Warsaw, Octob. 13.

**T**he last Letters from the Frontiers tell us, That the Forces of the Crown had Orders to separate, and march to their Quarters, and that the Generals were expected in few days at Lemberg, where they are to meet with some other Persons Authorised for that purpose, to regulate divers Matters, with Relation to the Subsistence of the Troops in their Winter-quarters. The Garison of Sorocke on the Nieffer has been lately reinforced and supplied with Provisions; and the like care is taken of our other Frontier Places. They write from Moldavia, That the Han of Tartary was returning home with the Troops with which he marched in the beginning of this Summer to joyn the Ottoman Army in Hungary.

Vienna, Octob. 28. On the 21st instant the Baron de Frise, the Sieur Werther, and the Sieur de Biern, Envoys Extraordinary from the Elector of Saxony, had a publick Audience of the Emperor, and received the Investiture in the Name of his Electoral Highness, with the usual Ceremonies, at which were also present the Ministers of the Dukes of Saxe-Gottha, Zeitz and Weissenfels. The Queen Dowager of Poland, Duchesse of Lorraine, is come hither with the Duke of Lorraine, and the two other Princes her Sons, the fourth and youngest continuing at Inspruck. The Prince de Fursi is on his departure for Rome, where he is to reside with the Character of the Emperors Ambassador, in the place of the Prince of Liechtenstein, who is coming home to be Governor to the young Arch-Duke.

Hamburgh, Octob. 30. The King of Denmark returned to Copenhagen on the 22d of this month. The Fortifications of Ratzburg are almost demolished; And the Danish Troops who were to continue in the Neighbourhood of that place 14 days after the Exchange of the Ratifications of the late Treaty, are now in motion to quit the Country of Saxe-Lawenburg, the Horse having Orders to march to Jutland, and the Foot to Embark at Travemunde, and thence to sail by Sea to Copenhagen. The Lunenburg Troops are likewise preparing to leave that Dutchy, and to repass the Elbe, except 400 Men, who, by the said Treaty, are to remain there, to maintain the Possession of it. They write from Stockholme, That on the 27th instant would be performed the Funerall Obsequies of the late Queen of Sweden, with great Pomp; And that on the 28th the States of that Kingdom were to meet in a General Diet.

Edinburgh, Novemb. 4. This being His Majesties Birth Day was observed here with great Solemnity; The Magistrates appeared in their Robes, and having Invited the Lord Chancellor, the Privy Counsellors, and other Persons of Quality in Town, they went to the Cross, and there Drank Their Majesties Healths; The Train-Bands were in Arms, The great Guns were fired from the Castle; and the Evening concluded with Illuminations, and Ringing of Bells; And that which very much added to the publick Rejoycing was the Happy News we received of His Majesties safe arrival in England.

Bristol, Nov. 8. On the 5th arrived here the Providence, Diego Alvarez Master, of and from St. Sebastians; and the Token Sloop laden with Tobacco from Virginia. On the 6th the Industry of Kinsale, Richard Cheseleman Master, with Tobacco and Sugar from Antegoa; and the Reunion of Appledore, with Herrings from Wexford. On the 7th, the Success of Bristol, Thomas Foreman Master, from St. Sebastians; and the Ellen and Mary both from Wexford; and this day the St. John Dogger of Apsam, John Bully Master; and the Boston Pink of Bristol, both laden with Train Oil and Fish from Newfoundland; They came from thence this day month in Company of 7 Sail more, under Convoy of the Experiment Mah of War, who were bound to other Ports.

Tarmonth, Novemb. 8. This Morning Sailed our of this Road 25 Merchant Ships with their Convoy for Holland. About 100 laden Colliers passed this day through our Road to the Southward.

Deale, Novemb. 10. Yesterday arrived in the Downes the Mary Ketch of London, in 9 days from O Porto. The same day came in an Ostend Privateer from Cruising.

London, Nov. 7. The Royal African Company of England having of late years been indelisted in their Trade in the North Parts of Guiney, by the French, as well in time of Peace as since the War, did (by Virtue of Their Majesties Commission) Order their Agent-General, John Booker Esq; at James Island in the River of Gamboa, to attempt the dispossessing them from those Parts, which succeeded accordingly, as appears by Letters from the said Agent of the

the 14th of March 1693. now received by the way of Jamaica; an Abstract of which follows.

Having Embarked my self and above 150 Men of this Island upon the Companies Ships the *Anne*, Captain *Leech*, and the *America*, Captain *Brome*, with several Sloops, as an Addition to the Force they sent me, I arrived at *Senegal* River the 30th of *December* 1692. With great difficulty, and the loss of six Men. I got over the Bar, and whilst I was preparing to attack the Fort called *Louis de Bourbon*, the 1st day of *January*, I received a Letter from *Monsieur Desnoillins* the Governor, offering to Surrender if he and his Men might have Civil Treatment, which I readily granted, and Landed and took Possession of the Fort the same day, where I found 15 Cannon, &c. The said Fort is situated in the Mouth, of the River *Senegal*, and hath been in the possession of the French above 50 years, where I have now erected a Factory, and called it by the Name of *William and Mary Fort*. I continued there until the 25th, when I sailed thence, and having succeeded so well, called a Council of War at Sea the next day, where it was resolved to attack the Island of *Goree*, the only place remaining in the French Possession in *Guinea*, where I arrived with the Ships the first of *February*, and continued to Alarm the Castles until Saturday the 4th, when in the Night I landed with 100 men, under the old Fort, within 250 yards of the new Castle, called *St. Michael*, and Commanded by *Monsieur Felix*, situated on a rising Ground, and mounted with 28 Guns, without any Resistance, till about break of day, when they fired furiously upon us with their great and small Shot, About Noon I sent them a Summons to Surrender before our Cannon should be landed, when they immediately desired a Capitulation, which being granted, and Articles agreed on, they marched out the 5th with their Arms, Bag, and Baggage, and Colours flying, and were carried to the Companies Fort at *Jamaica* Island, whence they are to be Transported on the Companies Shipping, and at the Companies Charge, for *Europe*.

The late high Westerly Winds having hindered the coming over of the *Paquet Boats* from *Holland*, there are now two *Mails* due, besides that of *Friday* last.

Also *Samuel Gibbens*, a tall thin Man, long visaged, ruddy Complexion, aged about 25; *Thomas Hoyle*, a middle sized Man, fair Complexion, round visaged, hath a Scar on the Right Cheek, a small bit of his right Nose still wanting, on which he wears a black Patch, being about 30 years of Age; And *Robert Gorst*, a middle sized Man, aged about 30, pale fac'd, with pebbles, a down sower look; These last 3 are very

much suspected to have committed several Robberies on the Highway. Such as have been Robbed by the Persons aforesaid may have a view of them, and the Goods, if they repair to *Mr. James Fell*, Keeper of the said Goal.
