His Royal Highness has now with hin at Moncalier 16000 Men, including 2 or 3000 of the Troops of the Milaneze, the rest, to the number of about 4000, being gone home; Besides these the Marquis de Parelle is posted with 3000 Men about 10 miles from Moncalier, and the Count de Rabutin is with 1000 Horse at Ast to hinder the Enemies Excursions, so that his Royal Highnesses Army consists at present of 2000 Men, without reckening the 4000 that are in Gariforal Coni. There has tallen a great deal of Snow within these few days. thefe few days.

Venice, Nov. 6. We have Advice that the Doge Morshii is returned with the Venetian Fleet to Napoli di Romania, and that he has ordered the Troops to go into

their Winter Quarters. Vienns, Nov. 4. The last Advices from Hungary give an account, that General Hofkirken after the defeat of 4000 Tarks and Tartars near Gyula, went in pursuit of another Body of 10 or 12000, who had plundered and burnt direct Villages about Debreczin, but they having notice of his march, retired with fo much haste that he could not orerake them; The Imperialists however recovered great pirt of the Booty the Enemy had gor, which in their precipitate retreat they were forced to leave behind them. The Imperial Army under the Duke de Croy is marched from Pukina higher up the Danube; and the States of Hangary are appointed to meet at Offen to regulate the Winter Quarters that are to be alligned them. The Emperor has given the vacant Regiment of Serau to the Count of Dietrichstein; That of Serotecuback to Prince Maximilian of Hannuer; and that of Archinto to Major Second Geswind, who serves at present in Predmont.

Vienna, Nov. 8. The Troops in Hungary are on both sides marching to their Winter Quarters; The Grand-Viller parted from Belgrade about 14 days ago on his return to Adrianople; and the Duke de Croy is shortly excepted here. The Tartars who made the late Incursion into the Neighbourhood of Debreczin are gone home; as are also the Turkish Troops that were raised in Asia into the Neighbourhood of Debreczin are gone home; as are also the Turkish Troops that were raised in Asa for the Service of this Campagne. The French King has resolved to form a new Body of One Hundred Companies of Carabiniers, ro be drawn out of the old Troops; of which the Duke de Maine is to be Lieutenant General, and under him they are to be Commanded by Five Colonels.
