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Milan, Nov. 12.

WE understand by an Express from Vienna, That the Emperor has resolved to send a great Reinforcement to his Troops in Piedmont, against next Spring. Our Governor is taking care to Recruit the Forces of this State; and we are expecting 3000 Men from Naples. General *Rabutin* is posted near *Asti* with a Body of Germans and Spaniards, and has Orders, if he finds it necessary, to join the Marquis *de Pavelle* at *Mondovi*.
Venice, Nov. 13. This Morning arrived here a Fleeca from *Dalmatia*, and brought Advice, That 2500 Turks being on their march towards *Vergovatz*, to attack that place, they were surprised by 800 Morlaques who had laid an Ambush for them; That of the Enemy 300 were killed and 100 taken, with 12 Colours; and that among the Prisoners were *Orto Bala Bassa*, with several other Officers. The Morlaques lost but two Men in this occasion.

Turin, Nov. 16. The French after all their Preparations for the Siege of *Com* have been so discouraged by the difficulties they apprehended in that Enterprize, as not to think fit to engage in it; and have sent back their heavy Cannon to *Pignerol*, except some pieces which stuck by the way; At the same time they seem to have lost likewise their design of Wintering in *Piedmont*; for their Horse is going to repair the Mountains, and to take their Winter-quarters in *Burgundy*; and its believed their Foot will quickly follow. The Duke of *Savoy* is still encamped at *Monsieur*.

Malaga, Nov. 3. On the 30th past came into this Road the Spanish Fleet, consisting of 18 Men of War, from *Port Mahon*, and having taken on Board some fresh Provisions, they sailed again the same Evening for *Cadix*.

Vienna, Nov. 11. The Duke of *Croy* and Count *Guido* of *Starheimburg* arrived here yesterday from *Hungary*, having left the Imperial Forces on their march to their Winter-quarters; And the General Count *de Heyderheim* is expected in few days. General *Veterani* was by our last Advice from *Transylvania* still posted at *Kapolluss*, to observe the Turks and Tartars who continued in the Neighbourhood of *Timeswaer*; but so soon as they were separated and gone to their Quarters, he would likewise send back his Troops to the several Garrisons, where they are to Winter. The Grand *Vizier* is returned towards *Adrianople*, having left a strong Garrison in *Belgrade*, and lodged several thousand Men near the *Sava*; but the Attacking Troops are all gone home. Orders have been sent from hence to General *Veterani* to fortifie *Caranfbes*, which is a very considerable Pass on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*.

Vienna, Nov. 14. Their Imperial Majesties went this day to *Kloster Neuburg* to celebrate there the Feast of *St. Leopold*, and intend to return hither to morrow. Great Efforts are made at this Court in order to augment our Forces against the next year: The Emperor has resolved to raise 8 new Regiments to supply the place of the Auxillary Troops that are marching home from *Hungary*, besides the Recruits for those already on Foot; We are told likewise that the Emperor intends to reinforce his Troops now on the *Rhine* with 10000 men, and to send 10000 more to the Assistance of the Duke of *Savoy*; for which end his Imperial Majesty is treating with the Princes of the Empire to take into his Service what Troops they can spare; And towards raising a Fund for these Services, here is a Design of engaging the Revenues of *Tirol* for 10 or 12 Millions of Florins. In *Hungary* all things are quiet; The Winter-quarters are settled; and Orders are given for making an exact Review of the Imperial Regiments, as well Horse and Foot, that it may be known what numbers are wanting to Recruit them.

Vienna, Nov. 18. The Commissions for the new Levies will be speedily given out; Daily Consultations are held here to find out ways to raise the Money necessary for carrying on the War. The Letters from *Hungary* give an account of the sudden Death of General *Hefliken*, who Commanded a Body of Imperial Troops on the *Theysse*. The Count *de Heyderheim* came hither yesterday. The Count of *Tarcary* is gone home with his Troops.

Hanover, Nov. 10. Mr. *Cresser*, His Majesty of *Great Britain's* Envoy Extraordinary to these Courts, had yesterday his publick Audiences of the Elector of *Brunswick-Lunenborg*, the Electors, and the Electoral Princes; And this day of the Electoral Prince, to which he was conducted with the usual Ceremonies.

Frankfort, Nov. 25. The Troops are now in their Winter-quarters. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is at *Gurtsberg*; And from thence intends to go to the meeting of the States of *Franconia*, to represent to them the necessity of Augmenting their Troops, and of hastning their Preparations for the next year; after which 'tis thought he will take a Journey to *Vienna*, to assist at a great Council of War to be held there. We hear from *Alsace*, That the French are very busie in making their Recruits; and that they use all Endeavours imaginable to supply themselves with Horses, of which they are in much want.

Cologne, Nov. 27. The Repartition of the Winter-Quarters in this Diocese for 4 Regiments of *Brandenburg* Horse, and as many of Foot, is agreed on; Their Headquarters isto be at *Nuys*; The rest of the *Brandenburg* Troops that came from the *Upper Rhine* are marched towards *Aix la Chapelle*. The Elector *Palatine* has given Orders for Recruiting his Troops.

Paris, Nov. 20. The scarcity of Corn still encreases, inasmuch, that in many Provinces of this Kingdom the People will not be able without Supplies from abroad to subsist above 2 or 3 Months; In this City the Necessities and number of the Poor are become so great, that 'tis found impossible to relieve them all out of the Distribution of Bread which was lately ordered to be made at two Sois the Pound, and for this Reason, the French King has instead thereof, by an Order of Council, dated the 14th instant, commanded that 120 thousand Livres shall be given every month to the Priests of the several Parishes, to be by them distributed to those that are most Necessitous; and this Distribution is to begin on the 23th instant. The States of *Provence* met the 6th at *Lanbyss*, and gave the French King, as a free Gift, 700 thousand Livres; The States of *Artois* have given 400 thousand. The Letters from *Peacmont* of the 7th instant, tell us, That Monsieur *Catinat* decamped the 5th from *Morette*, and marched to *Mantua*; From whence a Detachment of 10 Battalions was sent on the 6th to *Busco*, under the Command of the Count *d'Usson*, who was to continue there till further Order. The Duke of *Maine* is to take a Review of the new Companies of *Carbiniers* about the end of this month.

Paris, Nov. 23. The Letters from Monsieur *Catinat's* Camp at *Mantua*, about half a Mile beyond *Savuffis* towards *Com*, of the 11th instant, give an account, That while they were expecting Orders to march towards *Com*, (a strong Detachment being already advanced with 18 pieces of Cannon to *Busco*, which is within two Leagues of that place) the *Marchal de Catinat* had changed his Resolution, and sent back the heavy Cannon to *Saluffis*; and that the whole Army would march in a day or two towards *Pignerol*. Commissioners are appointed to find out ways for the Relief of the Poorer Sort of People, who suffer extremely.
