

the particulars aforesaid at such times or intervals, and in such form, as may be specified in such directions, and if he fails to do so, or makes any false return, he shall be deemed to be guilty of a contravention of the Principal Order.

(3) It shall be the duty of every person who stays at an Hotel, Inn, Boarding-house, or Lodging-house, to furnish to the Keeper thereof and sign a statement containing such information as such Keeper may require for the purpose of compiling such Register as aforesaid, and if any person fails to do so, or gives any false information, he shall be deemed to be guilty of a contravention of the Principal Order.

(4) Every Register kept under this Article shall, at all reasonable hours, be open to inspection by any Officer of Police or by any other person authorized by the Lieutenant-Governor.

(5) For the purposes of this Article the expression "Keeper of a Lodging-house" shall include any person who for reward receives any other person to lodge with him or in his house, and where any Hotel, Inn, Boarding-house, or Lodging-house, is under the management of a Manager the expression "Keeper" shall in relation thereto include such Manager.

(6) This Article shall have effect as if it were included in the Principal Order, and that Order shall have effect accordingly.

2. This Order may be cited as "The Aliens Restriction (Isle of Man) Amendment Order, 1915."

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 2nd day of July, 1915, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we have found it necessary to employ temporarily in the Medical Branch of Your Majesty's Fleet certain Civilian Medical Practitioners:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant to the said Medical Practitioners, in such numbers as may be agreed upon in consultation with the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury, as from the 19th June, 1915, of such temporary rank in the Naval Medical Service as may be considered appropriate to their attainments, together with the

maximum full pay and allowances applicable to the corresponding Rank on the Permanent List.

"We further beg leave to recommend that Officers thus entered should be eligible for the award of compensation for injuries and wounds on the scales applicable to their corresponding Rank on the Permanent List, and that, in the event of their death from causes attributable to the Service, their dependants should be eligible for such awards as would, in similar circumstances, be granted to the dependants of Officers of corresponding rank in the Royal Navy.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 17th day of June, in the year 1915, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of Saint Mark, Siddal, situate in the New Parish (sometime District) of Salterhebble, in the County of York, and in the Diocese of Wakefield:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Mark, Siddal, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George Rodney, Bishop of Wakefield, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Salterhebble, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is de-
