

the 14th of March 1693, now received by the way of Jamaica; an Abstract of which follows.

Having Embarked my self and above 200 Men of this Island upon the Companies Ships the Anne, Captain Leech, and the America, Captain Brome, with several Sloops, as an Addition to the Force they sent me, I arrived at Senegall River the 30th of December 1692. With great difficulty, and the loss of six Men, I got over the Bar, and whilst I was preparing to attack the Fort called Louis de Bourbon, the 27th day of January, I received a Letter from Monsieur Desmollins the Governor, offering to Surrender if he and his Men might have Civil Treatment, which I readily granted and Landed and took Possession of the Fort the same day, where I found 15 Cannon, &c. The laid Fort is situated in the Mouth of the River Senegall and hath been in the possession of the French above 50 years, where I have now settled a Factory, and called it by the Name of William and Mary Fort. I continued there until the 25th, when I Sailed thence, and having succeeded so well, called a Council of War at Sea the next day, where it was resolved to attack the Island of Goree, the only place remaining in the French Possession in Guine, where I arrived with the Ships the first of February, and continued to Alarm the Castles until Saturday the 4th, when in the Night I landed with 100 men, under the old Fort, within 250 yards of the new Castle, called St. Michael, and Commanded by Monsieur Felix, situated on a rising Ground and mounted with 28 Guns, without any Resistance, till about break of day, when they fired furiously upon us with their great and small Shot. About Noon I sent them a Summons to Surrender before our Cannon should be landed, when they immediately desired a Capitulation which being granted, and Articles agreed on they marched out the 8th with their Arms, Bag and Baggage, and Colours flying, and were carried to the Companies Fort at James Island whence they are to be transported on the Companies Shipping, and at the Companies Charge, for Europe.

The late high Westerly Winds bearing broad the sounding over of the Paquet Boat from Holland, there are now two Molls due, before that of Friday last.

Also Samuel Gibbons, a tall thin Man, long visaged, ruddy Complexion, aged about 25; Thomas Hoyle, a middle sized Man, fair Complexion, round visaged, born a scar on the Right Cheek, a small bit of his right Nostril wanting, on which he wears a black Patch, being about 30 years of age; And Robert Gorst, a middle sized Man, aged about 30, pale fac'd, with Pockholes, a downy sower look; These last 3 are very

much suspected to have committed several Robberies on the Highway. Such as have been Robbed by the Persons aforesaid may have a view of them, and the Goods, if they report to Mr. James Fell, Keeper of the said Goal.
