

Master and Fellows in which two-thirds of the existing body of Master and Fellows concur, to complete his term of office.

6. A Tutor may at any time be removed from his office by a vote of the Master and Fellows in which not less than two-thirds of the existing body of Master and Fellows concur.

CHAPTER XL.

The Lecturers.

1. There shall be such number of College Lecturers and in such subjects as the Council may from time to time determine. When a College Lecturer vacates his office no new appointment shall be made until the Council have determined that the office shall be filled up by a fresh appointment, and have decided to what subject the office shall be assigned.

2. A College Lecturer shall be appointed by the Master, but the Master shall appoint himself as College Lecturer only with the consent of a majority of the remaining members of the Council.

3. The appointment of a College Lecturer shall be subject to confirmation by a majority of the Council at the end of one year from the date of the appointment. A College Lecturer whose appointment is not so confirmed shall forthwith vacate his office, and shall not be capable of reappointment except with the consent of a majority of the Council.

4. A College Lecturer shall vacate his office when he has held it for twenty-five years. He may however be reappointed to his office for a further period of five years by a vote of the majority of the Council. At the end of such period of five years he may be similarly reappointed for a second period of five years, and so on, from time to time. If a College Lecturer be elected Master of the College he shall vacate the office of Lecturer at the end of the current academical year unless he be allowed by a vote of the majority of the Council to complete his term of office.

5. A College Lecturer may at any time be removed from his office by a vote of the Master and Fellows in which at least two-thirds of the existing body of Master and Fellows concur.

6. The Council may at any time make temporary appointments for periods not exceeding one year of persons who are not College Lecturers to give instruction to Members of the College. A person so appointed shall not be deemed to hold a qualifying office in accordance with Chapter XII, § 4 A, nor to count the time during which he holds such appointment as a part of the qualification for holding a Senior Fellowship for life.

CHAPTER XLI.

Residence of Fellows and Officers.

1. The Master and Fellows shall nominate a Tutor and at least one other College Officer or a Fellow who shall reside in College during full Term; and at least one College Officer or Fellow shall reside in College during that part of the vacation after the Easter Term in which members of the College *in statu pupillari* are allowed to reside; provided that this duty of residence may be divided between two or more Tutors or other College Officers or Fellows, in any manner approved by the Master and Fellows.

2. The Master and Fellows shall make such provision as may seem to them expedient for

the residence of College Officers or Fellows during the other vacations.

3. The Master and Fellows shall have the power of requiring any College Officer to reside in College during full Term, and during such part of the vacation after Easter Term as they may think necessary for the due maintenance of discipline.

4. Every Fellow or College Officer who is fulfilling the duty of residence under this chapter shall sleep in College at least five nights in each week, and if he shall be absent on either of the remaining nights he shall have a Deputy, approved by the Master, and such Deputy shall sleep in College: provided always, that a house communicating with the College and approved by the Master and Fellows shall, for the purposes of this Chapter, be deemed to be within the College.

CHAPTER XLII.

The Caution Fund.

1. All Caution money shall be placed to the credit of a fund to be called the Caution Fund.

2. The Caution Fund shall be managed in such manner as the Master and Fellows shall by College Order from time to time direct. The accounts of it shall be annually audited with the other accounts of the College.

CHAPTER XLIII.

Benefactions and Endowments.

1. The Master and Fellows shall have power to make orders from time to time for the distribution among deserving Students of the College of the proceeds of the endowments given to the College for the maintenance of Exhibitioners by the following Benefactors; that is to say, Mr. Jenens, Dr. Hawford, Sir Walter Mildmay, Mr. Rawlins, Mr. Harvey, Mr. Laughton, Dr. Plume, and Mrs. Berridge.

2. The Master and Fellows shall have power to make orders from time to time for the application to the instruction of Students of the College in Divinity, or in the Greek or Hebrew language, of the endowments for Readers or Lecturers and Preachers in the College provided by the following Benefactors; that is to say, Mr. Rysley, Sir Walter Mildmay, Dr. Hawford, Mr. Wentworth, Mr. Bunting, and Mr. Burrell.

CHAPTER XLIV.

Exhibitions for Students coming from Special Schools.

1. In the cases of Exhibitions or emoluments where it is provided that a preference should be shown to Students coming from Special Schools, the Master and Fellows shall have power to examine the candidates, and, rejecting the unworthy, to elect only those who show themselves duly qualified.

2. If in any case either no candidate, or no candidate whom the Master and Fellows consider duly qualified, from the Special School or Schools present himself, the Master and Fellows shall have power for that turn to throw open the Exhibition or emolument, and elect some duly qualified person in the same manner as they elect the Scholars of the College.

3. The Students holding such Exhibitions or emoluments shall be subject to the same rules, and be liable to be deprived or have the receipt of their emoluments suspended in the same manner as the Scholars of the College.
