On Tuelday last the Mulcovite Amballador had his first Audience from his Marely at St. Germains, to whom he prefented leveral excellent Farres with a rich Cimiter and Dagger. Yeflerday he te urned again to St. Germains for his fecond Audience, in which he intended to open the busine's of his Negotiation,

The Bilhop of Befiers having fince his return had four hours confere, ce with his Majefty upon the State of affairs in Poland, has diffatcht away an Extraordinary Courrier into that Kingdom, and has Orders from his Majeliy to return tuither again by Poft.

The soung Prince of Denmark is arrived here incognito

Paris, Septemb. 5. His Majesty continues his refolution of going to Chambourg, and ten Companies of his Guards with as many of the Swittes are ordered to be in readiness to march to attend him in his journey.

Four hundred Dragoons and 200 Foot are arrived upon the frontiers of *Poitfou* to hinder the Aflemblies of the Huguenots upon the runnes of their demolifhei Temples, and the Intendent of Juffice of that Prevince has received frefh Orders from the Court to proceed to throw down whatloever other Temples have not been allowed them by the Eddict pation at Nants.

Lotters of the 27th paft from Nancy inform us that the Duke of Lorrain is much illarumed at the 'ate proceeding of his Highnefs the Elector Palatine, who is marched with 7000 abl: Soldiers and about 2070 of his Militia forces, with whom he had laid -iege to the Town of Laudfloul, having allo a defign upon Hombourg, but finding it well fortify'd and in a good pofture of defence, had delifted from it.

That the Duke of Lorrain was preparing for his defence, and had given Order to the Count de Liflebonne, and the Count de l'audemont, to draw together their forces with all imaginable diligence, which they had already begun to do rio effectually, that the Count de Liflebonne w.s already cmarching with a body of 3 500 Horfe, and 3000 Foot, and that leveral Couriers were diffacth into Bourgundy to re--mand the 6 Regiments which were tent thinker to the Spa nith fervice, which was believed would find the lefs difficulty of returning, the Inhabitants of that County having not been overfond to entertain them.

From Vienna we are advised, that Monfieut Gremonville our Refident, and the Duke of Neuburgs Minister refiding in that Court, have by their address to the Emperour, prevailed with him for his promife in Writing, not to oppole the Election of the Duke of Neubourg to the Crown of Poland, and that the faid Duke intends shortly to visit the Imperial Court before his journey to the Frontiers of Poland.

Bruges, Septemb. 6. On Fri ay night laft, His Excellency the Marquis de Cuffel Rodrigo arrived at Ghent, and the next day took a view of a body of about 6 thouland men which were drawn up in a place appointed near that City for their Rendezvouse

On Sunday night he arrived here, accompanied by the Prince de Chimay, Governour of Auxembourgh, the Duke de lornevill, Governour of Artois, the Count de Brouay, and feveral other perfons of the Nobility, paffing on horfeback through the City, atten 'ed by three Troops of his Guards to the Bifhops p lace, where he lodged that night; the next morning he departed thence for O, lend, having his Train augmented by an addition of all the Nobility and Gentry of thefe parts : from thence he went to Nieuport, and afterwards to Ipres, taking a view of the fortifications of all places, and the forces and Garrifons in the feveral parts by which he paffes.

Don Piemontello is expected here with the Title of General of all the Spanish Netherlands, and is to take his way by Paris to endeavour the composure of all differences relating to the French pretensions.' In the mean time for the prevention of all surprizes, a Garrison of 1500 men is placed in *Nieuport*, and double Guards set upon all the Forts and Sluices, and all our frontier Garrisons filled with Soldiers.

Hague, Septemb. 7. The 5th inftant arrived here Monfieur Terlon, lately Ambassiador from His most Christian Majesty in the Court of Denmark; he has since his atrival given a visit to the Danish Minister; and may in few days depart on his way homewards. Sir William Temple, Ambassador from His Majesty of Great Britain, has not yet made his publick Entry and continues still incognito in the house of the Heer Macs, defigned for the entertainment of the Ambassadors of foreign Princes.

Daily conferences are held for the disbanding or difmiffion of the Lunenburg forces. The Ministers from the Dukes of Lunenbourg are preffing hard for the payment of the arrears of Sublidies due to them; for payment whereof, the States have fent their Letters to the Provinces concerned, and ordered the Receivor General to take care for the Collection of them.

Amsterdam, Sept. 7. Two dayes fince arrived here Monsteur Terlon the French Aubassador from the Danish Court in his return for France. Monsteur de Fompone, who lat ly returned from the Sweees Court, whither he was sent under the same Character from the fame King, has been several dayes expected here, no without some apprehension least he may have met with some of aft r at Sea, he having with his Train embarked at Hamburgh about 12 dayes fince.

From Munfler we are informed, that fince the imprisonment of the Count De Eenthem at Coefvelt, where he made an abjuration of his Religion, the Bishop of Munfler has summon'd his Castle of Benthem, which surrendring, he plated there a Garison of 40 or 50 Men.

Letters of the 18th paft from Stockholm advife us, that the States of Swedeland ftill continued their Affembly, and that the King had been forewhat in Jipofed of late, but was again perfectly recovered : That they difcourfed much of disbanding the A imy quartered in the Durchy of Breme is and that they were in daily expectation of an Anfwer from his Imperial Majelty touching their laft demands, in order to the full conclution of the League negotiaring between the Emperour and that Crown.

Plymou: h; Aug. 28. The last night and this morning agrived bere three thips from Newcajtle, and three French, thips laden with Salt and other Merchandile.

Weymouth, Aug 29. The 27th inftant put into this Road, a Fleet of 18 fail of English ships outwards bound; one of them being the Foseph of London, springing a Leak was forced to put in here to stop it, and this morning put to lea again with the rest of he comp ny.

Whitehall, Sept. 2.
