

# The London Gazette.

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Dublin, August 21.

**T**He 17th instant the body of the deceased Lady the Right Honourable the Countess of *Arran*, was with extraordinary solemnity and state, carried from hence to *Kilkenny*, and on Wednesday the 19th as solemnly entered there, the particulars whereof are fully published in a Letter from *Dublin*, giving a full narrative of that Funeral, to which we shall refer you.

*Plymouth, Septemb. 1.* Here is lately arrived only one French ship laden with Salt. Yesterday sailed hence with a favourable wind, three ships of this place bound for *Virginia*, and may be speedily followed by several others which are fitting up for the same voyage.

*Bristol, Septemb. 2.* Yesterday sailed hence for foreign parts, a Fleet of between 20 and 30 ships; but the wind varying, 'tis believed they may be obliged to put back again, the same day arrived the *Charity* from *Barbadoes*, and one large ship from *Virginia*.

*Weymouth, Septemb. 2.* Yesterday came in a small vessel advising us that the 23 past about 4½ Leagues off the Isle of *Scilly*, he met with the Squadron of His Majesties ships under the command of Sir *Tho. Allen*, who 'tis conceived is by this well advanced on his voyage to the *Straits*.

*Dantzick, Aug. 25.* The Land-day for *Prussia* is peaceably ended, it being there resolved that His Majesty be intreated to continue his Royal Office, which if he refuse, the Parliament or Assembly of Estates is to receive his Resignation, and immediately to dissolve, and the Archbishop to be desired to summon a Convocation for a new Election.

His Highness the Elector of *Brandenburgh* is suddenly expected at *Cenningsberg*, to which he is already on his way from *Custrick*.

*Legornes Aug. 27.* The 21 instant, arrived here the Dutch Convoy from *Spain*, consisting of six Merchant Ships, and two Men of War. The two Men of War, with as many Merchant Ships, laden with Provision and Ammunition for *Zaxe*, departed the 25 instant. The Merchants Delight, intending for *Naples*, *Messina*, and *Venice*, went away the 21 instant, and the 24 layed the *George* for *Messina* and *Smirna*.

Yesterday arrived three French Gallies intended for *Civita Vecchia* to attend the return of the French Ambassador, and this morning came in two Gallies of the Grand Dukes with 300 Bales of Silk from *Messina*.

*Genoa, Aug. 29.* The 23 instant, arrived here the *Katherine*, an English Ship, with Salt, and the same day came in three large Dutch Merchant-ships, with a considerable summe of Money from *Spain*, being part of their Fleet under the Convoy of three Men of War, which with the rest of that Company are gone forwards for *Legorn*.

One of the Gallies belonging to this Republick hath been lately visited at *Barcellona*, by the Order of the Vice-Roy, whose Officers seized on 21000 pieces of Eight found aboard her, on pretence that she wanted a License to transport it.

This last week three French Gallies on their return from *Legorn* with some Slaves which were taken in for the Service of his most Christian Majesty, met with a Gally belonging to this Republick coming here into Port, and forced her to salute them. The other three French Gallies are gone from *Legorn* for *Civita Vecchia*, to attend the Duke de *Chaulnes* in his return from his Embassy.

The Marquels di *Mortara*, the new Governor of the State of *Milan*, has since his arrival at *Finale* spent some dayes there

to refresh himself, intending to pass thence to *Alexandria*, where he may continue till the Pallace at *Milan* can be made ready and furnished for his Reception, and his Train and Equipage be put into a condition to make his publick Entry, and in the mean time to receive there the Compliments of the Envoys, and Representatives from the several Chies and Provinces under his Government.

The Marquels de los *Balbases Spinola* intends likewise to attend him at *Alexandria*, there to give him an account of his Government; and having resigned his Power and Authority to him, to retire to his private Estate at *Vigeano*, where he intends to reside.

From *Milan* we are informed, that they are there making preparations for the Reception of the new Governour, and that they are daily expecting the arrival there of the Prince di *Strigliano*, on whom the Queen Regent of *Spain* has been pleased to confer the Charge of General of all the men at *Ames*.

The Abbot *Airoldi* is departed thence for *Germany*, in obedience to the Popes Commands, in all places where he comes, soliciting for the assistance of the Venetians against the Turks; which done, he is to repair to his Employment as Imeruncio at *Brussels*.

*Cologne, September 4.* The Elector Palatines forces having some time since appeared before *Landshut*, the Sieur de la *Motte* being Governour thereof, surrendered it, and retired himself to the Duke de *Lotharing*, whose Protests is since forning in *Lorraine*, they supposing him to have been wanting either in Duty or Courage to the Charge he had undertaken.

Since this the forces marched to *Ulme*, sitting down before it the 23th past, playing fiercely upon it with their Cannon: after some few dayes siege, the Sieur de la *Mare* finding the Castle unable to hold out against so powerful an Enemy, and little probability of a timely relief from Monsieur *Lillebonne*, whose forces are not yet returned out of *Lorraine*, thought it the safer way to capitulate, and having made honourable conditions, marched out with his Garrison of about 1000 men, with his Drums beating, and was convoyed safely to *Hombourg*.

The Duke of *Lorraine* having intelligence of the surrender of this Castle, is believed to put himself into the Head of all the strength he can draw together, and endeavour to put a stop to the Palatines forces, before they enter farther into his Countrey.

*Hambourgh, Sept. 4.* The Queen *Christina* is preparing for her departure from this place ('tis believed) for *Italy*, and may begin her journey towards the end of this month. The Dukes of *Lunembourg* having disbanded a considerable part of their forces, have consented that 300 of them be sent to the relief of the Republick of *Venice*, for the succors of *Gandia*, under the Command of the Count de *Waldec*, who is to be entertained by the Venetians under the Title of General.

Letters of the 22th instant from *Stockholme*, inform us that the States of that Kingdom are as yet assembled, but may in few dayes separate, and that they have resolved to reform a considerable part of their forces which are quartered in *Pomerania* and *Bremen*; that they had made a stop of several Ships, which 'tis thought are to be employed for their Transportation; and that one of their Men of War was lately arrived upon the Coasts of *Pomerania*, whereon was embarked *Marethal Hoorn*, intending from the Duchy of *Bremen* to be present at the disbanding of several Companies of the Army. To morrow is expected here General *Wrangell*.

Letters

Letters from *Warsaw* of the 20 instant inform us, that His Majesty of *Poland* was resolv'd to depart thence on the beginning of the General Assembly of the States, that his presence might not seem in the least to obstruct the freedom of the future Election. That the Generals of the Army were order'd to be present, for the better security of the Peace; but that the Chancellour and the Lieutenant General were fallen sick, to the great dissatisfaction of the Duke of *Neubourgh*, whose Interests were particularly managed by their care.

They farther tell us that the Secretary or Notary of the Polish Army was lately employ'd to *Bialacierko*; at whose arrival the Cossacks at first seem'd to be much concern'd and troub'd, but afterwards resolv'd to send their Deputies to complement him; and that during his abode there he took all possible care for the security of that place, where he left 80 Pieces of Cannon moun'd for their defence, with a strong Garrison, and returned again to *Warsaw*.

They say likewise that the Moscovites have made a Truce for two Months with the Cossacks, intending to send a considerable Body of men into *Lithuania*; to join with the forces of that Countrey, and that the Swedes in *Liesland* are upon their Guards.

*Brussels*, Septemb. 7. The Marquis de *Castel Rodrigo* is visiting the several parts of *Flanders*, and intend'd the 8th instant to depart from *Ostend* to *Nieuport*, but 'tis believ'd will not leave *Flanders* till the arrival of a Courier which he daily expects from *Madrid*.

He has order'd a *Corps de Gard* to be erect'd within the bounds of the Court in this City, wherein a Tertia or two of Foot are to be lodg'd, or more if occasion so require; for which he has to the Magistrates produc'd a Letter from the Queen Regent of *Spain*, which has been communicated by the said Marquis to the Chamber, compos'd of nine Nations, who refuse to give their consent to it, as being contrary to their privileges. This day about 500 of the meaner sort of people got together in Arms, and march'd towards the place design'd for the *Corps du Guard*, intending to have pulled down what has been erect'd for the lodg'ing of the Soldiers; but the Burgomasters interpos'd their authority, and a company of the Guards being ready to oppose them, they gave off their design, and quietly returned to their houses.

*Paris*, Septemb. 7. His Majesty intends in little time to dispatch some person of considerable quality to the Cantons of *Switzerland* to divert them from any intentions they may have of espousing any foreign Interest to the prejudice of *France*.

The Court de *St. Paul*, and the Duke de *Roannez* are hastning with all imaginable diligence with their reformed Officers for *Candia*, and the rather because the last Letters from those parts inform us, that the Turks have lately rais'd two great Batteries, one at each side of the Port of the Iow of *Candia*, from which by their shot and fireworks they so infest the entrance, that no ships can without much difficulty pass in or out; and that although our Fleet have us'd their utmost diligence to obstruct the Turks in their intentions of sending in supplies to the Visier, yet a considerable succor is arriv'd at *Canea*, which much encourages the Visier to carry on his Siege.

A Courier lately arriv'd from *Poland* informs us, that the General Diet is begun at *Warsaw*, but as yet nothing considerable has pass'd either as to the resignation of the old, or election of a new King, nor is like to be till the Diet be full; the Deputies from some of the Palatinates being not yet arriv'd. The States seem much divided in their opinions touching the Election of a successor; but in favour to the pretensions of the Duke of *Neuburg*, His Majesty has been pleas'd to order the speedy return of the Bishop of *Besiers*, lately Ambassador in that Court, but now without any publick Characters, to take the care of that affair.

*Paris*, Septemb. 13. The King being willing to compose the business with the Huguénots in *Poitou*, who have frequently assembled themselves in great numbers upon the ruins of their lately demolish'd Temples, has offer'd them an

Act of Pardon and Oblivion, upon condition they first make their submission, which they at present refused, as not believing they have hitherto acted contrary to their duty and allegiance.

Monsieur de *Lorvoy* is return'd from his voyage to the *Netherlands*, where he has given out his Orders for the fortifying and regulating several places of the late Conquests, and left the Cittadel of *Tournay* finish'd and compleat'd.

The King has for some time deferred his journey to *Chambourg*, nor is it known when he intends thither, where about 200 Workmen are at present employ'd to fit it up for his reception and entertainment.

From *Lorraine* we are told, that his Highness the Elector Palatine continues still his acts of hostility upon the territories of the Duke, and hath demolish'd the fortifications of *Landshoull*. The *Lorraine* forces are not yet return'd from *Franche Comte*, where the people seem much dissatisfied by reason of several disorders which are frequently committed by them, and as little pleas'd at the demand of four millions to be rais'd out of that Countrey for the repair of their fortifications.

This day or to morrow the Bishop of *Besiers* is to depart hence with all speed for *Poland*.

*Hague*, Sept. 11. Monsieur *Pompont* the French Ambassador, in his return from *Swedenland*, is gone hence on his way for *France*, as is also Monsieur *Turlon* from his employment in *Denmark*. To morrow the States of *Holland* intend to meet again; and on Monday next 'tis believ'd Sir *William Temple*, Ambassador for His Majesty of *Great Britain*, may make his publick and solemn Entry. The Prince of *Orange* is departed hence for *Ereda*, where he intends to continue some time to divert himself in Hunting.

*Portsmouth*, Septemb. 3. The *Succes* is sail'd from the *Spithead* to *Cornes*, where she waits for a fair wind, intending for the Isles of *Guernsey* and *Jersey*. There are also sailing about 40 sail of *Hamburgh* ships, and other Easting, with several English Merchant ships bound to the *Westwards*, and several other ships are discover'd off at sea coming in to them.

The *Eagle* Frigate is now unrigg'd, and is to be paid off and laid up; as are also the *Dragon* and *Swallow*, which yesterday came into Harbor.

*Whitehall*, Septemb. 5. On Thursday morning last, His Majesty, accompanied by his Royal Highness, and his Highness Prince *Rupert*, and attend'd by his Grace the Duke of *Monmouth*, with several other persons of Honour and Quality, departed hence to *Baghor*, where he intends to divert himself 7 or 8 days in Hunting.

*Whitehall*, Septemb. 5. On Wednesday last His Majesty was graciously pleas'd to conferre the Honour of Knighthood on *William Drake* Esq; Nephew to that most Loyal and worthy Gentleman Sir *William Drake* of *Shardeleor* in the County of *Bucks* Knight and Baronet, one of the Members of the Honourable House of Commons.
