Rome, October 31.

The Cardinal *d'Estres* parted from hence on Sunday last for France. The same day the Cardinal *de Fourbin* had a long Audience of the Pope; and in a Consistory held on Monday 5 French Bishops more were pronounced, to wit, those of *Pamiers*, *Aix*, *St. Omer*, *Perigueux*, and *St. Flour*. The Popes Galeys arrived on the 20th of this month at *Messina*, having left the Squadron of *Malta* off of *Cape Sparaveno* in their return home from the *Levant*.

Naples, October 27. Three thousand Men have been raised in this Kingdom for the service of the State of *Milan*, who will be sent thither with the first opportunity; together with a Reinforcement to the Garrison of *Final*. The new Levies are still continued here.

Turin, Nov. 2. Our Army marched on the 26th of the last Month to *Moncalier*, and still continues there to observe the Enemy; who are encamped at *Polonghera*; They have made great Provision at *Saluffes*, as they pretend for the Siege of *Coni*; though after all we do not believe they will think fit to attempt it. His Royal Highness has now with him at *Moncalier* 16000 Men, including 2 or 3000 of the Troops of the *Milaneze*, the rest, to the number of about 4000, being gone home; Besides these the Marquis *de Parole* is poited with 3000 Men about 10 miles from *Moncalier*, and the Count *de Rabutin* is with 1000 Horse at *Aff* to hinder the Enemies Excursions, so that his Royal Highness Army consists at present of 20000 Men, without reckoning the 4000 that are in Garrison at *Coni*. There has fallen a great deal of Snow within these few days.

Venice, Nov. 6. We have Advice that the Doge *Morosini* is returned with the Venetian Fleet to *Napoli di Romania*, and that he has ordered the Troops to go into their Winter Quarters.

Vienna, Nov. 4. The last Advices from *Hungary* give an account, that General *Hofkirken* after the defeat of 4000 Turks and Tartars near *Gyula*, went in pursuit of another Body of 10 or 12000, who had plundered and burnt divers Villages about *Debreczin*, but they having notice of his march, retired with so much haste that he could not overtake them; The Imperialists however recovered great part of the Booty the Enemy had got, which in their precipitate retreat they were forced to leave behind them. The Imperial Army under the Duke *de Croy* is marched from *Pukins* higher up the *Danube*; and the States of *Hungary* are appointed to meet at *Offen* to regulate the Winter Quarters that are to be assigned them. The Emperor has given the vacant Regiment of *Serau* to the Count of *Dietrichstein*; That of *Serostzenback* to Prince *Maximilian of Hanouer*; and that of *Archinto* to Major General *Geswind*, who serves at present in *Piedmont*.

Vienna, Nov. 8. The Troops in *Hungary* are on both sides marching to their Winter Quarters; The Grand-Vizier parted from *Belgrade* about 14 days ago on his return to *Adrianople*; and the Duke *de Croy* is shortly expected here. The Tartars who made the late Incurfion into the Neighbourhood of *Debreczin* are gone home; as are also the Turkish Troops that were raised in *Asia* for the Service of this Campaign. The Emperor is sending Commissioners to all his Hereditary Countreys, to demand the necessary Subsidies of them for carrying on the War; New Levies are going to be made for augmenting the Imperial Forces against the next year; And great Magazines are providing in many places, as well in the *Upper* as *Lower-Hungary*, for which purpose

several considerable Sums of Money have been lately sent thither. The Place of Chancellor of the Court, vacant by the death of Count *Straatman*, is not yet disposed of.

Francfort, Nov. 11. The Confederate Forces that have lain some time about *Herrenberg* and *Alringen* decamped on the 6th, and are marched to their Winter Quarters; But Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* with most of the General Officers will continue some days longer at *Herrenberg*, to regulate several matters relating to the said Troops. The Deputies of the Circle of *Stabia* are now assembled at *Ulm*, and among other things have under Consideration the raising of some new Regiments. The French Forces, lately commanded by the Marechal *de Lorge*, are gone into Quarters in *Alsace*, *Sinzow*, and *Burgandy*.

Cologne, Nov. 17. The Count *de Comingjecke* went from hence yesterday to *Bon* to assist at a Conference that's held there to settle the Repartition of the Quarters for 5 Regiments of *Brandenburg* Horse and 4 of Foot, who are to Winter in this Diocels; Four other *Brandenburg* Regiments are, it's said, to have their Winter Quarters in the Duchy of *Juliers*. The Elector *Palatin* has given Orders to the Officers of his Troops to compleat their Recruits by the First of *March* next.

Paris, Nov. 13. The Duke of *Luxemburg* arrived here two days ago from *Flanders*, wheré the Marechal *de Boufflers* is to command during the Winter. The Marechal *de Taverville* is also come hither from *Brest*. The French King has resolved to form a new Body of One Hundred Companies of *Carabiniers*, to be drawn out of the old Troops; of which the Duke *de Maine* is to be Lieutenant-General, and under him they are to be Commanded by Five Colonels. Yesterday a Review was taken of the Regiments of French and Swiss Guards, who were found to be extremely weakened by the loss they suffered during the last Campaign; and Orders are given for recruiting them. The Letters from Monsieur *Catinat's* Camp at *Polonghera* of the first Instant tell us, that they were laying up great quantities of Ammunition and Provisions at *Saluffes*; That several Pieces of great Cannon were brought thither from *Pignerol*; and 'twas given out that they were designed for the Siege of *Coni*. We have Advice that Monsieur *de Chasteau-venant* is arrived with his Squadron at *Brest*.

Paris, Nov. 16. The Letters from *Piedmont* of the 3d Instant say; that the French Army marched that day from *Polonghera* to *Morette*, these two places being distant about a mile and a half; That they had made a great Magazine at *Saluffes*; But that the design upon *Coni* seemed to be laid aside by reason of the difficulties they apprehended in that Enterprize as well from the Season as the good Condition the place is in: The Confederate Army was encamped at *Moncalier*, being reinforced by the Troops drawn from the Blockade of *Cazal* and other Posts. Monsieur *de Rozel*, the Marquis *de Belgarde*, Monsieur *du Mesnil*, and two more are named to command the 100 Companies of *Carabiniers* under the Duke of *Maine*. The Ministers of this Court are taken up with finding out new Ways and Projects to raise Money for the War, in which they meet with mighty difficulties, by reason of the great Poverty and Misery that appear in all parts of this Kingdom, and which increase daily.

Brussels, Nov. 15. The Troops on both sides are now in their Winter Quarters. The French continue to work on the Fortifications of *Charleroy* and *Courtray*, and they are raising 7 new Regiments within their Conquests. Don *Bernardo de Quiros*, Envoy Extraordinary from *Spain* to the States-General of the *United-Provinces*, and Monsieur *Dieff* the *Brandenburg* Minister, arrived here on Friday last from the *Hague*. The Letters from *Madrid* of the

25th past give an account, that the King of Spain had been somewhat indisposed for 2 or 3 days, but was very well again; That the Marquis de Gastañaga was come to Court, and there was a Discourse that he would be made Governor of Catalonia.

Brussels, Nov. 18. His Electoral Highness to prevent the supplying the Enemy with Corn out of these Countreys, has given new Orders by which all Persons are required to bring their Corn to the Walled Towns, as *Louvain, Malines, Liege, Herentals, Antwerp, Brussels, &c.* and after Christmas Commissioners will be sent to visit all the Castles, Bourgs, Villages, and other open Places, and to seize upon all such quantities of Corn as shall be found therefore over and above what is necessary to subsist the Inhabitants for a month. The Spanish Cavalry was mustered here two days ago, as has been likewise done in all the other Gaissons; and the Elector of Bavaria has ordered 2000 Habses to be brought to remount the Trooper who want them. The last Letters from Paris say there was no likelihood that the French would attempt any thing in Piedmont, the business being too far advanced.

Hague, November 17. The 14th Instant being His Majesty of Great Britain's Birth Day, was celebrated here with Publick Rejoycings, and Splendid Entertainments given by several Persons of Quality. The Streets have ordered a Placet to be published, which forbids the going out of all Ships concerned in the Green and Fishery till the Dutch Ships of War have their Complement of Men for the next year. The Duke of Holstein Pleas is expected here in few days from Macfricht.

Hague, November 16. The States-General have Named the Heer Vanden Brande to reside with the Character of their Ambassador at the Court of England in the place of the Heer Van Citters; and he is shortly expected here from Zealand in order to his going thither. The States of Holland met again yesterday. Several Conferences have been held here this week with Monsieur Surintendant, the Brandenburg Minister, about some Troops of his Electoral Highness which are to enter into the Service of this State. The last Letters from Paris say, that the French talked no more of besieging Coni, but pretended to take their Winter Quarters in Savoy and Piedmont.

Falmouth, Nov. 9. A Vessel is arrived in this Port from Cadix, who brings an account that the *Shandoois* was come in there from Gibraltar, and that the *Asia, Loyalty, and Italian-Merchant* were all ready to sail, and would speedily follow.

Plymouth, Nov. 12. On the 10th Instant came into this Port their Majesty's Ship the *Chatham*, with a French Privateer of 26 Guns called the *Margaret of St. Mark's*, which she took the day before near the Lands-End.

Deale, Nov. 13. Yesterday arrived in the Downs their Majesty's Ship the *Experiment* from Newfoundland, from whence she came about two months since with 8 or 9 Merchant Ships under her Convoy, who are gone to the several Ports to which they were bound.

Harwich, Nov. 14. Yesterday arrived here Two Packet Boats with the Mails of *Tuesday* and *Friday* last from Holland, but the Packet-Boat with the Mail of *Friday* was Sennight is not yet come in.

Fine, and for the Exporting of the Wooden Manufactures by all Persons whatsoever, without any interruption from the said Company, into all the Limits of the said Company's Privileges, (excepting, as before is excepted) shall be Enlarged for Three years from the 25th of March next, and be continued from thence until one years notice shall be given to the contrary.

Another on Stoken-Church Hill, about a month or 5 weeks since, 3 Persons Robbd, and lost in Money about 40 l. and other things, and two Mares. Upon Dorchester Road in Oxfordshire, and lost 60 l. in Money, a brown Gelding, and a black Mare. Upon the Butchers going to Uxbridge Fair, lost in Money about 60 l. &c. The like upon the Butchers going to Rumford Fair. Between Stamford and Hind in Essex, lost Money, a Watch, a Cloak, several Rings, and a Fleabitten Nag. Upon Warwick and Coventry Coaches, near Tulliver, then taken Money, Silk, and Fleabitten Cloaths. The same night People coming from Aylesbury Market, who lost Money to a considerable value, and a Cream coloured or Dun Mare. The Persons Robbd may Enquire further of the Recorder of London's Clerk.
